## ***A Pilgrim People***

---

November can be a bit of a drab month as we stride into winter. We have lost the colours of Spring, Summer and Autumn as the last leaves have fallen from the trees. Also during November we come to the last four weeks of the Church's year. By the end of the month we will reach Advent Sunday, the start the new Christian year.

These four weeks are often called the Kingdom Season and we liturgically have a final burst of colour as we change from green to red. It is not really a separate 'season', like Epiphany or Lent, but it feels like one and is often treated as one.


A favourite image of the Church is of a pilgrim people and throughout the Church year we travel with Jesus in the readings, sermons and prayers. We witness the birth of Christ, we listen to his teaching, we are there at his execution, and we celebrate his resurrection.

Everything we've worked for throughout the year is now coming to its conclusion in the Kingdom Season. This is when we come to understand what this has meant in the lives of Christian men and women throughout the ages.

November starts with All Saints' Day, then All Souls' Day (to commemorate the faithful departed). During the next three weeks 23 Christian monarchs, priests, teachers of the faith, or mystics are remembered by name in the daily offices. The final Sunday celebrates Christ the King. God's work is completed and we wait for the New Kingdom to be revealed in all its fullness.

Look at the altar frontal and the priest's stole. These will be red, to signify the work of the Holy Spirit.

Listen to the Collects and Post Communion Prayers. They speak of an 'eternal and glorious kingdom', where 'the whole created order [will] worship at his feet', of us being 'knit together in one fellowship', of us 'coming to share the joy of heaven' and 'the heavenly feast' prepared for us there.



Although winter seems to be the end of something glorious the Kingdom season reminds that something better is on the way. Through winter we look forward to the snowdrops and crocus peeping their heads into the early year sunshine. And so it is with our spiritual winters we wait as St Paul tells the people of Rome for the coming of God's Kingdom when "creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God"

## FROM THE VICARAGE

---

\* November is very much a month of remembrances.



It begins with the season of All Saints' Tide featuring both All Saints' and All Souls' Days. All Saints' Day celebrates the men and women in whose lives the Church over the centuries has developed its witness to the work of God. All Souls' Day offers a thanksgiving in a more local and intimate way by allowing us to remember with thanksgiving, those we have known more directly – those who we love but see no longer.



Our All Souls' Service for the Bereaved - at which individual names will be read out - takes place at St.John with St.Mark at 3.00pm on Sunday 2 November.



A week later Remembrance Sunday is an important occasion in the life of our nation as we recall those who have died or are still suffering from the effects of war. This year of course, there is added poignancy because of the centenary of the outbreak of World War One.

Towards the end of the month, we remember that Jesus - the Son of God – came to this earth to establish a New Kingdom with the Sunday before Advent known as Christ the King. In fact the whole month is known in the church calendar as the Kingdom Season.

\* Thanks to all those who prepared both churches for the Harvest Festivals on Sunday 12 October and to the catering team for the splendid lunch afterwards. Also to those who provided food for distribution in the area.

Scarce heard amid the guns below.


We are the Dead. Short days ago

## ***The Lych Gate, War horse – What's the link?***



In 1914, workers, and management and the owner's son from Joshua Hoyle's mill in Summerseat enlisted to serve in the First World War. Six horses belonging to the family were also sent into service in the war.



This left my grandfather who was coachman to Joshua Hoyle without his beloved horses.

Decisions were taken and my grandfather was sent along with other coachmen, to Longbridge car factory to watch his new charge, an Austin car, being made.



He laughed in later years about the last stage in the process – learning to drive the car! The group were taken into a field, the instructor stood with coachman's whip in the centre of a circle of new cars and new drivers giving orders.

Not horse whispering but car whispering! New technology but old working practices.

The horses went to the Western Front and never returned. The mill owner's son, Humphrey King Hoyle, went to Gallipoli where he was killed in the first day of action. He is commemorated in the lych gate at Christ Church.

Helen, along with her dedicated staff, shared a vision for the future not only amongst those at school but in the wider community and with other colleagues looking to re-build the area.

It's a spectacular story of success and with so many different activity groups held at the school for all ages, the community has a sense of purpose and can look forward to a fulfilling future. At a recent Ofsted the school gained Outstanding in all areas. We were inspired and humbled by Helen's story and what is possible if communities work together for the same aim.





Pam Hoyle gave us a fascinating culinary tour through the Jewish festivals and how special foods and dishes are linked to each festival. So many of our celebrations have of course their origins in the Jewish festivals but the traditional food was not as familiar. We tasted delicious Lamb Kofta's, Gefilte fish balls, Almond cake and Honey cake which Pam had so kindly prepared for us.

In memory of his mother Sybil Mills, her son, Roger, very generously invited the Branch to join together for a buffet meal at the Lord Raglan. 




