Not long before starting my training last year I was on holiday in Wales and decided to go for a train ride to Barmouth. I was rooting around in a little old book shop cellar for inspiration and to see if there were any books that would be of help to me when the training started. Over in the dusty book piles that no one had been browsing In for a while I found an old leather clad concordance. It had a little inscription inside the cover "Timothy II 3.16-17". If I am to be honest I had no idea what this passage in the Bible was until I got home. It is as follows.

- 16 All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness:
- 17 That the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works.

Quite good words found in a dusty old book for a person about to start their journey in Reader training, I hope you would agree. It was probably the last place I really expected to find some inspiration on holiday, on a day out to a small town, in an old dusty shop. But it was there and I did find it. The point is I could have let this so easily pass me by if I hadn't been looking to start with.

These were words of inspiration I had been searching for and had found, but so it can be with God. We often hear people say, "I wish God would come to me," or, "I would like some guidance in my faith." But the trouble is we often want faith brought to us and God's presence made known to us at a time or place of our choosing. Unfortunately though for us we have it the wrong way round.

God will not fit into our plans for life and our needs - we must fit into his. If we wish to experience faith and the presence of God in our lives we must keep our eyes open and be watchful at all times. God will make himself know to us at a time and a place of his choosing. We as Christians must be ready and willing to accept God's presence and guidance when or where he chooses to come unto us. We must also follow where our faith guides us to go and

not just where and when it suits us. If we go looking in the dark places where we don't normally go or we peer into the places that make us uncomfortable the chances are that God may just peer back and guide us on our way.



I found my inspiration in a dark cellar and I'm terrified of cellars.

But on a lighter note I just wish to thank all the clergy and congregation from both churches. During my first year of training I have had so much support from people from both churches that I wish to say a huge THANK YOU ALL. And a very special thank you to my wife Amanda who has helped me through the first year and been understanding about the time that the training demands of me.

So as I start my second year of training, I will try to do my best for all of you and be the best that I am capable of. I know it will not be easy but I will try my hardest which I think will go a long way - as my wife says, "I'm the most trying person she's ever met"????

Harvest Festival 2011

Our Harvest Festival this year will be at 10.30am on Sunday 9th October. The theme of our worship, as always, will be thanksgiving for what God has provided for us. As a demonstration of our gratefulness for what we have received we shall bring gifts to give to those in the local and global community who are in great need.



This year we will be supporting the work of Tearfund's "We are Church" project which seeking to help churches in the poorest parts of Africa to lead their communities out of poverty and into a position where they can support themselves. Envelopes will be available in church so that we can collect a financial gift to send to Tearfund.

Also, as we have done for quite a number of years now, we shall be supporting local charity "Porch Boxes" which provides crisis packs for vulnerable people in our locality. This support takes the form of food and basic hygiene items. Lists of requested items will be available in church and on the website.

We shall be taking gifts of flowers to those in our local community who are sick or housebound. If you are aware of anyone who you feel should receive such a gift, or if you can help deliver the gifts, please let Margery Spencer or any member of the clergy team know.


