On November 18th, Barbara Taylor presented a fascinating insight into the work of the Mothers' Union when she spoke to us about her trip to Kenya.

She and Jennifer White travelled together and witnessed both the everyday life and the ongoing struggles faced by our members in Kenya, particularly Maseno West.

We always try to stress that Mothers' Union is a worldwide organisation and it was wonderful to feel that we were face to face with the people who are regularly in our prayers. In my introduction I commented that Barbara's reminiscences would be emotional for her and equally we were humbled to see the amazing resilience and enthusiasm of the people she introduced to us in pictures.

Most moving and impressive was the amazing welcome that was apparent at every turn. Gifts were in abundance. Lovely handmade goods that were given with pride and a generosity that belied the poverty and hardship suffered continually. Barbara pointed out, with humour, the determination to feed them at every opportunity, but also pointed out that when there is food available the local people eat heartily because they are never sure when they will be without. There were also amusing anecdotes about the transport – roads being basic!

We saw photographs of many different standards of housing ranging from makeshift hovels through typical local dwellings to sophisticated detached houses but were reminded that in spite of the apparent sophistication there was no running water piped into them. We take so much for granted!

The visits made to schools bring home the need for our support. They are in need of every basic resource – from school uniforms to books – and we must continue to raise money to help. It was also obvious that they greatly value our prayers.

Barbara brought many of the gifts she had received and we saw photographs of presentations that were made during the trip, including a hand-knitted woollen blanket that Barbara remembered with amusement in view of the intense heat! (Of course she had to be wrapped in it at the time!)

All members of the Mothers' Union had dresses to denote their membership and they were obviously very proud to be members. Barbara took badges for them and they were delighted. The formal dress that she was given, worn, if I remember correctly, by Branch Leaders and other leaders, is beautiful and elegant.

All in all, the talk was fascinating and informative.

Two things from Barbara's presentation remain foremost in my mind. Firstly, the immense pride they have in their membership of the Mothers' Union and secondly their amazing hospitality and generosity in spite of the hardships they suffer.

Books by Jean Vanier

A few weeks ago Rev. Don Altham mentioned Jean Vanier in his sermon and I asked him if he would do a review for this article. Don says.....Jean Vanier born in 1928 founded an international organisation called L'Arche – the Ark – the boat of salvation. He created communities of people with developmental disabilities to share life with those who assisted them. He remained leader of L'Arche in Trosly-Breuil until 1981. He still lives there.

There are now over 130 establishments throughout the world [11 in the UK] promoting the enlightened care of the mentally disabled. Vanier challenges us to examine our inhumane treatment of people with disabilities and pushes us towards acceptance, integration and recognition of the value of people. His work is based on a living faith:

Those we lock away and think worthless have the power to teach us and even heal us.

When you live with people with disabilities you discover a whole lot of things about yourself.

To be human is to be bonded together each with our own weaknesses and strengths because we need each other.

WHY we feel uncomfortable with them – embarrassed in their presence not because they might drool over us or wet themselves but because they expose our greatest limitation – **THE POVERTY OF OUR COMPASSION.**

Disabled are victims of a society that celebrates the triumph of the strong over the weak, rather than compassion and unity.
