Summer Sun Makes You Feel......

The sun is out, the sky is blue. By the time you read this, summer may well be over and our summer clothes packed away again for another year. We will be back in our jumpers, woolly socks, trousers and thermals, not that some of us (well me) have taken any of the above off yet!

It is that time of year when there are lots of things changing. The garden looks good, it is a lot of hard work, but the flowers and God's creatures who call in make us smile. People, if fortunate enough, are going on their holiday, but if not then just sitting in the back garden or back yard makes us feel good. Children are allowed to play out later. Even I have taken Milo, our dog, out for a walk. Schools and colleges are now on holiday, no more Monday morning assemblies until September and I am missing the children already.

There is one thing that doesn't change though; it is almost a tradition for me. The summer clothes don't fit, so off I toddle to the nearest diet club. By now you would have thought I had got the hang of this healthy eating.

I turn up all keen and excited about how I'm going to stick to it this time, how fantastic it will all be, how I'm going to change and, also, how I'm going to be the next 'Slimmer of the Year'. I stand on the scales, in hope that it won't be that bad, but disappointed in myself again. Then it struck me.



Our faith is a little like a slimming club. You only get out of it what you put in. You have to be persistent and constant in what you do for things to change and become better. You have to put good things in to get good things out. In our journey with God, we will only get out of it what we put in. When I was made a Deacon in Manchester Cathedral in 2010, I promised to be dedicated in prayer, reading, learning, reflection amongst a number of other things. These were promises, not just for myself but for the people I serve. If we want to keep building our relationship with God, these should be the promises that we all keep, even if at times it feels hard or impossible to do so.

It is easy in the business of life to sometimes forget and 'put it to one side' or put it on the 'to do later list.' But it doesn't take much to say a prayer. Spending time in prayer can be done 'any time, any place, anywhere'. Spending time in study, however you do it, helps each of us in our relationship with God and it is that growing relationship that feeds us. The more we put into the relationship, the more we will get out of it. The more that we can share in it, the more we are doing the job that God has called each and every one of us to do. He gave us all gifts we must all use those gifts.

Things are changing. Soon, the Diocese will have a new Bishop of Manchester. In our parish we have a new Licensed Reader in Darren and a new Vicar in Dave.

May we all walk together, Lay, Licensed and Ordained, to grow together, to support each other, to help our community to grow, and to make changes helping relationships with God to prosper. Remember, God continues to change us, let us be ready for change.

- Thank you for the welcome we have received and for the many prayers and good wishes especially after Wednesday's induction service at Christ Church.
- I am the first Vicar to be appointed to this joint benefice at the start of their ministry here. Both parishes have equal status and will be treated the same.
- Both parishes will remain separate and distinctive but we will share things as appropriate – whether that be in ministry, socially or in administration.
- THERE IS NO AGENDA TO MERGE THE PARISHES OR CLOSE A CHURCH
- I am a people person. I am most comfortable in working alongside people especially in times of need. I believe in the importance of the occasional offices – baptisms, weddings, and funerals as a vital part of the church's ministry. I believe in parish visiting.
- It is important to use our spiritual and material resources as we look to fulfil the diocesan vision of Growing Congregations, Serving Communities & Increasing Giving.

 I look forward to sharing this ministry of spreading the Good News of God to the communities we serve, with you all. Let us work together - in harmony – within our two parishes and beyond. There is great potential here. Let us pray that God will guide each one of us to be labourers in His Harvest.

ST JOHN WITH ST MARK PCC MEETING OF 20 JUNE 2013

Geoff chaired the final PCC meeting before the arrival of our new Incumbent Reverend Dave Thompson. The majority of our meeting was used to discuss and organise the final arrangements for Dave's Induction service at Christ Church Walmersley on 3 July, and his first service of Holy Eucharist at St John with St Mark the following Sunday. Geoff talked us through the structure of the two services and the details for the rehearsal.

Other issues included the latest plans for the 100 Club. A volunteer has now offered to run the Club and it is therefore hoped to commence in September. More details are available from Church.

It was advised that this year's Summer Fair made just over £1400. The Treasurer gave us an insight into how this has compared with previous years and produced an informative graph, which showed some interesting variations over the last 10-15 years.

Elizabeth also made an appeal for help with Baptisms at 12.30pm on Sundays. Duties would include meeting and greeting, handing out service cards, and generally helping to tidy up after the service.

NB. Since the meeting an appeal has been put on our weekly pew sheet and a number of volunteers have come forward to help.

Next PCC meeting for St John with St Mark is planned for Thursday 25 July.

Christ Church – Highlights from meeting on 16 July

This was Dave's first meeting, chaired by Barbara Silvester. We welcomed Vanessa Lay and Geoff Stokes to their first meeting.

The Treasurer gave his monthly report. There is concern that planned giving is slightly down and rental income has fallen compared with 2012. The Repairs and Renovations Fund now totals £10,134, benefitting in June from donations in memory of Stan Parkinson.

Repairs to the dry rot will commence as soon as the faculty is received. Alternative actions are being considered for the replacement of the broken stained glass window. We have a list of work needed to the church building and surrounds which could be completed by volunteers. *Please contact Ian Riddick or a Warden if you would like to find out more.*

Bury Council has announced that there will be a Non Statutory Open Enquiry to be held on 19 and 20 November, to consider the application for Village Green Status. This has no legal status but is chaired by an independent inspector who will make a recommendation to Bury Council.

Six members of the congregation have responded to last month's appeal to assist with the Porch Boxes collection at ASDA.

The PCC agreed to the request from the Fundraising committee to finance a concert by the Royal Regiment of Fusiliers on December 14th.

August 24th is the date on we remember this saint.

Bartholomew is mentioned in the synoptic gospels as one of the apostles of Jesus. It is thought that this is his family name meaning "son of Tolmai". In Saint John's gospel he is known as Nathaniel, his personal name. His friend Philip told him that he had found in Jesus, the Messiah.

Nathaniel was sceptical saying "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said "Come and see." Nathaniel was sitting under a fig tree in Cana when Jesus came to him and Nathaniel immediately recognised him and followed him. (John 1 vs 43 – 50) He was there when Jesus appeared to disciples by the lake after the resurrection and when the apostles met to choose a replacement for Judas.



Tradition tells us that he preached the Gospel after the Ascension in North-West India, and afterwards in Asia Minor, and that in the end he suffered martyrdom in Greater Armenia. Some say that he was crucified, others that he was flayed alive. He encouraged many to follow Jesus.

Almighty and everlasting God, who gave to your apostle Bartholomew grace truly to believe and to preach your Word: Grant that your Church may love what he believed and preach what he taught. Amen
