

The last time I wrote the monthly letter I began with these words...

Well, it's a month since Ian left, a month since we began the interregnum and what an 'interesting' month it has been. We began with a meeting with Archdeacon David who outlined what we had to do, in what seemed a frighteningly short timescale, to start the process of finding our new vicar.

And now we just have a few weeks until Dave and his family arrive to start their life with us and I am wondering just who is the most nervous? Them or us? And how long it will take to just become *us*? Well, having met Dave now I am pretty sure it won't be too long at all. He seems a pretty decent bloke – down to earth, with a good sense of humour and a genuine interest in working with others.

Dave is an experienced priest and certainly knows what it is like to move into a new parish – he knows what to expect – and he knows too that people are not always realistic about what the vicar can achieve. Because people do expect an awful lot from "the vicar"; in fact some folk seem to pretty much expect perfection and when perfection is not produced they are not one bit happy. However, I don't *think* Dave is perfect – we can ask Linda – but probably even she would not claim perfection for



him. And let's be honest, not many of us would claim to be perfect either so we should get along pretty well. And we will have to get along, not just because it makes life pleasanter but because we have a lot of work to do <u>together</u>. And if we are not going to work together with Dave he might as well stop decorating the vicarage now! Back in October when we started putting together our Benefice Profile to try and attract the "right" person we had to describe the priorities for the Benefice and specify the qualities we needed to help us meet these. We soon realised that as far as mission went, we had lost our way a little so we certainly needed someone to help us get back on track. Now, although I suspect we have the very person, we cannot – and we must not – expect Dave to do all the work. In fact we should not expect him to even do most of the work. It is down to every single person who calls one or both of our two churches 'home' to work alongside our new vicar to get the job done. Everyone. No matter what age, sex, experience, length of service, theological (or other) understanding – everyone has to work – together.

The priorities we decided on are:

- Developing a vibrant and <u>inclusive</u> ministry for children and youth
- Extending care to the disadvantaged
- Working in partnership with the community
- Opening <u>all</u> our doors

Basically it is about working <u>for and with</u> other people – which, when you think about it, is exactly what Jesus did and it is exactly what he told the disciples to do. It will not be easy but together we can change our churches and our community for the better. And in doing so maybe we can change ourselves for the better as well.

I started with a quote from my last letter and I will finish with another – because I think it still applies:

But we <u>all</u> need to spend time searching for God's will for how our resources and energy should be channelled and directed and we all need to put God's love into action.

May God bless us and go with us as we journey into our future. Yours in Christ, Elizabeth

Our meetings in April focused on some of the many projects that Manchester Diocese Mothers' Union supports.

Lynne Longworth, the Hospital co-ordinator showed us the range of knitted and sewn garments that are much needed by our local hospitals. She told moving stories of how much the memory boxes mean to bereaved parents and inside each box there is a small white blanket, organza pocket, card and knitted teddy bears. Hearing of the need for these items touched many of us.

She also told us of the 'Fish and Chip' babies in Africa. These infants are sent home from hospital wrapped in newspaper as their families cannot afford suitable clothing and the babies need protection from the hot sun in the day and extreme cold at night. This project aims to provide colourful knitted blankets for these children.

As I write we look forward to a practical evening on 17th April when we can spend time together making some of these much needed garments. Please ask me for a copy of the patterns if you would like to help in this way.



On April 6th we held our Malawi M'mawa coffee morning. This was to raise money to support the Literacy and Financial Education programme working in Malawi, Burundi and Sudan. The Isle of Man Mothers' Union pledged to raise £14,000 in response to their Government's commitment of £28,000 to this project and Manchester Diocese Mothers' Union offered to help them. Our Branch was magnificent with their response to this challenge and produced batches of biscuits, colourful cupcakes and superb sponges. Freshly brewed coffee accompanied these delights and we welcomed many neighbours, friends and family to share our morning. Together with a Bring and Buy sale we raised nearly £450 for this worthy cause.

We are eagerly awaiting our day in York for the Commissioning service for Barbara Taylor as Provincial President in York Minster. We have the coach booked but there are plenty of spare seats and tickets for the service can be obtained so please do contact me if you would like to come. We will meet at Christ Church at 7.30 am, having a comfort stop en route and lunch is booked for 1.30 pm. This will enable us to look round the Minster after the service. We leave York at 4.15pm

Pentecost occurs this month when we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. For many people it is classed as the birthday of the church and the start of the church's mission to the world. It occurs fifty days after Easter, hence the name derived from the Greek for "pentkoste" meaning fiftieth.

It coincides with the Jewish "Festival of Weeks" which was a harvest festival called Shavuot and it was probably this feast which the disciples were celebrating when the Holy Spirit descended on them.

After the death and resurrection of Jesus, the disciples were no doubt dismayed, perplexed and afraid for the future. We have to remember that they were mainly not well educated people and they had lost their leader in a way that must have seemed very hard to understand.

They were gathered together in one place when suddenly there was a sound like a rushing wind from heaven which filled the whole house in which they were sitting. They saw what appeared to be tongues of fire that separated and came to settle on them. All of them were changed dramatically – they began to speak in other tongues and the many people present heard them in their own languages. Through the power



of the Holy Spirit they were given the gifts and the strength to continue Jesus' mission with enormous consequences for them and for the world.

Like them, we can receive the gift of the Holy Spirit to strengthen us in our work for Jesus.

May the boldness of the Spirit transform us, the gentleness of the Spirit lead us and the gifts of the Spirit equip us to serve and worship Christ now and always. As promised in the April magazine I recommend another book to you by Revd. Una Kroll.

In this book she writes about the Prayer of Intercession and its cost.

Sunday April 7<sup>th</sup> may well have been designated as "Low Sunday" in the church calendar but at Christ Church it was certainly a "High Day".

Over 180 people gathered in church to witness Arthur Smith receive his British Empire Medal from the Lord Lieutenant of Greater Manchester, Warren J Smith. The Mayor of Bury, Cllr Joan Grimshaw and her consort, husband Paul, were also in attendance.

The citation which had been sent to Buckingham Palace was read out by Canon Paul Denby and this recognised Arthur's involvement and commitment to church music at Christ Church over 78 years. It also stated how he had encouraged people in their Christian faith through music and been a wonderful example of Christian commitment himself.

As you would expect Arthur was humble and took the proceedings in his stride; in his speech thanking everyone for their support over many years and for attending on the day. Among the congregation were people who had been in the choir many years ago and friendships were revived at the reception after the service.

A collection taken during the service raised £1400 towards the repair of dry rot in the church and to this was added a further  $\pounds$ 600 donated by the Lord Lieutenant from his charity fund. It was a heart-warming and joyous occasion and the church community is proud of Arthur and his achievements. It is typical that when someone remarked to Arthur that it was a special day, his response was "Well I would have been here anyway!"




