2015 marks 20 years since the Booth Centre was founded. Originally based at Manchester Cathedral, last year the Centre moved to Edward Holt House, Pimblett Street just off Cheetham Hill Road.

It provides activities, advice and support for homeless people. Still sponsored by the Diocese, the Booth Centre is hosting a 20th Birthday celebration on Thursday 21 May.

The open evening begins at 6.00pm and provides information about the work of the Centre. There will be musical performances, an art & photography exhibition and refreshments available. Volunteers and staff will be around to inform you of the vital role that the Centre provides in the City Centre.

The United Benefice of Walmersley Road supports the Booth Centre in a number of ways. We regularly provide donations of food and clothing and at a recent service at the Priory HighbankCentre, over £100 was raised for the work of the Centre.

CHRIST CHURCH MEETING HELD ON 25 MARCH 2015

A request from Mulberry Bush Nursery for parking in the Church Hall Yard was considered; this was declined as the church hall yard was used during the week.

A donation has been made for the Young Adults Mission. The book keeping is being carried out by a lady from St John's who has volunteered to do this. The registration of the small piece of land in the church hall yard is proceeding.

The Messy Church on 7th March was not supported. Messy Church will be taking a break. The Trinity Sunday morning service will be held as a café church in the church hall.

The kid's Rock group has moved to the Hark to Towler public house due to lack of local support in the community.

Canvassing support needs to be done to allow the continuation of the Toddler group as Six Town housing cannot continue to support it in its present form.

The ramp into church was discussed and the vicar requested that it be put out if possible at the nine o clock service and taken in after the 10.30 service.

It was determined that we needed to arrange for an electrical company to come and replace bulbs/lights that are not working in the church at high level.

The vicar would like to hold a joint PCC in the summer to consider Mission Action Planning.

A discussion was held regarding the church building, this followed on from a meeting with the diocese regarding the way forward. From this it was decided that we will carry out a community audit to determine the way forward. A meeting will be held in April/May with the diocese on how this should be done.

ST JOHN WITH ST MARK PCC MEETING OF 19 MARCH 2015

At our February meeting, it was reported that the DAC were unhappy with our proposals for the West window. The Vicar and Wardens have now met with the Architect Paul Vipond. A like-for-like replacement is required as the window is considered to be an architectural feature of the building. However we may be able to brick off the bottom tier of the window and leave the remainder in place. This matter now remains ongoing.

The 2 portable electric heaters in the Chapel have served their purpose during the Winter season, however we are looking to install a new permanent heater before Autumn 2015.

Paul advised that a meeting needs to take place soon to decide the dates of the Parade services for the next few months from September 2015.

An appeal has been issued for a group or team of people to help organize and run a firework party on Friday 6th November. The appeal has been issued early as this event has had to be cancelled for the last 2 years, as we have been unaware who is responsible for running it.

We are still requiring volunteers to run the Website and to fill the vacant position of Governor at our day school.

Ahead of the APCM on Sunday 19th April, we were asked to consider the annual PCC report. The report covers the key events that have occurred during 2014 across the whole life of our Church. The PCC were asked to spot any mistakes that needed correcting and to highlight any event that had been omitted. The Secretary also informed us of PCC members whose term of office is now completed. Feedback was given on the Lent Study Groups. A discussion took place as to why the numbers attending the Tuesday Evening group were disappointing.

As we take part in the General Election this week, we pray for all those seeking to serve the country in government, asking that they will always seek to serve the interests of the people rather than their own.



We remember those countries where there is no democratic mechanism to appoint leaders and where people live under dictatorships. In so many regions of the world there is constant strife and hardships and people live in constant fear often having to flee their homes and live as refugees. We ask God's blessing on all those who work to bring peace and safety in the war torn areas of the world.

Week Two

We pray for Christian Aid this week, asking God's blessing on all the fund raising activities which will provide help to the poorest parts of the world. We pray for Loko who lives in Ethiopia which is the focus of Christian Aid week this year.



Four times a week she makes a back breaking eight hour trip to collect firewood to sell in the market. "If I do not sell firewood my children will die" she says.

Let us remember as we provide for our children, how fortunate we are and give thanks.

Mothers' Union's mission and values state 'we will express our Christian faith in the transformation of families and communities worldwide, with members sensitively spreading the news of a God who loves and cares for us all'

At our AGM in April we had the opportunity to reflect on the past year - review what we did well and consider the future; to review last year with its theme of 'Sowing the seeds for the future'

Our branch meetings aim to strike a balance between social events and an opportunity to nurture our own spirituality. This project was our 'Just up your street' initiative.

Whilst our membership remains in good numbers we must not be complacent and we need to look for opportunities to invite our families, friends and neighbours to join with us. At a time when society struggles with identity and values, the Mothers' Union vision that God's love is shown through loving, respectful and flourishing relationships is so pertinent. We have a mission that our Christian faith is seen in action by the transforming of our communities.

The Mothers' Union has addressed such difficult topics as the sexualisation of children with the 'Bye buy childhood' report and campaign and the distressing reading about gender-based violence at home and abroad. Our organisation is involved with, and has a national and international voice regarding these hot topics of today's world.

At a local level there are ways we can support family life with course material for marriage, baptism and parenting skills. Maybe we need to consider if that is a way forward in our local community?

On 8th April the Open Group welcomed the return of Ian Banks to give an illustrated talk entitled 'Kings and Queens of England – An Interrupted History'. Ian gave an interesting illustrated introduction as to how during the period 11th Century to 15th Century (some 400 years) the 'Kingdom of England' was governed.

Ian described the 'Kingdom of England' as having in the early 11th Century being part of the 'North Sea Empire' ruled by Cnut the Great of Nordic origin. However many historic incidents and developments over the next 400 years led to seismic changes in how and by whom the country was governed. Examples being the Norman Conquest, bringing French influence with the Kingdom being ruled by the 'House of Anjou' and Angevin Kings becoming more 'English in Nature'. In due course the evolution of the English Parliament emerged and began to govern England. This led to the emergence of England as a massive military power in Europe. Other notable changes included the Black Death and the 100 Years War against France.

We were invited to participate in re-enactment of the roles of numerous English Kings progressively through time. This created a greater insight as to the treachery, skulduggery and even murders of the ruling classes in order to attain and maintain power in the Kingdom – hence the heading of Ian's presentation 'An Interrupted History'. Ian provided numerous books from the stock he manages (price 50p!) on the subject and also numerous books from his own collection for members to look at.

All in all a very interesting and entertaining evening was enjoyed by all. The group thanked Ian for the great deal of work in presenting the event. It left you with a feeling that although we might have our grumbles and problems we are in fact living in a more civilised society than our ancestors!

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK, 10th – 16th May 2015

Extracts from the Archbishop of Canterbury's recent letter:



"Christian Aid Week, held every year in the second week of May is an important act of Christian witness right across Britain and Ireland. It is a week when churches of all denominations come together and step out

into their local communities to support Christian Aid in challenging poverty across the world.

This year, Christian Aid Week confronts one of the greatest injustices of all times: discrimination against women. The statistics are shocking and Christian Aid's partners around the world are clear that it needs urgent attention. Half of the world's population are women and yet they comprise the majority of those living in poverty today. Despite the fact that women do the majority of the world's agricultural work, less than 20% of landholders globally are women. Around the world, women are paid less than men – in most countries, women earn on average only 65-70% of men's wages. At every level, from the household to the global stage, women are poorer, disadvantaged, more vulnerable.

Around the Anglican Communion, churches are responding to God's call to end oppression and suffering by working to lift women out of poverty and situations of abuse or injustice. Throughout the Communion, the Mothers Union works tirelessly on promoting women's literacy, economic development and leadership roles. Many of these worldwide initiatives are run in partnership with Christian Aid.

I could not believe that an illiterate and undermined woman like me could hold a pen and write. Now I can read posters, magazines, medicine prescriptions, calculate whether I am working for losses or profit. Before I buy products, I calculate first. Roda Jesus call us to love our neighbour and challenges any limit we put on who that neighbour might be. As Christians we believe that he means our global neighbour, not just those close at hand. Across the world there are around a billion people in extreme poverty – trying to survive on less than \$1.25 a day. God's faithfulness gives us hope that extreme poverty can be ended, that loving our neighbour is a sign of God's kingdom.

The movement to bring justice to the world's poorest people could not happen without the commitment of thousands of churches in the country. Please join us to pray, act and give for our global neighbour this Christian Aid Week – for a world that looks more like God's kingdom"

- 1. Baldingstone is so called because of the bare stone outcrops there.
- 2. The name of the mill near the old St Mark's church was Hudcar.
- 3. The post office was the site of the old toll house on Walmersley Rd.

- 5. Walmersley Road Methodist church and a chapel (Congregational?) were on the western side of Walmersley Rd.
- 6. Cob House Farm withstood a siege by Cromwell's army.
- 7. The sundial which stood outside the original hotel was later moved to the grounds of Bury Infirmary, later Bury General Hospital.
- 8. St John's vicarage in the period which included the period of Second World War was situated on Walmersley Road below the corner with Russell Street.
- 9. The former Children's Holiday Home was originally Birtle Edge House.
- 10. The workshop at Bevis Green was a smithy blacksmith and wheelwright.

Many thanks to Wendy Riggs (née Magnall) who phoned about the sign that used to be high on the wall of the Post Office in the days when her parents ran it. It said LONDON . . . miles (maybe 202). Evidently it had been overlooked in 1940 when the government ordered the removal of all signposts and street names as a precaution against invasion - although, in this area, the street names seem to have been left alone. Wendy said it was white and rusty so her father removed it. Some people agree, others think it was yellow, possibly an AA sign.

World Famous Bury Lych-Gate!

Some of you will recall the article in the Bury Times, earlier this year, featuring the lych-gate at Christ Church. The lych-gate has a particular significance at this time as we recollect the period of the Great War one hundred years ago.

On 7th May 1915, Second-Lieutenant Humphrey King Hoyle, 5th Lancashire Fusiliers, was killed in action at the Dardanelles, his first day of battle. His parents, James and Mabel Hoyle, gifted the lych-gate in memory of their son; the dedication, by the Rector of Bury, took place on 3rd February 1916.



Arising from the article in the Bury Times, the parish received an email from two grandchildren of James and Mabel Hoyle, now resident in Canada. An interesting exchange of information has ensued, adding to their family history, and knowledge of Christ Church, Walmersley.

On 7th May, a floral tribute will be placed in the lych-gate, marking the centenary of Humphrey Hoyle's death.

In hell there grew a Judas tree where Judas hanged and died, Because he could not bear to see his Master crucified. Our Lord descended into hell, and found Judas there, For ever hanging on the tree grown from his own despair.

So Jesus cut Judas down and took him in his arms; "It was for this I came," He said, "and not to do you harm. My Father gave me twelve good men, and all of them I kept, Though one betrayed and one denied, some fled and others slept.

In three days' time I must return to make the others glad But first I had to come to hell and share the death you had. My tree will grow in place of yours, its roots lie here as well, There is no final victory without this soul from hell."

So when we all condemn him as of every traitor worst, Remember that of all His men our Lord forgave Him first.
