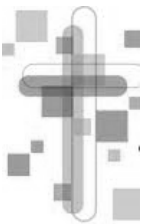
Happy New Year!

This is possibly ringing in your ears as you get January's magazine, but hold on; it's still Christmas - well until January 6th and the Orthodox church hasn't even celebrated Christmas yet!



What's the rush? No wonder those of us over 60 (and perhaps even younger) wonder where the years have gone! It's as if some frenetic madness has overtaken all our lives, and if you can't keep up "It's sorry but get out of the way." We see it in all walks of life, more and more being pushed onto workers no matter what, a feeling that we are no more than a commodity to be discarded or replaced if our batteries run down (a bit like a Christmas toy that broke on Boxing day)

Thankfully for us God doesn't see us that way, we are his creation, and he delights in us and in our company. "Oh" I might hear you saying, "But I don't have time to go to church on Sunday, I have the children to take swimming, then the supermarket, then visit mum....." Hang on, who said being in God's company had to happen in church and only on a Sunday? I've not found that in the bible so far.

Let us try to make a New Year's resolution that we will keep and in the words of the psalmist David

This year sees the 50th anniversary of the consecration of the current church building at St.John with St.Mark's. We are having a number of celebrations on the weekend of June 6-8, with the Bishop of Manchester attending the service at 10.30am on that Sunday. If anyone has any memorabilia about the history of St.John's Church building, please let me know and we can begin to arrange a display in preparation for this weekend.

NEW BISHOP

The Right Revd David Walker was installed as the 12th Bishop of Manchester in a special ceremony at Manchester Cathedral on Saturday 30 November.

Previously Suffragan Bishop of Dudley in the Diocese of Worcester, Bishop David was brought up in the Manchester area and on the morning of his enthronement, attended a service of Communion at St. George's, Mossley – the church where he was baptised 57 years ago. The theme of his first sermon as Bishop of Manchester was "It's good to be home".

One of the most moving parts of the liturgy was the following conversation with a young person at the beginning of the service as Bishop David requested entry to the Cathedral.

Young Person: *We greet you in the name of Christ.*

Who are you and why do you request entry?

Bishop: *I am David, a servant of Jesus Christ, and I come as one seeking the grace of God, to travel with you in His service together.*

Young Person: *Why have you been sent to us?*

Bishop: *I am sent as Bishop to serve you and all people in the Diocese, to proclaim the love of Christ, and with you to worship and love Him with heart and soul, mind and strength.*

Young Person: *How do you come among us and with what confidence?*

Bishop: *I come knowing nothing except Jesus Christ and Him crucified, and in weakness and fear and in much trembling.*

NOTES FROM THE COUNCILS

ST JOHN W ST MARK PCC MEETING OF 5 DECEMBER 2013

Our main topic of discussion was surrounding the work with children & young people. Our Child Protection Officer Pam attended the meeting to highlight the amendments made by the Diocese this year. Due to changes in the processing of DBS applications - in that they now have to be processed electronically - it has been agreed to purchase a laptop and Broadband facility within the Vicar's Vestry for the purpose of this job. The proposal is that the Laptop can only be used by Pam, and potentially a deputy and the usage will be restricted solely to the Vestry. This will be done as soon as possible.

Still on the subject of young people, Janet shared with us the positive news that we have almost been accredited with our Child Friendly Church award following a visit from Steve Dixon on 27 November. There are a few minor things that need to be addressed, such as the need for a fire drill for young people however we are now almost there!

As we are now approaching the end of the year, it was time once again to discuss our charitable giving. As with previous years, it was agreed to support 10 different charities ranging from overseas mission, relief & development and UK mission & secular by donating 10% of our previous year's planned giving. A discussion followed as to which charities we support with some PCC members nominating charities they have a personal interest in.

There were also brief updates on the 50th Anniversary preparations and on the recent bible studies, which were appreciated by those who attended.

Our next PCC meeting will take place at St. John with St. Mark School on Tuesday 14th January, which will begin with a tour of the school at 7pm.

The Bishop attended a service of collective worship and then enjoyed a buffet lunch with staff and governors. He complimented the school on its diversity and community cohesion, mentioning that its 17 different nationalities resembled the United Nations! It was a pleasure to have such a distinguished visitor in the school and it is to be hoped that a link with a primary school in the Lahore Diocese can be established.

The school choir attended the Christmas Fair at St.John with St.Mark's Church on November 30th. They performed the special anniversary song written by a staff member Miss Geelan.

The next meeting of St.John with St.Mark's Church's Parochial Church Council will meet in school on 14 January. This will give the opportunity for PCC members to have a look round the school before the meeting of the council.

Your gifts are gratefully appreciated and will bring a smile to a child's face this Christmas.



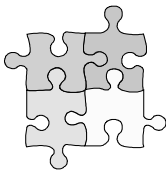
CHRISTINGLE

Since joining the group we are happy, we work together, we sell pineapples and other vegetables. Now we have the skills, we can nurture our children and bring up our children in the right way."

Fairtrade is about better prices, decent working conditions, local sustainability, and fair terms of trade for farmers and workers in the developing world.

Fair trade is an organized social movement and market-based approach that aims to help producers in developing countries make better trading conditions. By paying a slightly higher price in the shops the producers and growers can receive a fair price for the produce.

Fairtrade goods are available in all supermarkets and other shops. The list of fairly traded goods is ever increasing, with items such as bananas, honey, coffee, oranges, cocoa, cotton, dried and fresh fruits and vegetables, juices, nuts and oil seeds, rice, spices, sugar, tea and wine able to be bought.

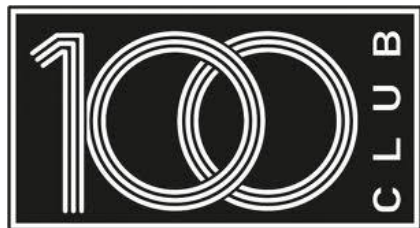
