They say a change is as good as a rest.

Having just celebrated Harvest, we are now in a period of waiting and change. We are waiting for Advent to start. This is a time of anticipation, waiting and change. I am waiting in anticipation for the change from serving in the UBWR Team to serving in the Roch Valley Team.

As I write this letter, it will be my last as a Minister in the United Benefice of Walmersley Road. It will be the last letter to my family who have shared so much of the past 15 years of my life. We have shared the ups and downs, the happy and sad times, the joy and laughter, but, most of all, my journey into ministry. You have walked with me and been my support.

Having a young family, working full-time, studying (virtually full-time) for three years, leading originally 3 services on a Sunday, often followed by a baptism and rounding off the day with youth group, was sometimes tough and tiring. After finishing my first 3 years of training followed by another 4 years of much of the same, whilst pulling together a portfolio which, in effect, was just like doing the first 3 years again! It was, at times, a tough and long 7 years.

Would I change any of it?

NO. I was chosen by God for this journey and life in ministry. He called me by name, I was His choice and I accepted.

So, what has my time as a minister meant to me? It has meant the world. For the support I have received. For the friends I have made. For the experiences I have been given. It has been humbling to walk alongside people, be on their journey with them, to serve people and to share the Eucharist. Being part of the family of this United Benefice has been a privilege.

I am especially proud of the children's work and all the people who give 100% time and effort, often with little thanks or acknowledgment. Thank you to all those people, and please, keep up the fantastic work you all do. This



was my initial ministry here and I make no apologies for the stance I have made for our young people. They are our future today and deserve to have a voice.

I pray for the future of the benefice as it moves forward. I pray that you support Vicar Dave as he leads the benefice, which may include changes. I pray for all those who minister in the benefice that their journeys may continue to flourish.

I will always be thankful and humbled for my time here. I will keep you all in my heart and my prayers. I do leave this benefice with a heavy heart as it has given me so much. I hope that I have given, even if it has just been a little, to you all in return.

All my love, prayers and blessings go to each and every one of you.

Journeying with the Church Year

The four weeks prior to Advent are known as the Kingdom season – and they come at the climax of the Church Year. All that we celebrate from Advent – Trinity focuses on Jesus and his God-given power to re-shape human life for good. This is his King-ship over all.

The kingdom season begins with the celebration of All Saints, remembering God's holy people across the ages. This concept of remembering continues with Remembrance Sunday – a very significant day in community and church life in across the country. The pinnacle of the Kingdom Season comes with the celebration of Christ the King on the final Sunday of the Church Year. The gospel reading for that day includes Pilate's conversation with Jesus with the question: "So you are a King?" On Advent Sunday, we move into Year C of the three year lectionary. During this year most of the gospel readings come from St.Luke and his distinctive and practical way of encouraging people to be more confident in their faith.

Report of Christ Church PCC meeting 15 September 2015

- The mowing of the graveyard has been completed.
 The gaps in the rota for paying for flowers in church that was reported at the last meeting have now been largely filled.
- It is intended to hold the service at which the top ten hymns chosen by the congregation will be played on Sunday the 29th November at 6pm.
- A survey entitled "Response to Poverty" was received from the diocese. PCC members were asked to review the questions and let the secretary have their replies.
- There is to be a choir concert by the choir of St Martins in the Field from London on the 24th of October in the church.
 A flyer will be produced and tickets will be available in advance and on the door.
- The parish share for Christ Church for 2016 will be £33,927.
 Changes to the system mean that the parish share is now set for three years and the income and attendance surveys will take place together in October.
- It was proposed and accepted that we pay a further £2000 towards our 2015 parish share.
- When the junior church copper collection reaches a total of £100 it will be donated to the Joshua Wilson brain trust charity.
- The fund raising race night made a total of £195 and was enjoyed by all who attended.
- The sale of the field was discussed again and it was decided that a meeting with the diocesan registrar would be appropriate before any action is taken. The vicar and certain PCC members will attend a meeting.
- A faculty for the fitting of a handrail to the vestry steps has been received and the handrail is in manufacture.

- It was proposed and accepted that we install two new LED external lights to the church and church hall.
- The vicar noted that the "Messy Church" at Seedfield Methodists was working wonders and was attended by up to 60 individuals.
- In Vicar's remarks the following points were raised.
 - The mission action plan is ongoing.
 - The Men of the Benefice brewery visit is scheduled for the 2nd October.
 - There is to be a basics group to nurture new believers. Sister Joan from CARITAS who run all sorts of social activities for people, had been in contact with the vicar and anyone who thinks someone in the parish would benefit from a visit should contact the vicar.
- The next PCC meeting is on the 11th of November.

16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence

Mothers' Union wants violence against women and girls to end before it even starts.

Mothers' Union is proud to be participating for a third year in the 16 Days of Activism against gender violence campaign as part of its ongoing work to stop violence against women and girls. Beginning on 25th November, the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women and ending on 10th December, Human Rights Day we encourage our members and supporters to join in and be a part of this year's campaign.

The campaign is used by individuals and groups around the world to call for an end to all forms of violence against women by:

Raising awareness about gender-based violence at local, national, regional and international levels
Strengthening local work around violence against women
Establishing a clear link between local and international work to end violence against women
Providing a forum in which organisations can develop and share new and effective strategies
Demonstrating the solidarity of women around the world, standing up for violence against women
Creating tools to pressure governments to implement promises made to eliminate violence against women

Throughout the world our 4 million members work across 83 countries in order to create favourable conditions for family life in many of the areas in which we operate to end violence against woman and girls through prayer, practical support and advocacy & campaigns.

The impact of this work is wide reaching; for example in Kenya Mothers' Union have carried out extensive work in different communities to raise awareness and support for those who have experienced, or who are at the risk of genital mutilation. Members hold workshops with church leaders and those in authority, raising awareness of this harmful practice. Following this work in sensitising the community, coupled with other organisations, the Female Genital Mutilation Act outlawing the practice was introduced in Kenya.

As well as our grassroots work in communities, Mothers' Union lobbies governments and policy makers at local, national and international levels. Whilst laws and policies relating to gender equality, discrimination and violence against women and girls can vary across the world there are a number of policy principles we believe need to be implemented globally including age appropriate relationship & sex education and legislation outlawing all forms of violence against women and girls.

Whilst much progress has been made there is still much to do! Mothers' Union has developed an activism pack to support and offer practical advice and ideas for anyone wishing to participate in 16 Days of Activism. It can be found on our website:

PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

The recipe should have read:

Makes 12-16 Prep Time 10 min. Cooking Time 10 min.

Ingredients 1 cup of peanut butter ½ cup of sugar

1 egg

(you can vary the recipe by using smooth or crunchy peanut butter or a different nut butter or using or a different sugar) Beat the three ingredients well together. Form into equal cookie-sized pieces and place on a baking sheet. Bake for 10 mins at 180C. Leave to cool for a couple of minutes before taking off the tray.

SATURDAY WALKING GROUP

Our most recent adventure took place in October. Seven of us (+ 2 dogs) met at the Owd Betts pub on Edenfield Road to begin our 11 mile round trip. We set off at 10.00am in rather misty conditions with the expectations of this lifting early. It soon became apparent however that this would not be the case.

We began our journey up towards Scout Moor. As we journeyed along the footpaths through the windfarm, we were unable to make out the turbines in the thick mist until we were right up close to them. They looked very eerie in the cloud and mist.



We arrived at Waugh's Well for elevenses. The well was built in 1866 at Fo' Edge Farm on the moors above Edenfield to commemorate the life of the Lancashire dialect poet Edwin Waugh. We paused for a short while to reflect on his life and some of his work at the information post.

Continuing along the Rossendale Way towards Cowpe and then along Rooley Moor Road, we passed many hundreds of sheep and other livestock, before pausing for lunch overlooking Greenbooth Reservoir. A very scenic place and we were blessed with a lull in the mist at this point.

We reached our intended destination, the pillar at the summit of 400 metre high Knowl Hill, with our heads literally in the clouds. Our final adventure came when John Brennan & Michael Ryan attempted to rescue a stranded quad biker. They were unsuccessful but their offer of help was appreciated nonetheless.

NB – Don't worry, the biker's friends eventually arrived to help him. We finished back at our starting point about 3.30pm and a drink at the Owd Betts would have been lovely but time did not allow it.

Despite the mist, the walk was greatly enjoyed by all and we appreciated the leadership of Paul, who navigated us through the elements perfectly.



The word *posada* comes from the Spanish to *lodge* or *shelter* and there is a tradition in many countries especially Mexico of a travelling nativity. This custom of Mary and Joseph travelling around from house to house during Advent is one in which we have joined within the benefice in previous years. It is a great opportunity to share our faith with others. If you would like to take part please sign the sheets at the back of our churches.
