Whilst on the face of it we would appear to be keeping our heads above water the reality is that we are doing so because we have only paid £7,000 toward our Parish Share which has been set at £38,984 for this year. Last year we failed to pay the amount of Parish Share requested. Paying Parish Share is an important part of being in the Church of England – it helps to fund mission in every parish. We should be doing our best to pay it. Additionally, there are a number of pressing building matters which will call for expenditure in the near future – the church east wall repairs; extension of the Garden of Remembrance; disabled access; church tower repairs; to name but a few. Donations toward refurbishments in the church hall have allowed us to do some work there- maybe donations for other particular projects would be appropriate. As I have pointed out many times – our buildings require a lot of money to keep them properly maintained.

Please prayerfully consider your giving to church and if you have not changed your level of giving for a while please consider looking to increasing the amount. Our costs are rising every year — has your giving? Are you part of the Planned Giving Envelope Scheme? Are you a tax-payer who could Gift Aid the amounts you give? Please speak to Bob Taylor or myself for more information.

A Prayer for new beginnings


Heavenly Father we ask your blessing on our Junior Church as we begin another year. We thank you for our leaders who help us to grow in faith.

Following Church Parade we move into the Church Hall with our packed lunches for an afternoon of charity work.



We will be supporting **MARY'S MEALS** – **BACKPACK PROJECT** – filling backpacks with basic educational material.

Very often families cannot afford to buy basic things like pencils and exercise books, or even suitable clothes for their children to wear to attend school. The backpack project solves the problem by providing poor children with the things they need in school. Last year over 45,000 backpacks were sent to some of the poorest children in the world – in Malawi, Uganda, Liberia and Romania.

WHAT WE NEED

Old Backpacks/school bags

Exercise books/notebooks, coloured pencils, pens, crayons

Eraser, ruler, sharpener and Pencil cases

Towel, soap, toothbrush, toothpaste spoons

Used shorts/skirt & t-shirt, dress

Flip flops and sandals/crocs

A small ball e.g. tennis balls

Items can be second-hand in good condition, or from the cheapest range. NO EXTRA TOYS PLEASE – JUST A BALL. Please collect what you can from the items that your children no longer need. How many odd spoons do you have lurking in a drawer – bring them along. Hotels/Banks are usually very generous with pens.

Even if you don't have anything of the above but would like to contribute, a small donation will help us to buy some of the items. Please let Glennys know if you are able to donate quite a lot.

Junior Church

Churches I have known!

Whenever we go on holiday we try to visit a local church, to worship and to see how other people do it!

This year gave us a unique experience. We went to
Russia, and I am not sure what I expected on the trip but I certainly
did not envisage being taken into many wonderful churches.

During the "Soviet Period" church-going was not allowed and many churches were destroyed. I knew that the church of Saint Sophia with its gorgeous coloured onion domes remained on the edge of Red Square but I did not expect to find within the walls of the Kremlin another two richly decorated churches. Stalin had declared that these two churches must not be destroyed and they had been "mothballed" for decades. They were in wonderful condition with the walls covered with icons telling the story of the prophets and the major events in the life of Christ. There were no stained glass windows so the paintings told the stories. There were no pews either – you had to stand for the whole service.

During the Soviet period, baptisms could not place in a church but many parents took their children to their grandparents who baptised them. Older people knew the words from their church-going days but the whole event had to be kept secret. In fact Vladimir Putin, the current prime minister discovered, on the death of his mother, papers confirming his baptism. Even his father did not know that he had been baptised.

We saw more churches in the towns and villages we visited and even some being built. Russians are now free to worship; with about ten per cent of the population admitting to being believers.

They have a wonderful heritage of church buildings in which to do so.
