## A Period of Reflection

On the 6<sup>th</sup> of November I walked into Tesco at about 9pm to discover that Christmas had arrived. Poor Guy Fawkes was still warm in the embers of the bonfire and there to my horror was a massive Christmas tree and Christmas musak assaulted my ears. Seven weeks of unnecessary commercial activity had commenced and still 4 weeks away from Advent let alone Christmas. Each supermarket striving to get the edge on the others. But since they all do it all that happens is we consumers get sick of it. How far in advance do you need mince pies and all the trimmings?

It is a pity to rush so quickly into Christmas. Some people get going so early that by boxing day they are fed up with it and Christmas gets packed away. The church, in its wisdom, has a period of reflection before Christmas which strangely, as we are preparing for a new beginning, focuses on the end times. This season in the Church's year places heavy emphasis on Christ's second advent, when he will come to judge the quick and the dead, as the prayer book puts it. It is a season where churches, in contrast to the world outside, remain stark the only decoration being a simple Advent Wreath, each candle lit on the succeeding Sundays in Advent leading up to Christmas. We reflect on our mortality, and the stark reality that whatever apocalyptic events may occur in the world and the cosmos, we know for certain that our own "personal apocalypse" is at hand: our own death and judgment.

Advent is a time for us to reflect on our human destiny, as we look forward to the coming judgment, to that time when the King will return to set all things right. Fitting therefore that Advent follows on from what we now call the Kingdom season. Fitting also that Advent marks the beginning of the churches year.

It is a good time to reflect on the gravity, the weight of that glory that will be revealed to us in the Heavenly Kingdom and that is revealed in the coming of Christ then, now and in the future. Its beauty is not a sentimental one, but something like the awe we experience when we contemplate massive wonders of nature like the Grand Canyon or a high mountain. Anyone who has ever experienced such a sight will feel that any sense of their own importance is dispelled immediately.

Which is a good place to start as we prepare to come before that little scrap of humanity, the Christ child, who incomprehensibly is both God and human. Who is both saviour and judge. That little babe who will grow up to be the greatest teacher the world has ever know, the man who is revered by so many of the world religions. The King who reigns above to whom every knee shall bow and every tongue confess to be Lord of all.

For many years I have been interested in the American tradition of shape-note singing. The hymn Idumea, composed by Charles Wesley, provides a challenging reflection on the Advent season's contemplation of our human destiny and the coming judgment. For me it captures the essence of what the Advent season invites us to do i.e. wake up from our spiritual lethargy, and be mindful of our end.


And am I born to die?

Because of me you're celebrating, lighting up the tree.


Because of me there's carol singing, crackers, fun and spree.



live in herds and nurture their young so well and look after each other's young too. A good example of parenting which Mothers' Union is passionate about.

Cath, our Diocesan President, told us about a project to be started in 2014 called "Just Up Your Street". After identifying needs it can be seen where Mothers' Union can help and make a difference. On visiting Collyhust she met Revd. Sian Gasson who attended the meeting and gave us much to think about as she shared stories of the deprivation and the needs in that part of Manchester.

- "What does spirituality mean to you?"
- "What activity has developed your relationship with God?"
- "Who or what was involved?"

**SPIRITUAL** The meeting was interwoven from start to finish with prayers, led by Revd. Sandra Kearney, Chaplain for Salford Archdeaconry.

The Open Group welcomed back Carol Hartley on 6 November to talk about her work in providing Shoeboxes for the poor people of Romania. Carol has been travelling to Romania for many years and has seen and experienced the extreme forms of poverty that large scale social deprivation and mass unemployment bring, with many families and children struggling daily to find food, clean water and suitable clothing.


Carol explained that through the work of many aid agencies, things are now slowly improving and the group saw a large collection of photographs of people and places that Carol has been involved with in helping and supporting towards a better quality of life.



The Shoeboxes collected in the annual Christmas Appeal provide these families and orphaned children with small gifts that they can open and enjoy on Christmas Day. 
