Safe Refuge and Guiding Light

Well I have been away for a week with the family for a rest and a bit of fun. Or should I say to get dragged around at full speed until I nearly collapse and have to come home for rest from the holiday. I'm pretty sure we have all had that experience.

But among the sea side arcades and ice cream vans and the mandatory chip shops, we always try to find a place for a bit of peace or refuge from the hustle and bustle.

And indeed that is what we did and I would like to tell you about the building and some of its history. The building we found our quiet refuge in is called St Nicholas Chapel and is located very high on top of a hill overlooking Ilfracombe harbour. It's a very small building with quite a steep walk to get to it. But it is well worth the effort with lovely views in all directions.

The Chapel was built as a place of worship around 1321AD for people to come to who were living or working around the old harbour area. It is also thought that the chapel was used as a safe refuge on top of the hill from marauding pirates who used to attack the old Cornwall and Devon coast line.

So this small Chapel on the hill was a place of worship and refuge. Well there is even more to this little Chapel. It also in the middle ages had a light put on its uppermost reach to guide boats into the harbour. And the lighthouse at the top is still in use today. It is thought that the lighthouse maybe the oldest working one in the country.

So if we think about this tiny Chapel it offers open worship, a sanctuary to those in need or shelter and for over six centuries has sent a shining light of guidance out across the dark sky to reassure and bring people home safe. How do we compare?

We have to look at ourselves and wonder are we helping our Church to emit Jesus' light for all to see? And in so doing helping people find faith and the light and love of God? Are we opening and welcome to all who come to us in need and shelter? Do we offer people refuge from the storms that face us in life? And do we accept other people's way of worshipping God or do we want them to conform to our ways and traditions?

This little chapel on the hill has stood the test of time and been a guiding light and sanctuary to people for hundreds of years. I wonder if there are lessons for us to learn and will our Church and faith fare so well over the years to come.

That's where we come in. We are only custodians for our faith and church for a small amount of time. Whether or not it survives over the centuries is the responsibility of us and those who come after us. I just hope we all can try to help the world see Jesus' light through all the darkness of the word and our faith stand the test of time as well as St Nicholas' has.

IN MEMORIAM: Mary Rawson

Mary Rawson died at Cameron House Nursing Home on Monday 27 March at the age of 92. Her funeral was held at St.John with St.Mark on Maundy Thursday.

Mary was a stalwart of St.John's who along with her husband John (In Memoriam Summer 2014) contributed so much to the parish for more than half a century. From their home on Seedfield Road they hosted fellowship groups and encouraged a great number of people in their faith.

In his funeral address, Paul spoke of the impact that Mary had on his life. As a young man, Paul attended the study groups and in fact first met his wife Diane there. In recent years Mary supported Paul during his journey to ordained ministry and his role as NSM in the parish and benefice.

Mary's churchmanship was of the Anglo-Catholic variety and she enjoyed worshipping at Holy Trinity, Bury and visiting Mirfield as well as her time at St.John's.

Mary's role was of a supportive presence in the background and Paul likened her to the many ladies called Mary that associated with Jesus in the Bible and spoke of their devotion, loyalty and support.

Mary was received into church on the evening of Wednesday 12 April. It was so appropriate that her funeral should take place in Holy Week - a week that was so important to Mary during her life. Earlier in the year her son Simon had travelled to Bury from his home in Australia to visit her. The funeral service was transmitted live to him down under through Skype. Please pray for Sue, David and Simon and all Mary's family as they grieve for her.

Joining with the family of God the Father to pray "Come Holy Spirit"

Last year more than 100,000 people joined the Archbishops of Canterbury and York to pray in the 10 days between Ascension and Pentecost.

This year, even more are expected to join in as this initiative has "gone global". From 25 May – 4 June 2017 churches are being encouraged to join in. The aim is simple and threefold:

- To join in prayer with the whole family of God the Father
- To pray for the empowering of God the Holy Spirit
- That we may be effective witnesses to Jesus Christ, God the Son

We begin our celebrations with the Benefice Boundary Walk on Saturday 6 May, where once again we will be stopping at various places on the walk for prayer. This begins at 9.00am (see next page).

During the 10 days from Ascension to Pentecost, both our churches will be open during the week beginning Monday 29 May for an hour from 5.30pm for a time of prayer. This will begin with a short service of Evening Prayer.



To mark the end of this Wave of Prayer everyone is invited to a special Service of Prayer for God's blessing on Bury. This will take place on Pentecost Sunday, 4 June at 2.30pm at All Saints Parish Church in Brandlesholme.

Please join in with this global event and pray "thy kingdom come".

Our annual Benefice walk around the Boundary of the two Parishes will take place this year on Saturday 6th May. ST JOHN WITH ST MARK APCM

As has been customary for the last few years, this was held after the Sunday service on 2nd April 2017. Prior to the meeting Rosemarie Ashworth was elected as Church Warden with Keith Duckworth appointed Deputy. Ray Smith is to take a break as warden after almost 20 years continued service and thanks were recorded to him for the dedication he has provided to our Church. His services will be greatly missed. Ray will continue to serve on PCC.

After approving the Child Protection Policy statement, there was an opportunity to discuss the PCC report.

Ian once again presented a detailed Treasurer's report, explaining the income and expenditure for the last year. Major items of expenditure included the replacement of the remaining panels on the corridor between Church and Hall and the barge boards above the West Window. We were reminded of the importance of considering our own regular giving and also how we give.

In Dave's report, we were reminded how we missed the contribution of faithful members who were no longer with us or active in Church life, and asked who will be the new leaders willing to take on new roles. Dave also remarked how we would miss Nickie Kelley and her involvement in youth work. Nickie has recently moved out of the area.

The three year Deanery Synod terms have now come to an end. However all four existing members agreed to continue and were all elected. There was then the appointment of PCC members and sidespeople and the opportunity to review reports from the various Church groups and organisations, and the events they participated in during 2016.

At the end of the meeting we were informed that Reverend Ralph Mallinson would celebrate 50 years of ordination on Sunday 21st May and would be presiding at that day's service.

CHRIST CHURCH APCM

There were 24 members of the church present at the meeting held on Tuesday 4 April 2017.

Treasurers Report: the bookkeeper's report was included in the report to the meeting. Nigel Silvester has been the bookkeeper for the last 12 months and is retiring. The parish share for the 2017 financial year is £32,730.32. The accounts have been approved as a true and correct record by Mr Alastair Gillian DipFS ACIB who had indicated his willingness to act again.

Presentation of the Electoral Roll Report: There were 106 persons on the Electoral roll when it closed.

Copies of the written reports are available from the back of church.

Election of Wardens: Jennifer Wood and Brian Crow had been proposed and seconded as wardens. There being no further nominations they were duly elected.

Election of Sidespersons: All those who had agreed to be sidespersons were elected. They were:

Miss P.J. Hoyle, Mrs J. Slater, Mr D.J. Peters, Ms K. Hawkins, Mr I. Riddick, Mr W. Noble, Mr G.Hamilton, Mrs B. Walker and Mr J. Edwards.

The Archdeacon's visitation is at Christ Church Walmersley 7.30pm, 18 May.

Appointment of Verger: the vicar thanked George Fryer for his work over the past years and noted that Jason Edwards had offered to be verger. He was proposed, seconded and elected.

Ratification of Child Protection Policy: The Vicar was the Child Protection co-ordinator in 2016/17. The policy has been approved by the PCC and is included in the Annual Report. It was noted that Cath Hilton had accepted the role of safeguarding coordinator and this was to be approved at the next PCC meeting.

Vicars Remarks: The vicar read certain sections of the Archdeacon's visitation report, following his visit June 2016. It was noted that the first sentence of the Archdeacon's report on the church stated "the condition of the church building is a cause for concern". The vicar then went on to say that Christ Church is ranked 210 out of 259 parishes in the diocese by index of Multiple Deprivation (1= most deprived) i.e. it is in the top 50, whereas St John with St Mark's is in the bottom 50. Further examples from the report

were cited. A copy is filed with the APCM minutes. The vicar went on to discuss the second meeting of the Task Group with the representatives of the diocese, Colin Barson, Heather Ford and Mike Chesterton. The purpose of this meeting was the conduction of a community audit. Colin Barson had offered to work with Christ Church on the setting up of Focus Groups to allow us to move forward with the community audit, which will work with neighbours and partners to clarify what is needed for Christ Church both now and in the future. The vicar again discussed the work done by the architects on the three proposals for the future of Christ Church and outlined the costs of the synopsis of the church renovation costs and the work to be done in the parish magazine. The vicar finished by commending the use of the focus groups to everyone.

AOB: The vicar noted that he had received an offer from Co-op Funeral Services to help in conservation of the churchyard. There was a short discussion regarding what they may do and the question of timing was raised.

At Christmas time there is no Nativity set at Christ Church, the vicar asked that if someone would be prepared to purchase one it would be welcomed.

The vicar also gave thanks to those who had worked on the garden of remembrance and also gave thanks to all who work for Christ Church he stated that your support and your friendship is appreciated.

Alan Spencer suggested a timeline for the parish should be made for the Church Hall.

The meeting closed with prayer at 8.54pm.

THE WALKING GROUP



Our latest walk on 1st April took us to Stoodley Pike and the surrounding area. It was new to some of us but not for others. Five of us assembled at Christ Church Walmersley and Paul drove us to Todmorden,

where we parked up by a small sports field on the A6033. We then made our way towards a section of the Rochdale Canal and along there we found the marker point between Lancashire and Yorkshire. We spent most of our day on the Yorkshire side.

After leaving the canal we made an ascent to the Warland Reservoir where we could soon see the Stoodley Pike monument and then shortly after joined a section of the Pennine Way. It was one of those days when the weather was chopping and changing every hour or so and by 11.00am the sun had come out and was quite warm therefore we decided it was a good time to pause for refreshment before continuing our climb to the tower. The tower looks quite a dominating feature as you approach. Once there we decided to have a climb to the base of the obelisk.

Michael's notes he handed to me advised the base can be reached by a stone staircase, which spirals upwards in horrific darkness. I would not like to admit that the darkness was "horrific", however it is true to say that you cannot see your hand in front of your face and have to feel your way up and down the steps with the toe and heel of your boots. It is worth the climb though, and it was only a few steps, as you have a great view of the Calder Valley and nearby Heptonstall.



We descended from the monument and walked for a further mile or so before stopping for lunch.

Our route continued towards the area of Lumbutts and then we picked up a track overlooking Walsden, which eventually led us back to the Rochdale Canal, which we walked along for about half a mile before arriving back at the car.



Nejebar's story

It is better to die in a camp than to die in a war.

That's what Nejebar thinks.

It's better to travel for months, in rain and snow, with young children. To walk until you injure your feet. To risk your children's lives in a plastic dinghy. And to leave everything you know behind.

When the alternative is fear and terror, almost anything is better. When the alternative is bombs, bullets and war, almost anything is better.

Nejebar's husband Noor was a teacher in Afghanistan. Imagine the horror the family felt when the Taliban announced they would kill anyone, like Noor, who worked for the government. Almost anything has to be better than that.

But now they've arrived in Greece, all they have is a tent. They have no other protection against wind and rain. There's no school for their five children. And they have no certainty or clear idea of what will happen to them now. They thought they would stay here for 10 days, but it's already been six months and there's no end in sight.
