We are looking towards to the Harvest season. Farmers will be reaping the seeds that they planted earlier in the year. Seeds which were planted and have been tended, nurtured, watered, cared for and had sunshine on them will, hopefully, have grown and developed into a good crop.

So, as a parish, one of the things that I feel we can look back upon with pride is our Child Friendly Church award. The teams that worked towards obtaining this had to bring together the basics. The ground work had to be done to prepare the way forward, to see what was already in place, what had to be put in place and what still has to be done to help develop a new way forward and develop a new generation of growth in our churches. What we plant in our young people today will help them to be our church, not only of today, but of the future.



Every seed needs to be nurtured. It has to be given the chance and the freedom to grow. This is no different to how we should be treating our young people. They too need to be nurtured and given the freedom

to grow. If we want our churches to grow we need to work with our young people. They need to be given a voice and to see that they are respected and being listened to.

It is believed that churches where children are well represented are twice as likely to grow compared to those where they are not. Church activities that involve young people correlate with church growth. If we have worship services designed for children, youth programmes, youth groups, uniformed groups and camps you are more likely to All our young people need is investment in see growth. Not necessarily financial investment, them. but time, involvement patience, support, and, importantly, understanding.

Unlike the farmer, or the gardener, we may not see the fruit of the seeds we have planted in our young people. But if we want to see the growth in our church today we have to plant for tomorrow. We have to plant our faith in our young people for a strong and good harvest for the future.

IN MEMORIAM: Mary Kershaw

Mary Kershaw died in Bury Hospice on Friday 5 September at the age of 93. Her connections with St.John's Church lasted for most of her adult life. All her four children – Ann, Peter, Judy and Jill - and several of her grandchildren have been married at St.John's either at its present site or on The Rock.

Mary grew up in Stacksteads near Bacup where she attended Tunstead School. After meeting Edmund (Eddie) at Bacup swimming baths at the age of 17, they married in 1942 whilst Eddie was home on leave from the Army. Eddie died in 2010 after 68 years of happy marriage.

They moved to Bury when Eddie got a job as a joiner in the town. They first lived in Taylor Street, then moved to Eastham Avenue, before their final move to Limefield Brow in the late 1980s.

At her funeral in St.John with St.Mark's on 12 September, Mary's eldest grandchild Mandy spoke of "A Nan in a Million". She had 10 grandchildren and 12 greatgrandchildren. Mandy recalled many times of happiness spent with Mary and quoted many other family members and their memories of this special lady.

A keen walker and reader, Mary could often be spotted at the Lido, Clarence Park or Bluebell Woods on her afternoon stroll. Mary & Eddie enjoyed an active social life involving ballroom dancing and happy times at the Lord Raglan and the Walmersley Conservative Club. They were committed to attending church and Mary received the sacrament of Holy Communion on a number of occasions during her final illness.

As Mandy said in Church: "Life will never be the same without her, but she leaves behind so many happy memories."

We give thanks to God for the life of Mary Kershaw. May She Rest In Peace and Rise in Glory. Do come to the special annual service in church (which starts as usual at 10.30am) to reflect on and give thanks for all that God has provided. As always we will be mindful of the work of farmers, fishermen and all those who ensure that we have food on our tables. We shall also be mindful of those who do not have food on their tables nor, indeed, a roof over their heads.

As in previous years we will be looking to support our local food-bank charity, Porch Boxes, who provide help to the most vulnerable people in our community. They rely very much on support from local churches at Harvest Time in order to help build up their stock. Tins and packets of dry food items are especially useful.

We will also be thinking about Christian charities such as Tearfund who work overseas and in the U.K. on projects which give hope for the poorest communities. Literature and envelopes will be available to enable us to give financial support to their work.

As we have done for many years past we shall be taking gifts of small plants or flowers out to members of our parish who are sick or housebound. Miriam Hamilton would be pleased to be given the names of any who you feel should receive such a gift, preferably before Saturday 11th October; and if anyone could help distribute gifts after the service then please let Miriam know.

Donations in support of all these harvest projects will be most welcome and will be taken up during the service. We look forward to seeing you there. Thank you. * The 2015 benefice diaries are now available. They will be given out free of charge but a donation of $\pounds 1$ is suggested if you wish to contribute in this way.

Christ Church PCC meeting 8th September 2014

Eleven PCC members were present. The field was discussed, the legal work to allow a sale of the field is still continuing and there are still several companies interested in purchasing the field. With regard to the church building and what is the vision for the way forward it was decided that the PCC would look at two alternatives, the first being modifying the existing church to be a more multipurpose building. The second was to investigate building an entirely new church.

Information was received from the Church Housing Trust and the Parish share for 2015. To date we have paid approximately half our parish share for this year.

Money has been received from the developers of the Spurriers site which has been allocated to purchasing new gates and fencing for Ackworth Street.

The PCC was again made aware that a new Treasurer will be required by the end of the year. The post does not have to be held by a member of the PCC.

The vicar proposed that a children's copper collection be introduced during the last hymn of the morning service.

The vicar reported that he had been informed by the police that someone was caught and imprisoned for the burglary last year when the stained glass window in the church was broken.

Reports and comments were made from the Pastoral, Church Hall, Fund Raising and Property Committees.

It was noted that the contract to rebuild the church wall in the graveyard extension had been awarded at a cost of \pounds 200.

ST JOHN WITH ST MARK PCC MEETING OF 4 SEPTEMBER 2014

The first half of our meeting involved continued discussions surrounding the replacement of our West Window. John Peat presented some architectural drawings of possible designs. There were 4 options prepared by John, and after a show of hands all members selected the same preferred design, and we now have a possible suggestion for the layout. Obviously, there is still much discussion to take place over the near future concerning this matter. Thanks went to John for the time he has given in preparing the drawings.

Another item for discussion was around a review of the Parade Services. Paul has now renamed the service sheet for these occasions "The Family Service", meaning that the 2nd Sunday of each month may not always be a Parade if the Uniformed Groups are closed, ie August. It has been proposed that once every quarter we would have a Non-Eucharistic service, however there would be an additional service of Communion on these days at approximately 11.45am for those who wished to attend Eucharist. We are also to experiment with a smaller nave altar at the September Parade service. It was agreed to seek feedback on these issues from our congregation following the service on 14th September.

Other Items:

To mark the end of our 50th Anniversary year, it has been confirmed that a Social evening will be held on Friday 5th December in the Church Hall. It is hoped that past clergy may be able to attend.

The Treasurer informed us our Parish Share has been reduced following the outcome of our latest income survey. Although this seems positive news, on the negative side this shows that we are not as wealthy a Parish as previous and therefore regular Church income may also reduce.

Dave advised us that the Bury Muslim/Christian Forum is hoping to arrange joint services and get-togethers around key dates and festivals in both calendars.

A Joint Benefice PCC away day has been scheduled for the morning of Saturday 31st January 2015, either at Bircle or All Saints Elton.

The next regular meeting will be on Thurs 16th October at 8.00pm.

The tower at Christ Church Walmersley is in urgent need of repair in several areas. The hatch on the roof has disintegrated and water has been entering the bell chamber for the last 2 years. We have had a survey done by a structural engineer and there are several areas from his report which need urgent attention if we are to save the tower. We cannot access the hatch to the roof which has disintegrated, because the ladders which gave access to the roof of the tower are now very unsafe and cannot be used.



We have requested a faculty for new ladders; these will cost \pounds 6,924 in addition to this we also need to enlarge the hatch between the clock chamber and the bell chamber at a cost which has yet to be determined. Once we have new ladders installed then the hatch at the top of the tower will need to be repaired, this requires new steelwork and then a new hatch system to be installed.

This is only a short summary of the amount of work that is necessary to save the tower and a display will be erected in church in September which will indicate the full extent of all the repair work that is necessary. If we do not carry out this work then the future of the tower will be in question as it is the main entrance to the church and we cannot continue to allow it to deteriorate as it may become a safety issue. Money is desperately needed as we do not have sufficient funds to carry out all this work.


Looking forward

The Metrolink Marathon

Every year Mothers' Union holds what has become known as `The

Wheels Appeal' to raise funds to help finance transport costs of those working on Mothers' Union projects in the poorest countries. This year as a means of giving a bit of a focus to local fundraising two members of Christ Church Mothers' Union – Barbara & Nigel Silvester – asked to be sponsored to travel the length and breadth of the Manchester Metrolink system – using their bus passes of course! They attempted, in one day, to travel from Bury and thence, in a clockwise direction, to every terminus on the system – and back to Bury. This would mean they would have travelled into the centre of the city and then out again on each arm of the network. Sponsors were asked to guess how long it would take – not counting time out for comfort stops!

The intrepid travellers undertook the challenge on August 22nd starting at Bury interchange at 9.30am. The time taken totalled 8 hours 13 minutes. Bob Taylor guessed the closest time with what must have been a very carefully calculated guess of 8 hours 20 minutes. His prize was a supply of....Wagon Wheels!

The total amount raised was £216. Thank you to all who supported this madcap idea. We do not intend to repeat this marathon ride – tram suspension, nor the seats, are as soft as you might think!! But it was an education in local geography. We now know where Freehold is – do you?

Christ Church is fortunate in being one of a diminished number of churches still having a workable "Ellacombe Apparatus". This apparatus was designed by the Rev. Henry Thomas Ellacombe (1790 – 1885) and was first installed in 1821 in the church where he was Curate-in-charge in Bitton, Glos. The equipment allows the change ringing of a set of bells by one person, and overcame the problem, common at the time, of "rumbustious and unruly" bell ringers. It also meant that the actual bells would remain stationary when being rung, unlike the traditional system where the bells are swung through 360 degrees, and are each controlled by one person.



The traditional system could also subject the tower fabric to considerable stress, especially with a heavy set of bells, with some towers actually moving heals are rung. Southwark Cathodral is a well known

when the bells are rung. Southwark Cathedral is a well known example of this. Having the Ellacombe Apparatus, Walmersley is spared this problem which, in view of the current state of the tower, is just as well.

When viewing the frame in the ringing chamber it will be observed the there are eight ropes in the frame fitted with "sallies" (hand grips) while on the pulleys, cross shaft above there are nine with the corresponding holes in the frame top and ceiling above. Wear on the "spare" pulley indicates that it has been used at some time. Confirmation of this was received from an ex bell ringing parishioner who rang with nine bells before "being called to colours", but only found eight when he returned to "civvy street". Does anyone know where the ninth bell went?



Some maintenance work is needed on the equipment which it will not be sensible to complete until there is safe access to the bell chamber. Several accidents, including two fatalities, in other churches have proved that vertical unguarded ladders are NOT SAFE! When remedial work is going on in the tower it would be sensible to make sure that the equipment is well protected.



My wife and I have fond memories of living on Old Lane and hearing the bells regularly on "practice night", as a tune was picked out, followed by a

guick change to a merry peal when the inevitable wrong note was hit!



I have a feeling that with the active "Junior Church" that the parish seems to be blessed with, there would be no shortage of "Junior Bell Ringers" to give Christ Church a voice again.

Near Neighbours is a project run by the Church Urban Fund designed to

bring people together who are neighbours in communities that are religiously and ethnically diverse.

The official launch for the Bury area took place at the Longfield Suite in Prestwich on Wednesday 9 September. A range of speakers from the Christian, Muslim and Jewish faiths spoke of the importance of communities working together.

The Chair of the Church Urban Fund, The Revd. Paul Hackwood described the work of Near Neighbours in three ways:

- * Building Relationships
- * Empowering People
- * Granting Money for Local Projects

The programme offers small grants between £250 and £5,000. These are designed to promote the aims of the Near Neighbours scheme and are provided by both Central Government and the Church Urban Fund. For specific information about the criteria required, please go to the website www.near-neighbours.org.uk

Examples of initiatives that are organised by this Project, include the following:

* NEHEMIAH FOUNDATION – providing and training faith based community organisers who network with organisations and individuals who work together for change in their neighbourhoods.

* THE FEAST – gathering together young people between the ages of 11-18 of different faiths and cultures to live well with each other and so breaking down relational barriers.

* CATALYST – developing and training young leaders from diverse communities through shared learning and team building.

Grants must be for the benefit of those who live or work in the ecclesiastical parish of St.John with St.Mark.

ST JOHN WITH ST MARK OPEN GROUP

On Wednesday 10th September the Open Group welcomed Pam Kojder in what was to be her final talk before moving to new surroundings in Cumbria. As a swansong Pam chose a theme which is so much a part of everyday life in Britain, namely "Time for Tea".

Pam described by illustrations, the history of tea, something that we all take for granted and might not stop to think about how a unique and fascinating plant from imperial China became the nation's favourite drink. Pam gave a potted history,

where according to legend the origins of tea could be traced back to 2737BC in China, and progressively through many centuries became firmly established as China's national drink by 618AD.



The roots of tea into Britain began around 1600AD by importers British East India Company employees bringing home gifts of tea. Consequently the marriage of Charles II to Portuguese lady Catherine of Braganza proved to be the massive turning point in the history of tea in Britain. Tea became a fashionable beverage for the aristocracy and wealthier classes, providing relaxation and pleasure.

Tea smuggling became widespread through the introduction of high taxes with great debate for many years until taxes on tea were finally stopped.

Pam brought along a wide range of tea samples with wonderfully exotic and dramatic names for members to sample.



Members were then invited to participate in a 17th Century "Tea Party" and experience how the aristocracy would enjoy such a time consuming, genteel occasion seen as a special gathering for the privileged few.

Pam proved to be the perfect host with her knowledge for such occasions. One could not imagine such an occasion happening in today's fast moving world of Wetherspoons or Costa Coffee!

As a parting finale Pam was presented with a plant and necklace from the Open Group and needless to say we all had tea and coffee with a light hearted chat on "milk in first or tea in first"!
