Remember, Remember the Fifth of November – gunpowder, treason and plot!

November really is a month for remembering; it begins with All Souls' Day when we remember those who we have loved but who have died, and in remembering we give thanks for their lives and their love for us.

And then it is November 5th when we remember Guy Fawkes and his group of followers who attempted to blow up the Houses of Parliament. That event is remembered by fires on which effigies of Guy Fawkes are burned. However, I must admit as a child I was more concerned about obtaining pennies for pushing a guy made from old clothing around in a pram, along with the fireworks, the burnt baked potatoes and the treacle toffee, than the history lesson.



And very quickly comes November 11<sup>th</sup>, Armistice Day and of course the associated Remembrance Sunday. Then we remember the signing of the Armistice which ended the First World War and all the men and women who

lost their lives in that conflict and many others since.

On Armistice Day last year my elder daughter and her partner went to France and cycled from Arras to Cambrai where my uncle is buried after being killed just before the end of the war in 1918. He was nineteen and at the age when many young people are now on 'gap years' or beginning university he was fighting in the squalor of the trenches. It is good to think that even though I never knew him he is still remembered along with so many others.

And each Sunday we remember Jesus and his sacrifice for us with the words "Do this in remembrance of me," in the communion service as the bread and wine are blessed.



Memories, remembering times, places and people can give us joy and sometimes sadness. I often use a prayer for bereaved people in funeral services "Grant them joy in their memories." I pray that they may look back at the life of their loved one with happiness and smile.

But remembering should not just be nostalgia, it should affect our lives. When we bring Guy Fawkes to mind we should realise the value of the democracy we live in and do all we can to preserve it.

It is not enough just to say "How terrible that so many people have died in wars." It is inadequate just to buy a poppy and then forget for twelve months. Remembering the suffering of those involved in wars should cause us continually to pray and work for peace in our homes, our land and the world.

And remembering Jesus – it is not sufficient to think "Isn't it wonderful that Jesus died for me" although that is important. The knowledge of his sacrifice on the cross should influence our lives, the sort of people we are, the way we treat others, the attitudes we show and the thoughts we express.

What will we be remembering this month and how will it affect our lives?

#### Meeting held at Christ Church on 10 October

The PCC meeting was attended by the Archdeacon, Ven David Bailey and the Deanery Lay Chair, Mr Steve Clark.

The main item for discussion was the Archdeacon's Quinquennial Visitation report. The report was split up into the following main headings; Church Building, Documents and Registers, Churchyard, Parsonage house, Other Property, Vision, Mission and Ministry.

The following are the main points raised for action from the report. Maintenance of the building is important and in conjunction with the church architect a priority list of actions should be drawn up.

- Disabled access needs to be improved.
- Health and Safety needs to be reviewed using the guidelines from Ecclesiastical insurance.
- Documents and registers were in good order except that the Terrier is not complete and requires updating.
- Canon Law requires that a church log book is kept.
- The child protection policy should be reviewed in light of the new Diocesan Safeguarding Policy.
- A stewardship campaign should be considered in the near future.

After discussing the above report at length the following further PCC matters were discussed.

The list of Eucharistic assistants was reviewed and amended as proposed by the vicar, all were in favour.

The vicar noted that Andrew Hawksworth, one of the architects who produced the report on the proposals for the future of the church was leaving Byrom Clark Roberts.

The lighting conductor survey report was received and the system is non-compliant. A quote for  $\pounds 820$  plus VAT was received to carry out the repairs necessary. This was proposed to be carried out by Ian Riddick seconded by Patricia Stokes all in favour.

Brian Crow proposed that we pay £1000 in in November towards the Parish share seconded by Dave Thompson carried by majority, not all in favour

#### A TASTE OF A TASTER...



It is tradition for the folk at St. John with St. Mark to experience a three-day retreat at the St. Joseph's Prayer Centre in Formby, leading up to the late May Bank Holiday. It was decided to give people a taste of this experience with a one day visit on Saturday 8th October.

Thirteen of us from across the two congregations met at 9.00am for a car share to the Centre, arriving just after 10.00am for coffee and a brief history of the Centre by Sister Nora, who then gave us a tour, showing us around the chapels, meeting rooms, bedrooms and rest rooms.

Our theme for the May retreat was Christian Devotional Meditation and this theme was continued today. Gill opened our first session with 'The Raisin Meditation'. We each had two whole minutes to examine and consume one raisin, concentrating solely on the raisin and how it looked, felt and tasted. We then read, studied and discussed five passages from scripture based on the theme of Christian Mindfulness, the gentle effort to be continuously present and an awareness of ourselves and the world around us.

After our first session we made our way to the dining room for a lovely roast pork lunch served by the Sisters, followed by a selection of desserts.

There was some free time after lunch and as it was such a beautiful day we used the opportunity to walk through the dunes to the Formby beach. Along the way we encountered an outdoor gym. I must congratulate Jennifer Wood on conquering the equipment much better than I did. (Editor: see back page) We sat at the beach in the Autumn sunshine for a while before returning back to the centre. Ian led the afternoon for us, when we studied the story of Elijah on Mount Horeb. There was a final reflection from Ian before we closed the day with worship led by Gill and shared Communion in the Chapel.

We made our way home to Bury around 4.30pm and the general feeling was that everybody who had attended had benefitted from and enjoyed the whole day.

The season of Advent marks the Church's preparation for Christmas. The four Sundays of the season act as a countdown to the great celebration of our Lord's birth and is an important time in our spiritual lives. The colour of the season is purple which reflects the solemnity of this time in the Church Year.

Traditionally churches use an Advent wreath to symbolise the passage of the season. A candle is lit each week as the liturgy reflects the coming of Jesus as a child and in time as Lord and Judge. On Christmas Day, the central candle - coloured white – is lit to signal the fulfilment of Advent and the arrival of the Son of God.

### **Report from Autumn Council 2016 – 8 October** from Tricia Stokes

The meeting once again was very vibrant; a change of venue from St Thomas to Church House 90 Deansgate filled to capacity, bringing to members so much exciting news and updates on what is happening and will be happening in the future. There were a number of speakers.

The Rev Ellie Trimble from The Church of Apostles Miles Platting was one. Ellie runs a regular project, Food for All at the church each Sunday providing 75+ homeless or persons in need a hot Sunday roast and pudding, providing support and outreach. One lady travels from Stalybridge for food and fellowship. Nancy who came in from the street is now a regular volunteer. Sunday evening volunteers are needed from 5pm - 8pm.

Annette Maudsley, from "Greater Together Manchester" and Project worker for "winter night shelter" told how there had been a 50% increase in rough sleepers in the past 18 months. Manchester has the second highest number of rough sleepers outside London. Annette stated 4 key points - Support, Help, Build, Change. Last year 6 churches in Manchester, supported by Mothers' Union, opened their doors providing night shelter to the homeless, involving an impressive total of 112 beds, 6 churches, 186 volunteers, 36 guests (referred), 733 bed spaces, 5,700 free hours, 308 loads laundry, 352 meals, for 3 months. From 1st November 2016 this is being extended to 6 months at 7 churches. Volunteers are wanted from 5.30-9.30pm, 9.30pm-6.00am and 6.00-9am. Please ask for details if you could help. Again Mothers' Union will be providing support

Another speaker was Lydia, working with families of domestic abuse in Trafford. 1 in 3 women, 1 in 6 men, 1 in 5 children are affected.

We were introduced to another charity - Nightstop, which aims to alleviate homelessness throughout communities, by hosting 18 to 25 year olds. DePaul UK are the founders of this much needed support for young people. There 33 Nightstops in the UK but only one in Manchester Diocese to date. A need has been recognised and they are seeking grants to make this happen.

Our 2017 theme is Faith in Action. Let's do exactly what it says.

#### THE WALKING GROUP



Our October walk should have originally taken place in September, but following wet weather, we moved our scheduled walk to 1st October, and it

was certainly a good decision to make as we experienced a lovely early Autumn day from beginning to end.

Our route took us through three Reservoirs of Bolton, Turton and Edgworth. Six of us met at 9.30am for transport to the first reservoir, Jumbles Reservoir, where we parked up for the day. The other two Reservoirs on the route are the Turton & Entwistle and Wayoh. There was much to enjoy on the route and all three reservoirs have their own unique characteristics about them. Much of the day was spent on and off the Witton Weavers Way long-distance footpath.



After leaving the first section of the Witton Weavers Way, we shortly came to Chapeltown, and the Turton Tower, which some us climbed to overlook the Blackburn to Manchester railway line.

On our way to Entwistle Reservoir we passed Yarnsdale and a gritstone crag known as the 'Fairy Battery'. We also had some good views of Winter Hill. On reaching Entwistle Reservoir we paused for our elevenses stop. There were many people around on this day enjoying the lovely weather.

Continuing towards Edgworth, we had our lunch stop overlooking large parts of the region including Holcombe Hill, Deeply Vale and the tower blocks of Manchester.

We arrived at Entwistle Railway station and resisted the temptation to call in the Strawberry Duck, so just passed by on our way to the final reservoir, the Wayoh.

Picking up the Witton Weavers Way once again we continued to the Wayoh. Crossing the walkway at the water purification works we left the Reservoir at Embankment Road and continued to the village of Turton Bottoms before arriving back at the Jumbles Country Park for transport home.

We covered about 10-11 miles on the day and the good weather and views made it very pleasant.
