

WORDS FROM A NEW VICAR

May I first of all say that we have been delighted with the warm welcome we have received since we moved into the Vicarage. Thanks for all the cards and good wishes. Linda & I look forward to meeting as many of you as possible over the next few weeks and months.

We have not moved far - only from the Parish of Stoneclough on the border between Bury, Bolton & Salford. Prior to that I served for 14 years in the Diocese of Blackburn. My curacy was in Morecambe and then I spent 10 years as a Vicar in two parishes in Preston.

I was born in Fleetwood and grew up in Blackpool, where my parents and sisters still live. That is the reason for my lifelong support for Blackpool Football Club. I also enjoy playing cricket as well as listening to music and reading.

I am perfectly happy being called Dave! Vicar is my title, and it is an honour to be called to serve God in this way. But Dave will do fine and indeed is preferable as we seek not only to be servants of the Saviour but friends also.

We feel privileged to be with you in the benefice and are excited about sharing our Christian pilgrimage together. Please pray for me as I am licensed on 3 July and for my inaugural service the following Sunday. You will all be in my prayers.

The Prime Minister announced in early June that the next Bishop of Manchester would be the Rt Revd David Walker, currently Bishop of Dudley.

In a reflection written following his appointment he wrote,

"I ask the people of Manchester to hold me in their prayers as I prepare to take up my new role here.

This will be for me a coming home. I am very much of Manchester. This is the diocese where I was born, baptised, brought up and where I went to school. This is where I rebelled against my Christian upbringing in my early teens, and where I found a new and living faith in Jesus Christ shortly before going off to university. I'm not a great one for family trees, but such ancestors as I know of all came from this part of the country. I was raised on the tales of the Peterloo massacre, the Rochdale Pioneers and the Industrial Revolution. I'm not going to pretend that after 30 years away I understand Manchester as well as those who have lived here through that time, but Manchester has always been in my blood and I can guarantee to bring with me a passion to serve its people and its Christian communities, who after all served me throughout my childhood.

His reflection, which sadly is too long to print here in full, moves on to a hope that he will be a Bishop with and for Manchester, and ends,

I know that when I come I will find myself alongside many others who are striving by God's grace to be "of", "with" and "for" your churches, parishes and neighbourhoods. Together we will engage in the tasks that are set before us: to grow God's church, to serve our communities and to determine the patterns of ministry that will best fit us for both those tasks. I'm both thrilled and humbled to have been invited to take up this work with you."

Dave is to be instituted/inducted/licensed on the Feast of St Thomas - 3 July, so here is a little about the disciple also known as 'the twin' - Didymus.

St. Thomas was a Jew, called to be one of the twelve Apostles. He was a dedicated follower of Christ but somewhat impetuous.

He is best known as 'doubting Thomas' because of his initial response following the Resurrection of Jesus. A week later he was privileged to see the Risen Christ and given the evidence he needed. However, although initially sceptical, he was then the apostle who made an early public profession of his faith, in the words, "My Lord and my God."

Thomas is also mentioned as being present at another Resurrection appearance, when the disciples had a miraculous catch of fish after they obeyed Jesus's instruction to cast their nets on the other side of the boat.

Earlier in the gospel story Jesus wished to visit his sick friend Lazarus and we hear that Thomas encouraged the others to return to Judea with Jesus, despite the hostility with which he was likely to be met. It is Thomas who says, "Let us also go, that we may die with him."

At the Last Supper, when Jesus told his friends that he was going to prepare a place for them, it was Thomas who pleaded that they did not understand, resulting in Jesus's wonderful assurance that he is "the Way, the Truth, and the Life".

Tradition says that Thomas travelled as far as India spreading the Good News.

This story, from one of the team, Mark Wood, appeared in the latest SP newsletter.

"One Friday night we were walking along when a young couple walked towards us. As they approached we heard the woman giving her man a right earful. "I can't leave you alone for a minute, all you want to do is fight, you're going to end up back in prison." As she was speaking another man walked up to them and without warning punched her partner in the face, he fell to the ground with his attacker now on top of him, grabbing hold of his victim and the attacker was banging his head against the pavement.

As a team we stepped back paralysed for a moment as events unfolded right in front of us; thinking what can we do. Then as quick as a flash I felt prompted to shout at the top of my voice "In the Name of Jesus stop fighting." To everyone's surprise (including my own) that is exactly what happened. The aggressive man stopped his attack instantly and then made the sign of the cross. This moment of pause gave me time to put my arms around him, telling him to be on his way, at which he ran off, giving the rest of us a chance to help the injured man. Another modern day Samaritan story."

Not everything the Street Pastors do is so dramatic - often it is helping by calling a cab, picking up broken glass so it cannot be used in a fight, and so on. This may not be 'your thing' - but do please pray for those who are giving up their time for this work. This coming August, Addie and Barbara Redmond who have been street pastors since 2010 have booked to attempt to climb Kilimanjaro, in Tanzania. *Kilimanjaro is also known as the "roof of Africa" and is the highest free-standing mountain in the world.*

Addie and Barbara said
'this is a big challenge for us
and so we thought we would use
it to try and raise some money
for two organisations
which we are involved with'.
