Religion and Politics – dangerous bedfellows! Some believe they should never be in the same discussion never mind the same sentence and subscribe to the idea encapsulated in the cartoon below (© Murray Watts), entitled 'The Order of the Universe':



But in these last few weeks, I have found these two facets of life uncomfortably at odds with each other. Our current political situations are difficult and confusing – locally, nationally and internationally and have aroused passions not seen since the poll tax riots of the 90s or the miners' strikes of the 70s and 80s.

We have leaders who seem to ignore the voice of the people; walk all over the weak; deny aid

to the vulnerable and bring very little clarity of thought or action to the people they are elected to serve. In the parable of the Good Samaritan, the aid-worker didn't stop to question who it was he was helping. He didn't challenge the traveller or question him about why he was out on such a dangerous road. He didn't just give him aid at his point of need. No, the Samaritan went on to give hope, too.

Justin Welby, in his paper on practical evangelism, says, "In cases of need, I believe we ought to reject the notion of any possible 'neutral' perspective on these issues and also reject the idea that religion is a purely private matter or that it is possible to divide public and private values for anyone." So where does that leave us when God himself says he will mediate for peace (Isaiah 2 v3-5); his promises will be extended to all nations (Isaiah 56 v1-8); when we are warned about our behaviour towards the weak and vulnerable (Malachi 3 v1-5); when Jesus gave us parables to challenge our biases and Paul writes about service that pleases God (Hebrew 13 v1-3, 16)? We may not be in charge of millions of pounds or dollars or be able to direct aid to the most needy but we are all called to serve in some way.



We must not sulk or bury our head like Jonah. We do have a responsibility to pray for and support or challenge those in power. We must live as a lamp on a lamp stand, doing God-works, not to satisfy our own consciences but to give him the glory.

Please visit these sites for more information about the role of the church in a very needy world and may you be a blessing to those you have the privilege to serve in Jesus' name – you may entertain angels in disguise!



#### St. John with St. Mark January Meeting

Ian spent some time discussing the draft financial accounts for 2016 and outlined the usual incomes and expenditures. It was noted there had been a drop in the overall Gift Aided Planned Giving for 2016. There was an opportunity to look over the 2017 budget and for PCC members to raise any potential items of income or expenditure not already highlighted. Once again, the reports were well presented for us and Ian took questions. A vote of thanks was recorded to Ian for his work and especially for getting the accounts completed by only the second week of January.

The Vicar informed us that Cath Hilton had volunteered to be the Safeguarding Officer for the Benefice.

Forthcoming social dates were confirmed, including the Chinese New Year celebration on Friday 27th January and Book Fair on Saturday 4th February. Volunteers have come forward to organise the Firework party for 2017, following last year's cancellation of the event.

We have had some positive feedback concerning use of the Website, in that an enquiry concerning the Christmas Lunch had come from someone in London looking for a nearby lunch in Bury, for a relative unable to travel to the capital to see his family.

We went through the action points required following the Archdeacon's Parish report and his presentation to the PCC, and were advised that the Quinquennial inspection is now scheduled for this year.

Two quotes have been sought for the replacement of the Church Hall boiler. One has been provisionally accepted pending the outcome of a third quote. Following the clarification that Faculty applications should apply to the Church Hall, this work will now need to go through the Faculty process. The Library has also been made aware that the Faculty applications apply to the Hall. Dave read out an acknowledgment he had received from Bishop Mark following his visit to the Benefice on Sunday 8th January. He thanked people for his welcome on the day. There were also some positive comments from the congregation who appreciated his visit.

We were updated on the Mission Action Plan following the joint PCC in December.

A further Christian Basics course will commence in Lent on Thursday evenings at St. John with St. Mark after the communion service.

The PCC were made aware of two First Aid courses being held by Rebuild, one covering Emergency First Aid at Work and the other which covers Emergency Paediatric First Aid. Some of our PCC members expressed an interest in these.

Dave also announced that the Funeral of our much loved and much missed friend Reverend Una Kroll would take place at Radcliffe Crematorium on Friday 3rd February. A link to a Guardian Newspaper obituary for Una has also been placed on our Website.

The APCM will take place after the Sunday service on 2nd April.

#### **Christ Church February Meeting**

- 1. The year's finances to December 2016 were reviewed and the records are now with the auditor.
- 2. The application to the War Graves Commission for the signs to be installed at church has been resubmitted with new photographs showing the signs positioned on the wall rather than a freestanding post.
- 3. It was suggested that we put a plaque in the Lych gate with the names of the individuals referred to by the War Graves Commission signs. This to be further discussed at the next PCC.

- 4. A stone plaque to Canon Evans had been found in the church cellar it appeared to have been removed from the church at some time. The secretary to investigate the requirement for a faculty if this is to be considered for re-installation.
- 5. Several items have been completed from the Archdeacon's visitation report.
- 6. There is to be a Task Group meeting in the Church Hall on the 14<sup>th</sup> of February at 2pm to discuss strengthening mission
- 7. There will be a review of Children's ministry at the 9<sup>th</sup> March Pastoral committee meeting.
- 8. Vocations: the vicar is the ALM chaplain and information on ALM's is being produced by the diocese.
- 9. It was reported that Rebuild are running two health and safety courses at a cost of £40 per person
- 10. Vicar's remarks: there was a short discussion on the Mission Action plan. There is to be a joint PCC meeting on the topic of Stewardship on the 26<sup>th</sup> April at St John's. There is to be a Christian Basics group at St Johns starting on the 9<sup>th</sup> March for 4 Thursdays at 8pm. This will be repeated at Christ Church in October. A mid-week café church service was being considered for the summer.
- 11. It was decided that any sales in church will take place after the service has been completed.

## **Mission Action Planning**

\* Increase the number of midweek Parade Services

\* More ecumenical activity

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CHRIST CHURCH:

\* Engage more with community groups to heal the rifts caused by the field issue.

\* Dealing with the possible sale of the church field and securing agreement about use of the current church buildings.

\* Engage more with our young people and refresh our approach to Junior Church

Mission Action Planning is an ongoing process that will be constantly under review by the PCCs. If you have any ideas for this aspect of our church life please speak to one of the ministers.

The new committee therefore is as follows :



## NEWS FROM ST.JOHN with ST.MARK CE SCHOOL

- The school was the subject of an Ofsted Inspection in December 2016. The full report is available on the school website. The overall effectiveness was deemed as good. Some very positive comments were made in the report. We were particularly delighted to read: "Relationships within school are excellent. Staff and pupils treat each other with mutual respect. This has a positive impact on pupils' learning." In a similar vein, "Safeguarding is a strength of the school. Leaders have skilfully used the school's values to reinforce pupils' confidence and resilience, along with their knowledge of how to keep themselves safe."
- There are a still several vacancies on the School Governing Body which usually meets once every term. If anyone is interested in serving on this important committee please speak to the Vicar or Sue Law, the Chair of Governors.
- At the end of January, the number of children at school totalled 341. The children share 23 different languages.

The food on our tables, the tea and coffee in our mugs, all derive from farmers who toil, sweat and slog. However hard they work to provide the things we depend on, millions of farmers in developing countries aren't paid what they deserve. It's not a new problem. The Fairtrade Foundation work tirelessly to highlight the need to amplify the voices of marginalised producers.

The Open Group returns this month after the Winter break. However this year there will be some changes.





# Real Easter Egg NEW 2017 Range





### The egg that shares the Easter story

The new look Real Easter Egg 2017 range has been launched and churches are being asked to encourage people to support this unique way of sharing the story of Easter.

This year a 24 page Easter story-activity book illustrated by Alida Massari is included in the Original, Egg Hunt and Dark eggs. The Special Edition has an Easter traditions booklet inside. The Sharing box, with 30 eggs, comes with colour-in posters.

Out of the 80 million Easter eggs sold in this part of the world every year, The Real Easter Egg is the only one which has a copy of the Easter story in the box, is made of Fairtrade chocolate and makes a donation to charity from sales.

The Real Easter Egg was launched in 2010 but the supermarkets turned down the idea. It was left to churches and church schools to place orders to fund The Meaningful Chocolate Company to make The Real Easter Egg. A 24 page Easter story-activity book illustrated by Alida Massari.

To date, more than one million eggs have been sold with 750,000 of these sent through the post directly to churches and schools. The rest have been sold through independent retailers and supermarkets.

The success of The Real Easter Egg has meant that the production of Fairtrade chocolate has moved to the UK. Over £250,000 has been raised from sales for charitable causes.

#### Where to buy
