Revd Dr Una Kroll: In memoriam



Una Kroll died at the Franciscan Convent Care Home in Blackburn on Epiphany morning – 6 January 2017. Her funeral will be held at East Lancashire (Radcliffe) Crematorium on Friday 3 February at 1.30pm.

Una was an internationally famous campaigner on matters of equality. She was highly significant in the movement for the ordination of women and a doctor, nun, priest, feminist, parliamentary candidate and spiritual director amongst many other roles.

She was born Una Hill in London on 15 December1925. After her parents separated before her second birthday, she was brought up by her mother and her wider family in France, Latvia, Italy and Britain, speaking Russian and French in addition to her mother tongue.

Una studied medicine at Cambridge and after becoming a doctor — and a committed Christian — joined the Anglican religious order the Community of the Holy Name. She was sent to Liberia, West Africa, where she met an American monk Leo Kroll who was 25 years her senior. They fell in love. Returning from Africa they were married on 1 June 1957 in Birmingham. After a brief spell back in Africa, in Namibia, they settled in London with Una becoming a GP in Cray. Her experiences of church and society during this time, caused Una to campaign on matters of equality — even standing as an Independent Equal Opportunities candidate in the 1974 General Election. Una and Leo had three daughters and a son.

She was ordained as a deacon in the Church of England in 1970. She served for a number of years in this role in both London and Sussex, actively campaigning for the ordination of women. Leo died in 1987 and within a year, Una retired from work and moved to Monmouth in South Wales.

Una was ordained an Anglican priest in the Church of Wales in 1997 and continued in this ministry when she moved to Bury in 2003. She moved north to be near her son Leo who lives in Ramsbottom.

She joined the Ministry Team at St.John with St.Mark and from her small flat in Hamilton House passed her wisdom and guidance onto hundreds of people.

To the surprise of many she joined the Roman Catholic Church in 2008 and continued to campaign for equality there. In her latter years she worshipped in both demoninations — at St.Joseph's RC Church and at St.John with St.Mark. Una was an active participant of the many study groups held at Ian & June's. She was a regular attender at the 8.30am service until last summer when an accident severely limited her mobility. After a spell in hospital and back at Hamilton House, she moved to the care of the Convent in the autumn.

In a Guardian obituary, Canon Paul Oestreicher, wrote: "Una's life was a passionate stormy affair with the church. In her final years, physically frail but still mentally and spiritually vigorous,, she embraced a solitary life of prayer for the many she loved and for the peace of the world". —

Her wisdom and friendship will be missed by so many in Bury and across the world.

- * The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday March 1st. There will be Holy Communion services at 7.30pm in both churches on that day as well as the regular 10.00am service at St.John with St.Mark.

- * It seems that the practice of intinction the practice of dipping consecrated bread into the wine at Communion is on the increase across the benefice. The Ministry Team would request that this is only done for MEDICAL reasons and not as a regular custom. If intinction has to take place, please ensure that your fingers do not touch the wine, for obvious hygienic reasons.
- *The Ministry Team consisting of all the Clergy, Licensed Readers and our Authorised Lay Minister meet every month – usually on the first Monday evening. If you have an issue that you would like us to discuss, please have a word with me.
- * Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the wardens.
- * Both of our Church Halls are available for a whole range of activities for use by church and community groups. Please however check with the bookings officers (June Banks for St.John with St.Mark and Jennifer Wood for Christ Church) if the building is otherwise occupied before anything is arranged.

St. John with St. Mark December Meeting

We were joined at our meeting by the Archdeacon David Bailey and the Deanery Lay Chair Steve Clark. There was no agenda and the purpose of the meeting was for the Archdeacon to present his report from the Parish Visitation, which was undertaken on 1st June. The PCC had been circulated a copy of the report prior to the meeting. The main points were discussed at length.

One of the key issues raised was the need for faculty requirements, which are currently only raised if we undertake work in the Church alone. It has been confirmed that the faculty jurisdiction should indeed apply to the whole site, including the hall, gardens etc, but would not need to apply retrospectively. This does however mean that these areas would now form part of a Quinquennial Inspection along with the Church.

There was the opportunity for questions and concerns to be put to the Archdeacon about any matter raised in the report. As this was also our last meeting before Christmas it was necessary to discuss our annual giving to charity. The PCC once again agreed to donate 10% of our previous year's Planned Giving to various charities. The charities range from categories including Overseas Mission, Overseas Relief & Development, UK Mission and UK Secular. A discussion took place and PCC members spoke out about particular charities they would like us to support this year. It was also agreed to donate the loose collection from the forthcoming Christmas services and magazine greetings to North West Ambulance Service.

One other item raised is that it is likely the Church Hall boiler will need to be replaced shortly. The existing one has served us well for around 20 years but is nearing the time of renewal. Quotes are being sought.

Future PCC dates for 2017: Thursdays, 9th February & 16th March. The APCM will take place after the Sunday service on 2nd April.

JOINT PCC MEETING OF 12 DECEMBER 2016

The two PCCs met at Christ Church Hall for their bi-annual meeting. Before the meeting we gathered to enjoy some of the cakes that had been donated to the successful cream tea earlier in the day.

Once again we looked at our Mission Action Plans and updated them where necessary. The areas when we now currently work well as a Benefice were raised, along with areas when we could perhaps work more closely. One of the areas it was felt we could focus on was the use of Social Media across the Benefice. This was mentioned in the Archdeacons Parish Visitation reports. A discussion took place on this subject and what forms this could include.

The issue of social dates was also raised. It was thought that the two Parishes could co-ordinate their social calendars to avoid future clashes.

It is also hoped to run a Stewardship campaign, possibly next year, and as such a meeting has been arranged with the Diocesan Stewardship Officer James Emmerson for both PCC's on Wednesday 26th April

CCW meeting 10 January 2017

- 1. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission application form and photos had been sent off. A reply has now been received and this will now go to the Archdeacon for approval.
- 2. Correspondence has been received from the diocese regarding fees etc.
- 3. In the financial report it was noted that we had paid the parish share in full for 2016. The parish share for CCW next year is £32,730.32. It was determined to keep the fees for the cost of the church hall and the church for funerals, weddings and organisations the same as last year.
- 4. It was decided to keep the actions required from the Archdeacons visitation on the agenda for the next meeting.
- 5. The child friendly award for CCW runs out in June 2017, a letter will be received in spring advising us. A committee will be formed to address the actions for this.
- 6. There is a confirmation service at CCW at 10.30am on the 9th July 2017, classes will begin after Easter, other churches may be involved.
- 7. Committee reports were given firstly from the Church Hall committee and a short report from the property committee stated that over 50% of the items that were to be done in the 18 months after the 2013 Ouingennial had been completed.
- 8. The secretary was asked to check with the church architect regarding the fallen plaster from the wall above the altar.
- 9. The vicar handed out copies of the latest mission action plan which will be further discussed at the joint PCC meeting in June. A meeting has been set up with the diocesan stewardship officer on the 26th of April. The St Johns Christmas lunch service was reported on by Revd Gill Barnett, saying that it was well attended by 21 people, a good age range and a good geographical area.
- 10. It was noted that the events list from St Johns for 2017 was to be sent to CCW when available.

After leaving the Kirklees we continued towards Nuttall Park via Newcombe Road and then picking up a track near Waterside Road, which took us to the park. Our next stop was the Irwell Works in Ramsbottom where we enjoyed refreshment.

Leaving there about 3.00pm we crossed the East Lancs Railway, where the Santa Special was just pulling in, and then continued towards Manchester Road and picked up the track beginning at Whitelow Road. This then took us to the top of Bury Old Road and we continued on towards our third stop, Leyden Brewery (aka The Lord Raglan). After an hour in the Raglan we made our way home.

St. Mark's Scout leader Geoffrey Molyneux, killed in a flying mission in 1955. Our current Scout group have a new plaque for the cross, so whilst there we had a brief discussion as to where it could be placed and how we would get it up there.

We then briefly turned back on ourselves and dropped down to the track to Waugh's Well, where we stopped for lunch just before 1.00pm.

Afterwards, we continued our route along a stretch of the Rossendale Way, eventually arriving on the outskirts of Edenfield and then into the Village of Turn, past Bleakholt and the Fishermans Retreat. Our last leg involved a tough climb over a rugged hill towards Harden Moor. From there, it was back along Bury Old Road and to the Lord Raglan. We stopped here for deserved refreshment before the drive home. Overall, despite it sometimes being tough going underfoot, our group enjoyed the walk. We had covered 11.5 miles during the day.




