St John w St Mark

We are approaching harvest time again and yes it's crept up on me again as it does every year. I am, like a few of you probably are, still running round doing many things at once and losing track of time and where in the year we are. The gift of a good summer this year has particularly helped me to lose track of time and the seasons. But then I was asked to do the October letter and fell back to the reality of the seasons with a bump.



October, that's autumn running into winter, another year gone by in a flurry, another harvest service and time to think about what we have and who we are. And that's what I would like us to do after reading this letter. I just want us to stop and slow down a while, whilst we reflect upon the harvest time and what it means to us today and thank God with all your heart.

In years gone by, people celebrated the harvest season after the crops had been gathered in, with a hope that there would be enough food to carry them through the winter season. A failed harvest then truly meant a strong struggle through the winter or perhaps death. My own family has Irish ancestry and people will know of the failure of the potato harvest, where people starved and were thrown off their own lands and were displaced and had to find shelter elsewhere.

These days though, harvest and its meaning has changed and its importance can sometimes seem confusing. A failed crop to us might make prices higher and be very bad for the farmer involved.

There is a good chance though that we will survive the winter and that the shops will still have a good supply of food. Maybe, just maybe, that's why I don't hear us thank God as much as we used to do because we do have things like food, shelter and many more to add in this country; we have a good life so we don't thank God as much as we should. So this harvest I want to tell you about my little shop I part own in Lahore and its owner Tahir.

Tahir is a good man with a family and a small shop with little stock. He manages to make enough money to eat most days, but not always. The trouble is he can't get enough money to buy more stock for a better life and to eat. A better life in Tahir's eyes is just to have a meal everyday. This is where I helped. I have helped him to stock more goods, whilst he feeds his family on what sells. Now the shop is stocked, they eat everyday and the extra stock allows him to make enough money to live at the poverty line as opposed to the starvation line. Tahir thanks God at every meal and everyday with all his heart for all he has.

So I want us to reflect upon Tahir and what he can teach us about being thankful for at harvest time.

We might complain food has gone up again and we can't stock the fridge as much, Tahir will say thank God we are eating again today. We complain about gas and electricity prices, Tahir will say thank God my candles lasted the night. We sometimes worry or complain at kids running round making noise. Tahir thanks God when his children do that they have survived another day.



I'm sitting in a warm house writing this letter whilst my hot Sunday dinner slowly cooks. The children are watching a film together on the couch with Amanda and I think of Tahir and his family all those miles away a trying to scrape a living and I feel tears in my eyes. This man with nothing thanks God with every ounce of his being for everything he has.

We live in a good and relatively safe country. I want us to become more accustomed to thanking God for what we have and how good our lives are rather than complain at what we don't have. Thank God at this harvest time for what you have and remember those who have nothing and pray for them.

The celebration marking the 175th anniversary – the dodsranbicentennial! – of the creation of the parish of Walmersley, takes place at the end of this month with a special service at Christ Church on Sunday 27

October. Our guest preacher that day will be our patron the Revd. Dr. John Findon. The service will be followed by drinks and a big birthday cake.

Everyone is invited - especially those with a connection to the church - baptism, wedding, choir, Sunday School, Rose Queen, to mention but a few.

We hope that this will be a special day commemorating this event. If anyone has any memorabilia of previous Christ Church activities, please consider lending them to us for a display of parish history. Please spread the word and make this a united village occasion.

In 1838 the parish was formed by sub-dividing the ancient, larger parish of St.Mary's Bury. A church was built beside what was then the 'new' road but in 1883 the present church was opened.

There will be no 10.30am service at St.John with St.Mark's that day and the congregation there are being invited to join the celebrations at Christ Church.



The Messy Church service on Saturday 5 October is a new venture in the benefice and will hopefully attract a good deal of interest. At present the plan

is to stage this event bi-monthly, with further services on the mornings of Saturdays 7 December and 1 February. Please see the information elsewhere in this magazine.

- * A reminder that next year marks the 50th anniversary of the consecration of the church building in Sunny Avenue. The then St.John's Church was dedicated for service on 6 June 1964 by the Bishop of Manchester, Dr.William Greer. To mark this occasion we are planning a special weekend of events culminating with a celebration Eucharist on Sunday 8 June 2014. The new Bishop of Manchester has agreed to attend this service. There will not be a 10.30am service at Christ Church on that day. Please put these dates into your diaries for next year.

On Saturday 14th September, just over 20 members of both PCC made the trip to St. John's Bircle for our annual PCC away day. Today was Holy Cross Day, and Dave led us in a brief morning prayer to celebrate this day followed by an informative meditation on the cross, and different cross designs.

The main business of the day was to discuss a Mission Action Plan, which was a theme from the September issue of the Crux magazine. This activity was devised to allow us to see how we imagine our church to be over the coming years, and how we intend to reach our intended aims.

A number of topics were discussed, in particular around the work with children and young people and their families, and how we could retain young people beyond early teenage years. It was also agreed that there was scope for extending our ministry in residential and care homes, in particular Limefield Court, and also at our Friday Lunch Clubs.

Other business matters included a discussion on a children's ministry statement and an update on our joint magazine. An appeal for further help and support with the magazine is likely to be made. We were also given news on the forthcoming Messy Church activities, further details on which can be found in this magazine.

The meeting closed at 12 noon however some members stayed behind for an enjoyable lunch in the nearby Church Inn.

The PCC of St John with St Mark has not held a meeting since that reported in last month's magazine.

The PCC of Christ Church met on September 14th

It was reported that estimates for the repair of the broken window had been received and discussions were underway with the insurers.

Members were reminded of the Open Meeting on November 19/20th at which the proposals for the designation as Village Green status of the church field will be heard.

The special service to commemorate the 175th anniversary of the parish was discussed and it was proposed that a service of Holy Communion would be held at 10.30.a.m. and the congregation of Saint John with Saint Mark be invited.

The PCC was informed of the proposal to introduce "Messy Church" on the first Saturday in October.

It was agreed that the PCC would request someone to inspect the trees on its property to ensure that they were sound and in good condition.

Mr Barry Evans has agreed to act as Health and Safety Officer for the church and the PCC acknowledged this with thanks.

It was announced that work on the dry rot outbreak would begin shortly and that it was likely that services would have to be held in the church hall. (This work has now begun and unfortunately another outbreak has been discovered in the roof of the organ loft which is currently being treated. During the work a list of organ blowers in the late eighteen hundreds has been found inscribed on a wall behind the organ)

HARVEST FESTIVALS - Sunday 13th October



Most countries celebrate the bringing home of the harvest – a time for celebration and thanksgiving. Celebrations have in fact been held since pagan times. Several religious festival, such as the Jewish Sukkot have their origins in this opportunity for thanksgiving.

Do come to our services (starting as usual at 10.30 am in both churches) to reflect on, and give thanks for, all that God has provided for us. As always we will be mindful of the work of farmers, fishermen and all those who ensure that we have food on our tables.

There will be contributions from those who have shared in Messy Harvest on October 5th as that too will be an opportunity to give thanks for God's goodness to us.

As in previous years, in both churches we will be supporting local charity **Porchboxes** project. This provides immediate crisis support to the most vulnerable people in our community. It relies very much on support from local churches at Harvest time in order to help build up stocks of foodstuff. Tins and packets of dry food are especially useful. (these are welcome all year round too.)

At Christ Church we will hear about the work of **Tearfund** and how they are working to establish self-help projects both overseas and in the U.K. which aim to give hope and a better future for the poorest communities. Envelopes and literature will be available in church from 6th October.

Also at Christ Church we shall be taking **gifts of small plants or flowers** to members of our parish who are sick or housebound.

Miriam Hamilton would be pleased to be given the names of any who should receive such a gift, preferably **BEFORE** Saturday 12th October; and if anyone who could help to take them out after the service, then please let Miriam know.



October 18th is the feast day of Saint Luke; he is regarded as the patron Saint of artists, physicians, surgeons, students and butchers.

Saint Luke is one of the four gospel writers. He also wrote the Acts of the Apostles which describes the activities of the disciples after the death and resurrection of Jesus. It is thought that originally both books formed one single literary work.

He was a physician born in Antioch in Syria. He was not an eye witness to Jesus' life but he became an apostle of Paul and later followed Paul on his missionary journeys until Paul's death. This is indicated in the last chapter of the Acts of the Apostles were Luke uses the word "we" indicating his presence with Paul in Rome.

From his writing it is obvious that he was an educated man and was highly regarded as an historian, giving clear facts and dates. His gospel is the only one to describe the birth of Jesus; without Luke we would not have knowledge of the annunciation or the presentation in the temple. The gospel contains some of the great parables missing in the other gospels, such as the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son. Luke was a great story teller.

He portrays the humanity and the compassion of Christ showing that Jesus was concerned for the poor, the sick, the suffering and the sinful. His gospel gives emphasis to prayer, miracles and angels. Women are given an important part in his writings.

Luke served the Lord all his life. He was unmarried and had no children. He died in Boetia aged 84.

The Prayers of Jesus




Our meeting on Oct 16th is entitled 'Bits and Bobs' and we are being shown how to make little gifts by recycling older items.
