THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

Dear Friends

You may think we have been holding summer fairs, social evenings, quiz nights, meeting Sundays round the altar, occasionally studying together, running coffee mornings, selling books. What we have really been doing is living the Good News and by living it spreading it.

The propagation of the Gospel, does not end with Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. We, as their descendants, are to spread the good news and to BE the good news in our everyday lives. Our lives are to reflect the Gospel in all that we do and in all that we say. "For in the one Spirit," as St Paul says, "we were all baptized into one body — Jews or Greeks, slaves or free — and we were all made to drink of one Spirit."

We belong to one body, we are to witness to the one Christ, and as such we are to work together to be the good news. We may need to look carefully at our working lives and our home lives: to consider the way that we respond to those who are poor, to those who are in prison, or blind and downtrodden, not just our neighbours but across the world.

If we, in the name of Christ, are the good news then all of our words and actions are to proclaim that fact. And that so to speak is where we all came in – certainly me in my last weeks as incumbent of the united benefice of Walmersley Road. And as I go I thank God for you all and for the trust that Jesus has placed in us together over these last nearly twelve years.

We have had sorrows and joys together over these last years. I suppose I take most pleasure in the improvements to the buildings at St John with St Mark's making them more a centre for the community. Latterly the formation of the United Benefice with new friends at Christ Church has brought blessing and challenge; it is a union I believe will serve you all

well in the future. The establishment of the OLM scheme has provided a greater sharing in ministry and my colleagues: Priests, Readers and ALMs have been, and will be, a blessing to me and to you.

Of late the formation of the United Benefice has brought a wider more powerful expression to the message we are charged to share.

It is a good time to move on. I really believe there is need for a new angle and a new incumbent will bring that. It is inevitable I suppose at times such as these that I have been thinking back over the years to the people who have come and gone. Those who have died and those who have moved on, so many, and most of the sadnesses have come from the loss of people.

We live such a vivid life in the Church do we not? Because we are part of such a large family we share so many joys at Baptisms, Confirmations and Weddings. We also share the sadness of death and parting.

My final service will be in St John with St Mark's at 6.30pm on Saturday 29th September: The feast of St Michael and All Angels and the 25th Anniversary of my Ordination to the Priesthood. So as we say farewell I really wouldn't swap a single moment and you will always be in my prayers.

NOTES FROM CHURCH COUNCILS

JOINT BENEFICE PCC "AWAY DAY"

24 PCC members from both PCCs met on Saturday August 18th at All Saints Church for the annual Away Day. The topic for the morning session was dedicated to looking at the Diocesan "Child Church Friendly Award" to discuss whether we should go forward and work towards obtaining the award. Steve Dixon, the Dioceses Children's Officer, came to talk to us about this scheme and to let us know what is involved in obtaining the award.

We looked at the self-assessment checklist, of which there were 10 criteria. Working in groups we looked at what we were already achieving and where we could do better. It was encouraging that everyone was enthusiastic and the thoughts and ideas coming forward were honest, enthusiastic and encouraging.

Steve Dixon said he thought we were on the right track and was pleased that there was a positive outlook and commitment and also in our interest to take this forward.

All those who work with our children are doing a fantastic job. But there is always room for development and improvement. Our children deserve to be heard and have a voice in their nurture, development and church. After all they are our church of today, not just tomorrow. All our leaders deserve to be recognised for all their hard work and dedication.

This award would recognise the importance of children in our church and be a public and visible indication that our church has taken steps to ensure that children enjoy their rightful place in our church. The decision to go forward will be taken to each respective PCCs for further discussion and, hopefully, approval.


Week One


PRAYER FOR **Serenity**

About a year with two members of my staff keen chicken keepers and the need to find new activities in the library I persuaded Dawn and Claire to start running chicken keeping courses and the success of these has rubbed off on me.

Apparently home chicken keeping is now at its most popular since World War Two and I am starting to see why. They are easy to care for, entertaining and, of course, there is the bonus of really fresh eggs. All my girls need to do is to lay a couple of solid gold eggs each and they will have paid for the palace they are living in plus the various bits of kit they (probably don't) need.



Nellie is a Light Sussex and is the boss, Gladys a Speckledy is a possibly not the brightest and Betty, a Bluebell, is the shy one. They are settling in and the dogs are getting used to them; although Patrick has spent quite a bit of time sobbing outside the coop because he wants a 'closer' look.

Now to some of you hens may not be the most attractive creatures but they are brave and feisty creatures, very loyal to their family. And somebody else obviously appreciated these qualities; if you read the 13th Chapter of Luke's gospel you will read of Jesus' increasingly despairing lament over his chicks and he use the image of the hen attempting to gather her brood under her wings.

Jesus is warning of dangers and terrible changes – but instead of the chicks running for safety they are scurrying off in the opposite direction, taking no notice of the approaching danger nor of the warnings of the one who alone could provide safety.

Risking all Jesus brings the kingdom of God within touching distance of his people – within touching distance of Jerusalem but the city is not interested – because in the city is the fox – Herod – now maybe the odd chicken has tackled a fox – but on the surface who are most people going to bet on? The fox or the hen?

And maybe this is how we feel – this image of Christ as a mother hen is all very well – but there are so many foxes in our world aren't there? Our image of God may be fine when it comes to comfort and someone to talk to but how about protection?

How on earth is even the toughest of hens going to protect us? All the hen can do when the fox attacks is to fluff herself up and hope this is enough – enough for the fox to attack and kill while the chicks are protected.

It is so easy to lose confidence in God's willingness to protect us when we need protecting – maybe because that protection does not take the form we want or think is what we need or even deserve.

So we become like those chicks – scurrying about – running helter skelter to all kind of things we think will provide us with protection – all the temptations of modern life that provide instant comfort.

Or maybe we run to the dark corners of the yard – and just hide – not wanting to face reality – not wanting to tackle our problems because we think we are doing it alone. We forget the mother hen with that determination to protect even when the odds seem overwhelming, even when it means the sacrifice of her own life the mother hen will protect her brood.

JUNIOR CHURCH & JAM



September is the month we remember the Archangel Michael and all the other angels God sends; here is a simple idea to make an angel for yourself. You will need paper or card, half a kitchen roll, glue and any bits of glitter or shiny things you have for decorations

1. Choose some paper for wings – and draw round both your hands – these will make two angel wings.
2. Wrap some white paper round the cardboard tube and glue in place, make hands out of small bits of card
3. Glue the wings on the back
4. Using more card or paper draw a circle for a face and decorate with a smiley face, make hair out of more paper or you could use wool.
5. You can make a halo and decorate your angel as you like.



ST. MICHAEL AND ALL ANGELS

September 29th is the feast day of St Michael and All Angels. Michael is an archangel, whose name means 'who is like unto God?' He makes various appearances throughout the Bible, from the book of Daniel to the Book of Revelation. In Daniel, he is 'one of the princes' of the heavenly host, and the special guardian of Israel. In Revelation, he is the principal fighter of the heavenly battle against the devil.

From early times, Michael's cult was strong in the British Isles. Churches at Malmesbury (Wiltshire), Clive (Gloucestershire) and Stanmer (East Sussex) were dedicated to him. Bede mentions him. St Michael's Mount in Cornwall was believed to commemorate a vision there in the 8th century. By the end of the Middle Ages, Michael had 686 English churches dedicated to him.



In art Michael is often depicted as slaying the dragon, as in the 14th century East Anglian Psalters, or in Epstein's famous sculpture at Coventry cathedral. Or he is found (in medieval art) as weighing souls, as at Chaldon (Surrey), Swalcliffe (Oxon.), Eaton Bishop (Hereford and Worcester), and Martham in Suffolk. Michael's most famous shrine in western Europe is Mont-Saint-Michel, where a Benedictine abbey was founded in the 10th century. The 'All Angels' bit of this feast-day was added in 1969 when Gabriel and Raphael were included in with Michael.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Harvest Services will be held in both churches during October and, as in previous years, we shall be supporting the "Porch Box Project" which provides basic goods for people at a time of crisis. Why not add a few extra items to your weekly shopping so that you can make a real difference to a disadvantaged family or individual?

Dry or tinned food goods, toiletries, and items such as nappies for babies will be greatly received. In addition any gifts of flowers will be distributed to sick and housebound people in the community. Envelopes will be provided for people to make gifts to Christian Aid which brings relief in the poorer parts of the world.

Creator God, you have generously blessed us with an abundance of gifts in this, your world. Help us to share in that generosity by living in a way that ensures that your gifts will continue to be available for future generations. We rejoice that, as human beings, we have been created in your image and likeness. But we also recognise that humanity alone cannot adequately reflect you. BACK TO CHURCH SUNDAY 2012

Back to Church Sunday started in Manchester in 2004 and since then it has gone from strength to strength as each year it has gained more churches and more people returning to church. But it could not work without the people on the ground, the ordinary parishioners like you, who gather their courage and ask someone to go to church with them.

"Back to Church Sunday is a fantastic opportunity for us to grow the church. We know there are at least 3 million people in England who would come back to church if they had an invitation. And we know there are hundreds of thousands of Christians who want to invite their friends."

This year we will not be making quite the big splash that we have tried in previous years but we can still do something – we can all make that effort to ask someone to church on September 30th. Perhaps a good start is to think about why you come to church; what is it that gets you out of bed on Sunday morning and down to church? Is it the worship? Is it the friendship? Is it guilt or is it thankfulness? If you know why you go it will be that much easier to 'sell' the idea to someone else.

Here are some comments from 2011:

- I was thanked for sending the invite and told, "I have wanted to come back for some time and this just gave me the nudge I needed."
- "She wouldn't let me not come! I really enjoyed it. Now that I'm back I will keep on coming"
- "If church is as good as this every week than I'll be back." He has been every Sunday since.

Here are a few tips from the Back to Church folk about making newcomers welcome on the 30th (and, of course, every Sunday)!

1. First impressions matter. Let's be friendly! Smile!
2. Help people feel at ease. When you see someone arrive whom you don't know, go over and introduce yourself by name. Tell them where the tea and coffee are, where the loos are, and perhaps explain about the loop system for hearing aids. If they have young children, reassure the parents that it is okay if their child makes noise or wanders around.
3. Don't talk funny... Some of our churchy phrases might mystify a visitor – if they ask about any aspect of the service, explain it in simple English.
4. But do talk....! especially at the end of the service. Don't leave guests lonely on their own, while you talk to your friends!
5. Feed them. After the service, it would be great to have a selection of biscuits on offer - if you could volunteer to do any baking for this, please let us know!

In both our churches we already make an effort to welcome people – we are friendly folk – but it easy for us to forget how nerve-wracking coming into a strange church can be. Even people who are used to church feel nervous when going into a new one (and that includes clergy)!

You may have been going to church for so long that you cannot remember what it was like when you first arrive but if you think about other places you have been that got the butterflies going it might help you imagine what someone feels like...

PRAYING TOGETHER

When Bolton footballer Fabrice Muamba collapsed millions of people prayed for him; many of them people who would not consider themselves people of faith but something prompted them to pray. And thankfully prayers were answered and Fabrice recovered.

Most people do it at least once in their lives. Many people do it daily. And this year, more people than ever will be doing it together as well as individually.

Prayer is making news. Headlines on the front page of The Sun mean people are talking about prayer and expecting God to answer.

Jesus taught his disciples to pray and from Friday to Sunday, 7-9 September, Christians all over the UK will be using the prayer Jesus taught, as they all pray together, wherever they are: 'Our Father...your kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven'. Things will culminate in the Global Day of Prayer, on Saturday 29 September when thousands of Christians will be praying all together at Wembley Stadium.

A recent study of 800 Christians in churches across England has found that nearly 62% of Christian couples pray together on some basis, and 63% pray with their children. As for a parent praying FOR their children, the study found that 42% of parents pray frequently for their children, and 40% of parents just sometimes. How often are you praying for your children?

The Bible promises us that prayer is well worthwhile: "The Lord is near to all those who call upon him, to all that call upon him in truth.... he will hear their cry." Psalm 145




