Thought for the Month

The year has many starting points not just 1st January. There is the tax year starting in April, the Church's year starting with the first Sunday in Advent, the Chinese and Jewish new years and for me the start of the academic year in



September. It's always a time for me to both look back and look forward. Looking back to the successes of the past year and looking forward to new students, new courses to teach and new challenges.

Looking back over the year in our church life we have much to celebrate. Our union of benefices, Ian's 'canonisation '(for want of a better word - he's not a saint yet), Janet's ordination to the priesthood and Darren's successful completion of his first year of Reader training. I'm sure there is much you would want to celebrate too.

Looking forward we will see Darren exercising his ministry more in both places, although we lose him for a couple of months in the autumn on placement. And we look forward to our Stewardship Campaign. Of course there will be a big push to help us examine our giving as we need to make ends meet and we need to maintain our heritage for future generations.

For me though, much more important is the way in which we respond to our generous and loving God in our service. At the close of many services we respond to the words "Go in peace to Love and Serve the Lord" with "In the name of Christ. Amen". Stewardship is about service and self sacrifice. Christ empowers each one of us to perform our own miracles of creating community when we "move the fences" to include outsiders, when we welcome the rejected and forgotten to our tables, when we give of what little we have, joyfully and gratefully, for the sake of others, when we welcome one another as we would welcome Jesus.

Jesus in his miracles always worked with what was at hand. Like the bread broken to feed the five thousand or the bread broken at the Eucharist he brings forth, as no one else could, the possibilities and capabilities hidden in the depths of what is already there.



And so, of course, he does with us as well. He breaks us open so that we have the capacity to be, and to do, far more than we otherwise could. He transforms us by making us more fully ourselves, by revealing that identity of which we ourselves are not fully aware, the unique way in which each of us is called to the image of God.

When we look back next year I wonder - will we be just where we are today or will we find more people exercising a valuable ministry to our community? If more of us are involved in 'Serving the Lord' then the stewardship campaign will have been a success.

Stewardship

The service on 2nd October at 10.30am will see the start of our Jigsaw Stewardship mission and Bishop Chris will preach at that service. You will receive an invitation letter very soon. October will also see our Harvest festival service. This may seem like a rather crowded month with so many themes running together but it is by design and not an accident that they are that way.

We have chosen October for our Stewardship effort because, when we celebrate Harvest and think about Stewardship, it is good that as many of our Church family as possible are in attendance. That said, there is another more important reason to link Harvest with Stewardship. We will no doubt bring our harvest gifts: flowers, cans of soup, packets of rice and all that is good. One of the most important ways of saying thank you to God for his goodness is in caring for those who are less fortunate than we are. So the boxes of goodies we take to PorchBoxes are very positive ways of giving thanks.

The whole point of Stewardship is that we do not actually own anything, we simply look after it for our lifetime. Everything we have comes from God. We could have the best farmers in the world but if God does not send the rain and provide the earth then they simply could not produce a crop. They are just stewards of God's providence, as indeed are we in the care of what we are sometimes foolish enough to think belongs to us. And when our day comes and we



stand before God in heaven we will all of us stand there as paupers except for the wealth of God's love invested in us. The only commodity that will count for anything in the kingdom of God is love. It is the only bankable commodity in the Bank of Eternity and the way we make deposits now is in caring for each other and providing for God's mission to continue in the world.

The local branch of God's mission in Bury is represented for us by our Church and if it is to continue and to be effective it has to be properly financed. Every year our costs rise and we have no secret funds. We exist simply on the money given by faithful members. In Biblical times the tithe was the norm for what were essentially harvest gifts. Most of the commerce was done by barter so a tenth of the farmers' produce was devoted to charity and the upkeep of the temple. Today, of course, we use money and some people still tithe their income to charity and the Church. The Church of England



recommends a giving level of 5% and it is true that if we ever achieved that then our finances would be totally transformed and we would become a very powerful voice for good in our society. We would never have to have another fundraiser again except for fun. The massive amount of time and energy we devote to fund raising could be turned to spreading God's word in this parish and caring for those who desperately need our care.

Our Stewardship mission is coming and it comes with my heartfelt thanks for your gifts over the years - we have so many wonderful people here. But again we are asking you to consider your giving and adjust it as you see fit. I can assure you that I am doing my bit in terms of my family's giving. Because we believe that what we are all doing here is very important, we are prepared to give it a high priority in our budget. Appeals in the past have evoked a good response but we are still a long way short of a safe level of giving for our future needs. I hope that will mean a considerable increase in our giving but for some people in these difficult times it may mean a reduction if your circumstances have changed for the worse.

Two ways you can make your giving more effective:



1. Make sure you give by envelope or standing order so that we can rely on your gift even when you are not here and we can budget properly because we

have a fair idea of what will be coming in. Fund raising events are good but a bad turn out or poor weather can knock a £1000 off our yearly accounts and how can we plan for that?



2. If you pay tax of any kind please, please fill in a Gift Aid form and we can claim back the tax at no cost to you. You can rescind or change it at any time if

your circumstances change so you are not signing your life away and it makes such a difference to our finances. It is one of the very few ways in which our Government helps charities but it counts for nothing if you won't sign the form. Such a simple action on your part could add thousands to our annual budget.

So when we come in October to give thanks for Harvest, bring your gifts by all means, as it is such a lovely way to praise God. But also bring a determination to make some sacrifices every other week of the year. Think about the half tithe (5%) as a possibility or a target for your Church giving. Think about perhaps a legacy in your will to the Church. People so often give in this way to all sorts of important charities but often the Church is forgotten.

It may not seem that important but think how impoverished our society would be if you took all the Churches away, with Sunday schools, schools, youth and uniformed groups, ministry to the elderly, hospital visiting, social and study groups, funeral ministry, the welcome and care of children, marriages and social groups, etc etc, etc. It would be a massive loss, perhaps more profound than many very worthy charities. Make a sacrificial decision about your giving in the year ahead, make the commitment with a Gift Aid form if that is appropriate. Then share that decision with God in your

prayers and if your conscience before God is easy then we are happy. Your giving is simply between you and God. I only know what I give, I don't want to know what anyone else gives as that is between you and God - but if the Harvest is to be celebrated here in a hundred years time we do need this generation to provide for it.



May God Bless you in your decision.

Angela Dand has received an e-mail from Philip Pullman, the Manager of the Family Links and Visits Complex, at Her Majesty's Prison Manchester, via Mary Sumner House. He is asking if Manchester Mothers' Union can offer any assistance to the unit.

Nationally, Mothers' Union is exploring working with a charity called "Time for Families" (TfF), that delivers relationship courses in prisons. One of the prisons that TfF hopes to include in its programme is Forest Bank in Salford.

Mothers' Union already works in 90 prisons across the UK, work involving over a thousand members. Angela is very excited about these new opportunities for members here in Manchester. It is an excellent opportunity to extend our service to the local community in such a positive and practical way. She would like all our members to pray for existing Mothers' Union work with prisoners and their families, also for all those families. Let's pray that we can find the necessary resources of enthusiasm, commitment and "womanpower" (or "manpower") in Manchester to help at Forest Bank and HMP Manchester and make a real difference. From the \mathbb{QLD} to the \mathbb{NeW}

During this year, which marks 400 years of the Bible in English, we are quoting parts of the Bible in the King James' Version and putting beside them a modern translation. This month we have chosen the famous passage from Saint Paul's letter to the Corinthians.

King James' Bible

Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal. And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries, and all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity, I am nothing. And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing.

Charity suffereth long, and is kind; charity envieth not; charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, Doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil; Rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth in the truth; Beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things. Charity never faileth: but whether there be prophecies, they shall fail; whether there be tongues, they shall cease; whether there be knowledge, it shall vanish away.

For we know in part, and we prophesy in part. But when that which is perfect is come, then that which is in part shall be done away. When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child: but when I became a man, I put away childish things. For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known. And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity.

New International Bible

If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. If I give all I possess to the poor and surrender my body to the flames, but have not love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away.

For we know in part and we prophesy in part, but when perfection comes, the imperfect disappears. When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put childish ways behind me. Now we see but a poor reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known.



And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

Thank you also, to all those who supported the training by helping with the refreshments and supporting Margery, and to Don for the prayers.

Margery and I will be in the Cathedral in October to watch our 'graduates' collect their certificates. I will be bursting with pride for them (knowing me there will be a tear or two) as they are acknowledged and recognised for all they do as part of our two churches.

May God bless all these people in their ministry with our children.

Benard, 12, lives with his grandmother because both his parents died from HIV/AIDS. Benard's grandmother looks after him and his sisters, but she is old so farming the land is difficult, and there is no money to spare for things like shoes.

Benard tries to help her. He wakes up at 6am to take the cattle to where they can find grass to eat, before he runs to school. When he comes home, he has to do the milking and fetch water before he can do his homework.

At school Benard learns about things like how to stay healthy. Even though primary school is free in Kenya, it is still a struggle to go because he has to pay for books and a uniform. Benard's two sisters cannot go to school as there is only enough money to send their big brother.

If he had one wish, Benard would hope to be able to stay on at school but he would have to pay to go to a high school and he knows that his grandmother does not have enough money.

Either He will shield you from suffering or He will give you unfailing strength to bear it.


Be at peace then, and put aside all anxious thoughts and imaginings.



Summer Quiz Night

This was held on Saturday July 23rd and although some of our regulars were taking an early holiday, several newcomers helped to keep the numbers up. After having the rules explained to them that a) this was a fun quiz and not to be taken too seriously and b) that there was to be no cheating, except by letting neighbouring teams hear you giving the wrong answers, they took to the event with real enthusiasm and £140 was added to church funds.
