

For the last 18 months I have been saving for my 60th birthday; every £2 coin I get goes into one of those money boxes that you have to smash to get at the cash (I'm not daft)! It's getting fairly heavy — very heavy in fact and there are still another 18 months to go. Still it is a landmark and it will be lovely to have "a bit of a do" as I have every other decade.

At the moment, however, I don't need to wait for a decade to arrive as my life seems to be full of landmarks. In a few weeks I will start my new job as Head of Library Services and I am looking forward to it very much. Undoubtedly it is going to be a huge challenge particularly in this time of cuts; I will need a pretty big moneybox to solve this one! And, of course, I have another challenge ahead — another landmark in my life. As I write I am still not sure where I will be going when I leave the Benefice but I expect to be hearing very soon.

Strangely, or perhaps naively, I am not at all nervous about either of these challenges because I am confident that in both cases I am doing the right thing and that I will be the right person for the job. Maybe I won't be the right person immediately but, with God's help, I will become the right person. So, no worries there, but what about being the right person for all the other parts of my life – and what about you being the right person in your life as well?

There are times in our lives, for instance when marriage is on the cards, when we are very concerned with finding the right person. Finding Mr or Miss Right seems to be an all-consuming passion for some. There are other times too, my lovely lodger Glyn left just before Christmas (he found his Miss Right) and I am contemplating whether or not I should look for the 'right' person to share the house with me and the boys.

The trouble is we spend so much time and effort on finding the right person – or at least someone near enough for us to knock into shape that we forget about ourselves. It's very hard for someone to be the right person if the person they are being so 'right for' is not making much of an effort. Perhaps the answer is to stop looking so diligently for the right folk and make do with the ones you have?

When Jesus looked for followers any fool could see he picked a most unpromising selection. Somehow he must have thought that there was something there, or, perhaps he just thought "they'll do"? Still, he did have the distinct advantage in being the right person himself and things worked out. The encouraging thing about his choice of the first disciples is that all we who have followed, no matter how unlikely, have been given the chance to be the right person.

As my time in the Benefice comes to an end I have been reflecting on all the folk who have been the 'right person' for me. I am not going to name them — too long a list. Some of you might recognise a time when you did something that helped me with my journey of faith but probably most of you will never have even realised the difference you made to me; perhaps that is how it should be? Being the right person is sometimes just being there and we can all do that can't we? So thank you for being there for me and allowing me to be there for you.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCILS

ST JOHN WITH ST MARK PCC MEETING OF 14 JANUARY 2014

Our first PCC meeting of 2014 had a slightly different setting in that it was held at St. John with St. Mark primary school, our Church School on Athlone Avenue. The evening began at 7.00pm with a tour of the school. I was unable to attend this first part but did get a look around the entrance & reception, and was amazed how different this area looked from when I was there. It was over 20 years though!

There were cakes and drinks available for our meeting which began just before 8.00pm in the staff room, and our 2 main topics of discussion were our parade services and the 2013 draft accounts.

It is felt that our parade services may need to be looked at and Paul has put together a revised draft order of service for use on these occasions. Various suggestions have been raised, including the greater involvement of the younger people, music provisions, improvement of the sound system and the possibility of some Parade services being held in the Hall. It was proposed that a separate worship committee be put together to look at these options and any comments be brought to the Clergy. The committee would then feed into the PCC.

Ian our Treasurer also provided us with an informative overview of the 2013 draft accounts and discussed with the PCC the income and expenditure for the last year. He asked to us to think about the budget for 2014 and advise of any potential expenditure for this next year which has currently not been budgeted for.

There were also regular updates on our 50th anniversary preparations, Child Protection and the Child Friendly Church award.

Our next meeting is back in the familiar setting of the Church Hall Library on Thursday 20th February at 8.00pm.

Have you taken your Christmas decorations down yet? If you did not manage to get them packed away by twelfth night then they should remain in place until February 2nd or candlemas. At least that is what legend says.

In pre-Christian times February 2nd was a pagan festival being half way between the winter solstice and the spring equinox, the middle of winter. People also said that Candlemas day determined future weather.

If candlemas day be fair and bright, Winter will have another fight. If candlemas day brings cloud and rain Winter won't come again.

In the western Christian calendar candlemas is the feast of the purification of the Virgin Mary, forty days after the birth of Jesus and also the feast of the Presentation of Christ in the temple. In the Jewish tradition, for 40 days after the birth of a boy and 60 days after the birth of a girl, women were considered to be unclean and could not worship in the temple and the purification enabled them to return to worship.

It was also the tradition to present a child in the temple and in Saint Luke's gospel we hear the story of Jesus being taken to the temple where Anna and Simeon recognised him and Simeon said "Mine eyes have seen thy salvation," the words we now know as the Nunc Dimittis.

More recently it was the time when the candles to be used in church services were blessed and for us it is a time to remember that Christ came to be "a light to lighten the Gentiles and the glory of thy people Israel."





Child Friendly Church Award for St John with St Mark's Church

It has been a long process! We went through self-evaluation, reflected on what we did, what we needed to do, how we were doing things and also to carry on the positives but look at how to improve. On the 27th November 2013, we had an interview with Steve Dixon, the Dioceses Children's Officer.

We discussed our evaluation with Steve and, I can assure you, he challenged us and did not give us an easy time. He advised us of the further necessary requirements and things that we still needed to do for our application to proceed. The outstanding matters were taken back to the PCC, discussed, taken up to be reviewed, actions taken and agreed.

At this point we still needed a children's mission statement. This was to be discussed at the joint Benefice PCC as it was to be a statement that was to cover both of our churches. The mission statement was agreed on 17th December 2013. I messaged Steve Dixon on 18th December, confirming our actions on the outstanding requirements and they had been acted on, and put into place, and also sent our Children's mission statement.

Steve messaged me on the 19th December to say he was pleased to confirm that he agreed with our application and that he would now ask for our Award Certificate to be signed by Bishop David. Although this is to be presented to us at our celebration service on the 8th June 2014, when Bishop David is with us, we are allowed to use the award from 19th December 2013.

This is a great honour for St John w St Mark to have been awarded the CFC. It is through the hard work of everyone who puts in the time, effort, enthusiasm and dedication to the work of, for and with our young people. It is a privilege for me to work and walk alongside this team of people who give their very best. So, thank you Nicky Kelly, Kelly Watson, Pam Kodjer, Revd Elizabeth Binns, Caitlin Cowan, Stuart Ashworth, Darren Dunn, Keith Duckworth (H&S rep) & Vicar Dave.

The CORE Skills course for Children's Work covers six basic topics to encourage and en-skill those who work with children on behalf of the local church in a variety of settings. But further topics are covered in "More Core Skills" and we are offering a special **one day training event** which will give you the opportunity to engage in these further issues.

The day will offer four workshops (of which participants will be able to choose two) along with a plenary workshop session looking at the latest safeguarding/child protection advice.

The day will take place from 9.15am to 3.15pm on Saturday 1 February 2014 at

Heaton Moor United Church, Stanley Road, Heaton Moor, Stockport, SK4 4HL.

The cost for the day (covering resources and costs) is £5 per person (payable on the day but booked in advance). Drinks will be provided, but please bring your own lunch.

a full programme will be sent to all applicants

Session 1. Choose either:

- Working with Special Needs Children: aims to develop a knowledge and understanding of children with disabilities and explore ways to make all activities accessible, inclusive and welcoming
 - Challenging Behaviour: aims to explore issues around challenging behaviour and to identify mechanisms for dealing with it constructively.

Session 2. Choose either:

- Children's Advocacy: exploring the role of advocacy in children's work, the balance between advocating for the child and enabling the child's own voice to be heard and questioning the role of the 'children's advocate'
- Young Leaders: aims to explore issues specific to young leaders in the 14-18 age group, emphasising their unique and valuable contribution to and leadership team, encouraging reflection and developing practical skills.

Session 3:

Good Practice and Safeguarding: to bring participants up to date with the latest information and guidelines in Good Practice.

FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT 2014

February 24 - March 9

Fairtrade is about better prices, decent working conditions, local sustainability, and fair terms of trade for farmers and workers in the developing world.

Fair trade is an organized social movement and market-based approach that aims to help producers in developing countries make better trading conditions. By paying a slightly higher price in the shops the producers and growers can receive a fair price for the produce.

Fairtrade goods are available in all supermarkets and other shops. The list of fairly traded goods is ever increasing, with items such as bananas, honey, coffee, oranges, cocoa, cotton, dried and fresh fruits and vegetables, juices, nuts and oil seeds, rice, spices, sugar, tea and wine able to be bought.

More than 1.2 billion Fairtrade bananas are now sold in the UK each year. That is one in every three bananas we buy.

In 13 years that is great progress but there is still a problem and we need to

act now to deliver a fair deal to all banana farmers and workers.

Christ Church Walmersley Tennis Club

During the autumn of 2013 following several years of being in a dormant state CCW Tennis Club decided to call it a day and close down.

Christ Church Walmersley Tennis Club was formed over eighty years ago in 1929. In its heyday the club had over sixty members and very successfully competed in the local tennis league as well as being a major social attraction for many in Walmersley.

In recent years it became difficult to maintain membership and there was an increasing fight against continual vandalism of the courts and the facilities. A fatal blow came when the tennis club hut was burnt down in 2009. With the passing of Mr. Stan Parkinson in 2013 the club lost a major driving force and the remaining committee members agreed that the time had come to officially close the club - a sad but inevitable event.

In accordance with the club constitution, the club funds, which totalled just over £4000, have been transferred to the church and placed in the Repairs & Renovations Fund. The club facilities had been covered by the church's insurance and when the hut burnt down the claim monies (£5000) were set aside by the PCC to help in any rebuilding. In the event the only call on these monies has been some re-fencing of the courts. The remaining monies are now released by the PCC into general funds.
