May I share with you a few thoughts on where we may look for, and find, the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ?

Of course God is to be looked for, and found, in the life of the Church – in the Bible, the Sacraments, in public worship and private prayer. But if Church is the only area we think of looking for God, then probably our 'God is too Small' – as the title of a book published many years ago has it.

For instance: God is in that warmth you feel when you love another person, and are loved by another person. God is in the happiness you experience when you see your neighbour rejoicing at something you have done for them.

God is in the joy of the good deed you did which no one found out about.

God is in all beauty – natural and man-made.

God is in every gesture of love, every act of kindness, every hand that is open to the good and to another person..

God is there wherever a human being breathes – whether she or he is black or white, poor or rich, innocent or guilty, ill or healthy, free or imprisoned.

God is there wherever and whenever you share something of yourself to serve and love another person – for to serve and love another is to have seen the face of God.

God is at the heart of every hope. Hope can hide itself, as the sun does from time to time, but is never quenched because it is a reflection of the sun, and the sun never dies, because it is the life of God. And God never, ever, closes his eyes to anyone. For if he did he would not be love. And at the heart of the Gospel is the truth: God is love.

So, perhaps, during Lent we might pray for the grace to be ever more aware of God, and open to God, in and through all the changing scenes of our life. We might pray, too, for the grace to respond in the deepest way possible to the God we shall most certainly find in our lives day by day.

## NOTES FROM CHURCH COUNCILS

## PCC MEETING CHRIST CHURCH 16/02/2012

The Area Dean attended the meeting and went over his report produced after a meeting with the Vicar, George Fryer and Nigel and Barbara Silvester. After some discussion and minor amendments, the report was accepted. The Area dean stayed for the remainder of the meeting. The treasurer gave his report noting a slight increase in giving since the stewardship campaign and showed the draft of the annual financial report which will be submitted to the APCM when the financial examiner has approved the figures. Reports were received from sub-committees. The Ministry Committee requested permission to book the brass band for the Carol Service in December and submitted a plan to remove some pews and parts of pews to create more room for wheelchairs and pushchairs and a larger space at the back of church. This was accepted on a majority vote but costings will have to be established and faculty applied for.

#### PCC MEETING S. JOHN WITH S. MARK 19/02/2012

Joint Magazine: very favourably received, hoping for increased circulation

Finance: we have received quotations for replacing the remaining outside walls of the hall and corridors – we may have some of the work done. We also need the church redecorating

Panto: thanks were recorded for all those involved - the producer, the cast and those backstage. We will remember the bearded Ugly Sisters for a long time!

Youth Group Proposals from Police: the Community Police would like to run a Community Youth Group on Friday evenings in the Hall. An extraordinary PCC meeting has been called for 23 February to discuss this important matter

Recycling ink cartridges: proposal was accepted that we recycle ink cartridges at church and receive 50p per item for church funds

Stewardship update: when we have our new PCC dates for 2012 we will invite James Emmerson, Stewardship Officer, to speak to us.



#### David Hall shares his memories of starting school

I begin in September 1947. I had just started school, Miss Greenhalgh (married name Mrs Burton) and Mrs Baldwin were the infant teachers. That winter was very bad; heavy snow persisted cutting off Nangreaves, Buckhurst, Summerseat and Ramsbottom many times, five and six foot drifts were common. I wore clogs with irons on the wooden soles to which the snow stuck and before long you would have "rockers" on your feet a bit like walking on four inch platforms. We used to sledge in Pigslee Brow, if you were good you would avoid ending up in the stream.

School was Ok, we would recite our times tables, I liked Maths and mental arithmetic, reading aloud I struggled with but story time was the best lesson. In Lent, on a Wednesday morning, the partitions between the two classrooms were drawn back and we would have a service for the whole of the school. Throughout Lent the theme was the Catechism.

The other teachers were Miss Boothman (married name Morris), Miss D. Raine and the Headmaster was Mr Gill. Miss Raine was a great teacher, a disciplinarian, when you left her class, you knew your subjects. Every morning she walked to school from The Drive, an unmistakable person, brilliant red hair (henna I think) dressed in a heavy woollen or worsted skirt and jacket wearing brogues on the feet. Children had to run to match her stride if they wanted to keep up. As I entered Mr Gill's class he retired and a Mr Fell took over needless to say we did not get on.

Then there was Jack Roberts, I liked him, we would do odd jobs for him, that is David Holland and myself, from shovelling coke into the cellar boiler houses of the school and church, to sweeping up, shifting snow from the lych gate to the church door and polishing the pews. We would get a penny or so, sometimes black spanish sticks whatever it was we didn't mind. We would spend the money on fresh baked, warm muffins from the Café, now a convenience store and hair salon.

Of course we had sad times at Walmersley School, the deaths of our school friends, Enid Lee of Palatine Drive and Barbara Yates of Tunners estate who died from a severe asthma attack.

I attended Sunday School. Do you remember the stamps depicting religious scenes from the Bible collected in a stamp book for attending?

Blessed are the touchy. With a bit of luck they may even stop going to Church. They are my missionaries. Blessed are those who claim to love God while hating other They are mine forever.


Blessed are the troublemakers. They shall be called my children.



However you could also try a novel; fiction has the power to move and provoke in equal quantities. If you want to try something a little different this Lent how about one of the following? After all, as in the first recommendation it is all about finding the balance...



Joanne Harris CHOCOLAT Opening a chocolate shop during Lent in a town controlled by an overly abstemious count is not the most sensible idea. A story about people finding both balance and hope in their lives – in Lent and beyond.



**Paul Gallico THE SNOW GOOSE** A short, very moving novel about a man finding redemption when he allows himself to care for an injured bird and girl who brings it to him. If you have tears prepare to shed them.



John Connolly THE GATES Written for teenagers this is a funny, thought provoking look at hell and unlikely friendships which can be enjoyed by adults. Evil is not something we like to think about but this book tackles it head on but leaves us contemplating just who should be casting that first stone?

#### **Christian Aid Team**

One of the most beautiful sights I ever saw was viewed from the comfort of my bed last autumn. It was one of those wonderful clear nights we sometimes have, a sky full of stars and the moon at its fullest. I was so entranced by the moon hanging, as it seemed, just outside my window that I sat thinking and dreaming (possibly even praying) for quite some time. I was just about to try and get some sleep when I heard a familiar sound – the honking of geese – and then across the moon flew a large skein. It took less than a minute but for that brief time I was totally and absolutely captivated.

I am lucky enough to live within yards of the Lido and if you ever visit you will know that Canada Geese are daily visitors, apart from high summer. And to be honest even if you didn't see a bird you would know they had been there (think about it)! Yes, they are pretty messy creatures but absolutely fascinating. And it seems that I am not the only one to thinks so. An article called lessons from geese has been going round in various formats for a number of years; the message varies depending on the audience but here are a few of those lessons.

# As each goose flap its wings it creates "uplift" for the birds that follow.

People who share a common sense of direction and community can get where they are going quicker and easier

## When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of flying alone. It quickly moves back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front of it

If we have as much sense as a goose we stay in formation with those headed where we want to go. We are willing to accept their help and give our help to others.

# When the lead goose tires, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies to the point position.

It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks and sharing leadership

# The gees flying in formation honk to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

We need to make sure our honking is encouraging. In groups where there is encouragement, the productivity is much greater

## When a goose gets sick, wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to help and protect it. They stay until it dies or can fly again.

If we have as much sense as geese, we will stand by each other in difficult times as well as when we are strong.



During Lent we are looking for lessons to help us discover who and what we should be and it easy to find worthy examples that we will never be able to follow. However there are things all around us that could give us more than we could ever imagine so why not take a bit of quiet time this Lent and spend it with the geese?
