Thought for the month

I saw my first spring lamb yesterday (Sunday Feb 6th). Nigel and I were on our way to Scargill, for a service of welcome and licensing of the new Director of Scargill House, the Rev'd Phil Stone. We have been going up there as volunteer caretakers on a regular basis and had seen the "multicoloured" sheep which we nicknamed "Joseph Sheep" and only on Friday had I wondered when the lambs would be born.

Some of you might have been to Scargill in the past for a week-end with church or to one of the many courses there. For those of you who have never heard of the place, it is a Christian community (within the C of E) near Kettlewell in Wharfedale, North Yorkshire.

It started just over 50 years ago, and for me a very special and spiritual place that has had a deep influence in my Christian journey. However about 2 years or so ago it got into a financial mess and had to close. We only found that out in October when we read that it was to re-open with a new Team in charge (our Bishop Chris is the chair of the Scargill Movement council).

To me it is a real story of resurrection. The old was well and truly dead, the new is growing in life.

As Christians we are into resurrection and at Easter we celebrate the death and resurrection of Jesus, but what does this mean?

For many it is a complete mystery, especially for children. For others it equates to chocolate egg time, and who could blame them if they have been fasting through Lent? And isn't it amazing how many people still give something up for Lent, Christians and non-Christians alike?

For Christians, Lent is a time of preparation. Nothing happens without sound preparation. The sheep have to be prepared for lambing and brought down from the fells. Scargill will not be able to re- open without substantial preparation, planning, re- building, financial, etc.

We will not be ready for Easter without the preparation of Lent. So what are we doing to prepare? Simply giving something up; increasing our own private devotions; maybe attending a Lent course; no doubt, some will be taking part in the Mothers' Union "Count your Blessings" - or something completely different? Whatever it is, I hope that it will lead you to celebrate and appreciate what Easter is about even more this year than last year. We have a living and growing faith which needs continual nurture.

This year to help children learn more about the Easter story we are opening church for schools to come in and "Experience Easter" through a series of interactive reflective areas from Palm Sunday through to the resurrection of Jesus. You might be wondering "Why should children get all the fun?" but don't worry, adults and children can come along on the morning of Saturday 27th March to "Experience Easter" for yourself. All this reminds me of my Scouting and Guiding motto – BE PREPARED.

My prayer is that we all will be.

Experience Easter

Most people know the Christmas story but what about Easter?

How much do you know about the events which took place during the last week of Jesus life on earth?

Here is an opportunity to learn, experience and reflect on all that happened. You are invited to come and experience these events through a tour of interactive reflective areas specially set up in our church.

Some children from our local schools will visit this experience earlier in the week and then it's your turn. Church will be open on:-

Saturday 27th March.

Tours start at 9.30 a.m and take about one hour with the last tour starting at 11.30 a.m.

Each tour can only take 6 people at a time every 10 minutes, but if you have to wait you will be able to have a quiet drink of coffee or tea to pass the time.



Church accounts for the year ended 31st December 2009

The accounts for last year have been prepared and are currently with our independent examiner for checking. The figures confirm that it was a tough year for church finances. Unrestricted income for the year totals £64,911 against expenditure of £71,455 – a loss of £6,544 which had to be met from our reserves. Shortage of funds led to a failure to pay, in full, our Parish Share to the Diocese – we were £5,000 short of the amount asked for.

Whilst income levels from most sources remained fairly steady our payments rose by almost £10,000 over the previous year - mainly due to the £19,000 we have had to spend on our buildings. A lot of money is required to maintain our buildings; some years more than others, as essential work arises.

The PCC – and every church member – will need to reflect on our financial situation and decisions will have to be made to address the ongoing problem of raising enough funds to keep Christ Church, Walmersley, in business. Clearly we cannot keep overspending like last year – our reserve funds will soon disappear!

Giving is at the heart of our income, so let each of us have a heart for giving – heeding the words of Jesus and other Biblical teaching. We must do so if we are to maintain the witness of Jesus in our community.

Thank you for the financial support you have given over the last year. Please prayerfully consider the challenges which face us. Copies of the accounts will be available in church at the end of the month and, as usual, a full report will be given at our church annual meeting in April.

Tuesday Place 4 candles and a bottle of perfume on the table. Today we remember the woman from Bethany who annointed Jesus' head, who recognised that he was the King of Kings and would soon die.

Mark 14: 3-9

Wednesday Place 3 candles and a purse of money on the table. Today we remember that Jesus was betrayed for money, and that Jesus wants us to give what we can to help those in the world who are poor.

Mark 14: 10-11

Thursday Place 2 candles and a bowl of water and a towel on the table.

Today we remember the last Passover meal that Jesus celebrated with his disciples. Mark 14: 22-26, John 13: 2-5, 12-15

Good Friday Place 1 red candle on the table with a wooden cross. This is the day that Jesus died for us. Mark 15: 21-39

Saturday Make an Easter garden or place spring flowers on the table.

This is the day we remember Jesus was placed in the tomb.

Mark 15: 42-47

Easter Sunday Christ is Risen. Alleluia!

Mothering Sunday

Mothering Sunday is a Christian festival celebrated throughout Europe.


A religious festival celebrating motherhood has been in existent in Europe since neolithic times. In the Roman religion the festival was in honour of the mother goddess Cybele and it took place during mid-March. As the Roman Empire and Europe converted to Christianity, Mothering Sunday celebrations became part of the liturgical calendar as Laetare Sunday, the fourth Sunday in Lent to honour the Virgin Mary and the "mother church".

During the sixteenth century, people returned to their mother church for a service to be held on Laetare Sunday. This was either a large local church, or more often the nearest Cathedral.

In Victorian times it was the day on which young girls in service were allowed to go home to visit their parents. In some churches the comgregation formed a ring round the church, holding hands. That would be novel!

How will you treat your mother or remember her on March 14th?

'we are currently making about a thousand sandwiches a day! Along with lots of soup, baked potatoes and bacon butties!!'

'we have set up a Foodbank....bags of food are being distributed'

As the volcanoes erupt my flaming hot blood.


And the day you all are stuck in the dirt,




We are sorry that we have has to postpone the Wine tasting until later in the year. There was simply too much going on in the church during that week.

THE WDP LOGO

The symbol for World Day of Prayer was designed by an Irish man for the 1981 service written by Irish women from both north and south of the border. In 1982 it was adopted as the international logo.

Its design is made up of arrows converging from the four points of the compass, persons kneeling in prayer, the Celtic cross and the circle, representing the world and our unity through all diversity.
