Isn't it amazing what collects in the back of cupboards and drawers. Recently we have been trying to reduce the amount of "junk" which has accumulated around our house. The house has eaves below the roof and these have been superb storage spaces over the years. So many things have been put in there "just for

time being" and have stayed for years. In fact there were some boxes put in when we moved into the house thirty two years ago that have never been emptied.

We have had some marvellous finds - old pantomime scripts which brought back wonderful memories of eighty youngsters on the stage at Christ Church singing a song entitled "John Clegg, John Clegg lend us your big car" to the tune of Widecombe Fair. I am sure that Health and Safety would not allow so many children on the stage now.

Of course we found boxes of photographs and laughed at the images. Did I really wear skirts held out by paper nylon underskirts and yes, there was a time when my hair was a dark brown colour. There were hats, paintings, battered board games, a banjo, some very old walking boots which were so

heavy I would not be able to lift my feet off the ground nowadays, two chamber pots, a host of ornaments and a suitcase full of table cloths and other linen which had never seen the light of day for twenty five years.



As all these treasures emerged, we had to decide what to keep and what to let go. I made Alan promise that the phrase, "It will come in" would not be used. We had to decide what was important - what we could not live without, and what was less important. It has certainly made me realise what I value.

The exercise made me think what is important and what I value in my Christian and church life. I value the opportunity to worship but I am not so much concerned about where or even how. I am equally happy in cathedrals or small chapels, in large congregations or with a few people. I am very happy with modern language in worship but would hate to throw out all those lovely prayers from the past, some of which are to be found in this magazine.



The people who accompany me on my Christian journey, those who have encouraged and supported me over many years are very important. And what a joy it has been to make new friends as our two parishes have come together.

Prayer, the Bible probably, no definitely, a modern version would certainly have to be kept and most importantly I treasure the knowledge that nothing can separate me from the love of God in Jesus Christ. That passage from the letter to the Romans would certainly have to be kept.

The Booth Centre is a day centre that offers activities, advice and support to homeless people in Manchester. Based at Manchester Cathedral — although soon to move to new premises nearby - they provide education, training and advice to enable people to find new homes, improve their health, increase their skills and confidence and to successfully resettle in the community.

Over 170 people regularly use the centre each week, 98% of whom have been homeless. As cuts in services and benefit reforms begin to affect more and more within our local communities that number is expected to increase.

Every weekday morning the centre café opens up at 9am to welcome people straight off the streets, offering a warm and safe environment. There is also the opportunity for help and advice on a range of subjects including health and housing.

ST JOHN WITH ST MARK PCC MEETING

This was our first meeting with new Incumbent Dave, and the highlight of the meeting was his report to the PCC. Dave reported on the following issues:

50th anniversary ~ Next June will be the 50th anniversary of our Church Building and it is hoped that a special weekend will be held over the weekend of 6-8 June 2014. Dave suggested several ideas, including a possible concert, flower festival and special service on the Sunday. This will now also be the weekend of the Summer Fair. An appeal for memorabilia is likely to be made over the coming months. Dave also reminded us that 2013 is the 175th birthday of the Christ Church Walmersley building and events would be held later in the year to mark this milestone.

Saints Days ~ It has been noted that attendances at Saints Day services have sadly dropped over the last 12-18 months and as we have worship on Sunday, Wednesday & Thursday we should celebrate these occasions on the nearest day when we already worship. There was a mixed reaction to this item and therefore other options such as hosting the services in people's homes could be considered. It is likely this will be reviewed in due course.

Vocations ~ Dave made the PCC aware of the various ministerial vocations that were available to us.

Our Child Protection Officer Pam also attended the meeting to advise us of concerns she had regarding new procedures which have now been introduced. Dave will take these questions back to the Diocese. Other issues raised included updates from the 100 Club and the decorating of the Chapel, which has now been completed. Thanks to Ray Smith & John Brennan for this work. An appeal is also likely to be made for help with maintaining the Church Hall hedgerows following a query raised at the meeting.

The next PCC meeting for St. John with St. Mark will be on Thursday 3rd October however a joint PCC "half day" has been planned for Saturday 14th September at St John the Baptist, Bircle.

Week Two - General Thanksgiving

Almighty God, Father of all mercies, we thine unworthy servants do give thee most humble and hearty thanks for all thy goodness and loving kindness to us and to all men.

We bless thee for our creation, preservation and all the blessings of this life; but above all for thine inestimable love in the redemption of the world by our Lord Jesus Christ: for the means of grace, and for the hope of glory.

And, we beseech thee, give us that due sense of all thy mercies, that our hearts may be unfeignedly thankful and that we shew forth thy praise, nor only with our lips but in our lives; by giving up ourselves to thy service and by walking before thee in holiness and righteousness all our days, through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom with thee and the Holy Ghost be all honour and glory, world without end. Amen

Week Three - The Venite

O come let us sing unto the Lord, let us heartily rejoice in the strength of our salvation. Let us come before his presence with thanksgiving and show ourselves glad in him with psalms. 





ST JOHN WITH ST MARK OPEN GROUP

A well attended Open Group on 10th July welcomed back Ian Banks to give another of his popular talks, this time on 'The Origins of Nursery Rhymes'.

Ian explained how many nursery rhymes have been argued to have hidden meanings and origins, although on little or no evidence. Many ideas suggest links between rhymes and historical persons or events and were used as a form of propaganda or protest rather than being simply written for entertainment.

Research shows rhyming songs originated in Saxon times and then began to be recorded in 16th Century English plays, but most nursery rhymes were not written down until the 18th century.

Many of our rhymes we know today that we have said or sung to our children and grandchildren were originally known as lullabies to help a child go to sleep. Some of these were said to be originally associated with the birth of Jesus. It is strange that events in history are still portrayed through children's nursery rhymes when for most of us all of these historical events are long forgotten!

A talk by Pam Kojder entitled "School Day Memories"

Thank you to Margaret Schofield for bringing these words she found in St. Brelades church at St. Brelades Bay in Jersey whilst on holiday there. Many of you may already know this prayer but it is good to be reminded of it.



Searching for more information I found these words to be part of a popular prayer attributed to St. Patrick who wrote it in 433 AD for devine protection before successfully converting the Irish King Leoghaire and his subjects from paganism to Christianity.

More recent scholarship suggests its author was anonymous. In any case this prayer reflects the spirit in which St.Patrick brought Christianity to Ireland.

St. Patrick's Breastplate

Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stanger.



I do hope some of you have been able to obtain a book by Una and I am sure, if you have read any, you will have found them challenging and very imformative.

This month I recommend another book by Una - "Vocation to Resistance" and I quote from the book,

"Many Christians live in societies pervaded by evils that have become so familiar they go unrecognised. Materialism, individualism, lack of respect for human dignity, addiction to work, over-exposure to noise, environmental exploitation and territorialism afflict most of the industrial countries of the Western hemisphere, and prevent us from living fully human lives. How can we resist such evils and live in keeping with our baptismal vows?"

Writing from the perspective of the solitary, Una argues that prayer is the key. Each chapter begins with a human story that illustrates its theme. Una then reflects on what scripture, reason and tradition have to say about the situation. She concludes each chapter with suggestions of some positive and practical ways by which Christians can pray and change their own ways of living.

The book illustrates clearly how ordinary Christians living quiet lives of prayer and testimony to their beliefs can help to stop the destructive forces at work in the world".

Extract from a magazine of 1883

"The Consecration of our new church took place this day (September 19th, 1883). The church at the morning was well filled and a large number of clergy assembled to do honour to the occasion. The Lord Bishop of Manchester preached. 160 people sat down to luncheon. Tickets were 3/6d. The church at Evensong was completely filled."

The Church cost approximately £5,500.
