These pictures contemplate Christ's returning to life with promises of hope and restoration.

He calls us to new ways of living, and assures us that he remains with us. God gives his Spirit to strengthen and support us in sending us out to spread his message. With his peace and his love we are to build a better world.

These paintings were also conceived as a memorial to innocent lives taken as a result of war in all nations. They were created as part of a process of contemplative prayer. Destruction, terrorism or warfare are not Christ's way to solve political or social problems. The images ask us to learn new ways following Christ's loving, self-sacrificial, forgiving, non-recriminatory, peace-bringing example. By the middle of May we will have finished another Easter Cycle, ending with Pentecost. Now what we may ask?

A good starting place would be to consider the Apostles and disciples after the Holy Spirit came upon them. Something had happened to them as they met with the Risen Christ and been given the Holy Spirit. After Pentecost, they were different people. No longer did they flee like sheep without a shepherd. Instead, they set out to tell the world about Jesus. They understood what their true calling was and how they were to live.

After Pentecost the Common Worship Lectionary put us in ORDINARY TIME.

Because of our use of the word "ordinary", many people think that Ordinary Time refers to the parts of the Church year that are unimportant. But it's just a name we use simply because the weeks are numbered. The Latin word ordinalis, which refers to numbers in a series, stems from the Latin word ordo, from which we get the English word order. So Ordinary Time is in fact the ordered life of the Church. The rhythm of the liturgical seasons reflects the rhythm of life, with its celebrations of anniversaries and its seasons, so now Sunday by Sunday, the Church marks her journey through the year as she processes through time toward eternity.

Ordinary Time, with its emphasis on daily living in the world, is a great opportunity for us to live un-ordinary lives! Live the lives as people who have come through the passion of our Lord, celebrated the joy of Easter. Like the Apostles and the disciples of old we have work to do, following the example of Christ, inspired by his words and empowered by the Holy Spirit.

Christ Church March 2016

A thank you certificate relating to our parish share was received from the Bishop of Manchester. A letter regarding the Parish share was also received from the Archdeacon.

The new grounds maintenance agreement and a new gas contract have been signed.

A letter relating to the retirement of Bishop Chris was received and tickets will be applied for for the farewell service in Bolton Parish Church.

The financial report was discussed and the accounts for 2015 are with the auditor.

A new charity for the children's copper collection needs to be decided on.

It was decided to pay £6,000 towards our Parish Share in April.

The role of a Deanery Synod was discussed at length and it was noted to make people aware of the Synod at the APCM.

It was decided to put a summary in the April magazine of the options being studied by the PCC regarding the future of the church buildings.

There were no discussions on the sale of the church field.

Children's ministry: the children are being involved in the café church service and family service and booklets for children have been purchased for Easter. Junior church leaders are needed.

The worship questionnaire has been completed and will now be reviewed.

The vicar had received a letter from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York who are inviting churches to pray for the evangelisation of the nation during the week before Pentecost Sunday. The Archbishops had written expressing their longing "to see a great wave of prayer across our land, throughout the Church of England and many other Churches" from 8th-15th May. The vicar suggested we could have 1 hour prayer service, a 24/7 prayer service. As the date falls near Rogation Sunday when a benefice walk is planned prayers could be said at different points around the walk.

There will be Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday and Ascension Day services at both Christ Church and St John with St Mark's. On Christmas Eve, the vicar is keen to have a 7.30pm service at St Johns and an 11.30 pm service at CCW.

The meeting closed at 9pm with Prayer.

Copper Collections

Our young people continue to collect and contribute towards our copper collections, alongside the adult members of our congregations. These weekly collections occur during the last hymn of our Sunday morning services.

In the last two years, these collections have helped a number of charitable organisations. These include Embrace the Middle East, Bury Hospice, Save the Children Fund, Children's Relief Bethlehem, The Royal Manchester Children's Hospital, Bury Pipeline and the Joshua Wilson Brain Tumour Charity.

Currently St.John with St.Mark's Church are donating to the North West Air Ambulance and Christ Church are supporting McMillan Nurses. Both these organisations play a vital role in the everyday lives of our parishioners.

Thank you to all who contribute. Little do we realise that when the children are collecting our coppers we are making a real difference to someone's life.

If anyone has information about a suitable charity that we can support, please have a word with one of the church officials.

FROM THE VICARAGE

* Gill's ordination to the priesthood will take place at Manchester Cathedral on Saturday 25 June, beginning at 2.30pm. We will be arranging transport to this service. Please listen out for the arrangements in the weeks prior to this day.



* The Bishop of Bolton is to retire at the end of June. A farewell service will be held on Sunday 15 May at Bolton Parish Church, beginning at 3.00pm. We have a limited number of tickets available for this service. If anyone wishes to attend, please let me know.

* An Archdeacons' Parish Visitation will take place in the benefice on the morning of Wednesday 1 June. This five – yearly event has two purposes:

i) to ensure the administrative elements of the parishes are in good order and that the legal requirements are being properly met.

ii) to give an opportunity to reflect on the life, mission and ministry of the parish.

There will be more information about the Visitation nearer the time

* Archdeacons are also required to hold annual Visitations. In this Diocese these are usually arranged in each deanery, during May. Clergy, churchwardens, sidespersons and PCC members are asked to attend and the services are open to all. The Archdeacon delivers an address (or 'charge') and admits Churchwardens to office, on behalf of the Bishop. The service in Bury Deanery will take place on Wednesday, 4 May at St Paul Ramsbottom starting at 7.30 pm. If this is not convenient other dates are available on the diocesan website or from the clergy. * If anyone is interested in being confirmed this year, please have a word with me or another member of the Ministry Team.

* The Porch project are currently struggling to meet demand and asking for more foodstuff. Both churches have a box at the back of church to support this worthy cause.

* The Ministry Team consisting of all the Clergy, Licensed Readers and our Authorised Lay Minister meet every month – usually on the first Monday evening. If you have an issue that you would like us to discuss, please have a word with me.

* Any enquiries about baptisms or weddings / marriage banns etc should be made at the Parish Office at St.John with St.Mark's Hall any Wednesday evening between 6.30-7.00.

*Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the wardens.

* The regular Parish Retreat for some of the congregation of St.John with St.Mark will take place from 25-28 May at Formby. Please remember all the participants in your prayers.

* The Diocesan publication, CRUX is looking for lay people who would be willing to share their story of how God has been moving in their life in the Brief Encounter section of the diocesan magazine. If you would like to share your own story please contact me.

* Both of our Church Halls are available for a whole range of activities for use by church and community groups. Please however check with the bookings officers if the building is otherwise occupied before anything is arranged. The contact details are at the back of this magazine.

The Seven Last Words from the Cross

was a Lenten Meditation led by Paul Sanderson in March.

Paul used paintings by Rev Iain McKillop, a retired priest working as Artist in Residence at Mirfield Abbey in Yorkshire, coupled with Biblical references to Christ words on the Cross and meditative thoughts to accompany them.



The originals are paintings are on 4ft high panels which are painted fragments of life-size Crucifixion scenes.

Iain initially conceived the project with a German artist friend both horrified by the extensive bombing of the historic, mediaeval and baroque city of Wurzburg on 16th March 1945. Many British cities suffered similarly during the Blitzkrieg. Wurzburg had little strategic military or industrial importance. It was targeted primarily because its historic buildings would burn easily. Nearly 5,000 innocent citizens died and 82% of the city was destroyed.

Too many world cities today suffer similarly. We identified with those in pain or struggling in life, particularly the plight of so many innocents who suffer as a result of war and terrorism. The images encouraged us to seek forgiveness, inner peace and the world integrity which Jesus gave his life to achieve.

We were invited to use each picture to focus on the needs of others and ourselves, to contemplate and to pray for peace, justice and the healing of our world.

The Seven Last Words from the Cross are not so much meditations on pain, as on God's willingness to pour out all for our healing. This was a wonderful meditative evening to help our Lenten preparation for Easter.

THE WEEK WE LOVE EVERY NEIGHBOUR

Picture a young mother of four, Her husband has left, She has no land, no assets, no savings, And the only work she can get is backbreaking manual labour for as little as 74p a day. Her home has been flooded several times, and last August it flooded again. This is Morsheda. She's our neighbour, and she desperately needs our help.

From 15 - 21 May, Christian Aid Week, our churches will join with more than 20,000 others across the U K and Ireland. It's an opportunity to reach out to our community; to raise money for our global neighbours in need and to make sure some of the world's poorest people have enough to eat and live.

A home safety package from Christian Aid could raise Morsheda's home on an earth plinth, safe from the flood plain, and give her resources to invest in things like farm animals, seeds and a composting kit - giving her the tools she needs to build a better future. A new chance for Morsheda costs as little as £250.

Saturday, 7 May

As we usually do a benefice walk each year, normally around May, this year we find that the day coincides with the Archbishops of Canterbury and York call for a Week of Prayer 8th-15th May They are inviting churches to pray for the evangelisation of the nation during this week before Pentecost.

In their letter to the parishes the Archbishops say: "At the heart of our prayers will be words that Jesus himself taught us – '*Thy kingdom come, thy will be done.*'It is impossible to overstate the life-transforming power of the Lord's Prayer. It is a prayer that is reassuring enough to be on the lips of the dying and yet dangerous enough to be banned in cinemas. It is famous enough to be spoken each day by billions



in hundreds of languages and yet intimate enough to draw us ever closer into friendship with Jesus Christ. It is simple enough to be memorised by small children and yet profound enough to sustain a whole lifetime of prayer. When we pray it with sincerity and with joy, there is no imagining the new ways in which God can use us to his glory."

One of the suggestions is a pray walk which fits nicely in our plans. This year the walk will start at the heart of the benefice with prayers at both churches, so the walk around the whole benefice will be a bit longer - about 13 miles. This may be too much for everybody so we are going to organise it in stages stopping at various points (some of which you can drive to) to pray for our Parishes, our Community, and our Witness in them.

Leaving just after 9.30, we headed up to the top of Nangreaves. We walked about 90 minutes before reaching Owd Betts on Edenfield Road, and began our ascent up Knowl Hill.



Although a steep climb, the reward is a fantastic view across the region, taking

in Manchester & Cheshire. It was observed that a wooden cross has recently been placed on the summit of the Hill (I have since Googled this and discovered it was placed there by Churches Together North West Rochdale on Palm Sunday).

We dropped a little further down the hill and stopped for refreshment, before 'zig-zagging' our way down to the edge of Greenbooth Reservoir and paused for lunch shortly afterwards. We made our way towards Norden via Red Lumb and along Overtown Lane, then back onto Edenfield Road.

Our last leg took us along Cheesden Brook and then towards Bircle. We made our way home across the motorway bridge and alongside the golf club, before back onto Chesham Road. It may not have been our intended route this month, but it was certainly a worthy replacement. Thank you, Michael, for stepping into the breach.



Church but not as you've known it relaxed . . . fun . . . interactive . . . different



The Open Group met on 13th April and welcomed Paul Sanderson to present an illustrated and lighthearted talk on his latest adventure; this time along

the Cotswold Way, a 102 mile journey from Chipping Campden in Gloucestershire to Bath. Paul explained how it was his brother, Mark's suggestion to complete the route, and so along with Mark's wife Tracey, and also mutual friend Peter Johnson, our intrepid heroes set off last September.

Paul opened our meeting with brief worship, in which he thanked God for the wonderful country we have, and treated us to a brief video clip at the start of the talk, to give us more of an idea as to the atmosphere and landscape of the route, which static photographs cannot always give you.



The walk began in Chipping Campden, familiar to some members. Paul brought along some props, fine cutlery that was manufactured at a shop in Chipping Campden. Although Paul explained the set he brought was actually purchased in Buxton!

It was intriguing to see how much history has occurred in this 100 mile route. Example, there

is a monument at the site of Haile's Abbey in Gloucester known as 'Cromwell's Chair'. Legend has it that Oliver Cromwell sat here whilst he watched the destruction of the Abbey. The walk also focused on the light-hearted side of the area, particularly the famous Cooper's Hill cheese rolling contest, where rolls of cheese can come hurtling down the hill at speeds of up to 70mph. Not for the faint-hearted, by the sounds of it. The walk lasts 6 days, and each day can vary from 10-20 miles in length. Bed and breakfast accommodation was waiting for the group at the end of each day. Hot baths, comfortable bedding and delicious breakfasts were appreciated. The group took advantage of a useful courier service, taking their luggage from one destination to another. A lot of planning must go into these things.

The clips we were shown by Paul gave us an indication as to how much natural beauty they were treated to on this 6 day trip. It definitely made the sometimes tired legs worthwhile. 


