
We've just come back from Manchester after seeing a show at the Palace Theatre – one of our pensioner days out. Nothing unusual about that except it's June 1^{st} just 10 days after the terrible attack at the Arena. The Metrolink has been running again to Victoria station for only two days and you could still cut the atmosphere with a knife, plenty of people but oh so silent!

It reminded me of a trip in France to Oradour–sur-Glane, a village completely destroyed by the Nazis in reprisal for resistance activity, full of people – sightseers like us – but all in reverent silence or hushed tones.

Outside the station there was a large security presence of police officers from all over the place, especially Merseyside and Wales judging from their vehicles, many of whom were armed. At the doors of the theatre security men were checking tickets and bags before you were allowed to enter the foyer. I've got to admit I found it all a bit threatening; more so than after the many IRA bombings in Manchester.

It made me think again about where do we find our security? Is it as the Arms manufacturers insist - in buying more of their lethal weapons? Is it by carrying a knife to school or on a night out? Is it like us by having an alarm system fitted and working? Is it having a we bank balance "to see us through"? Or is like a baby having a teddy and a security blanket? Some might think that by having faith in Jesus it's a security blanket, something soft and woolly.

But they'd be wrong!



The word **secure** is only found twice in the New Testament – in 2 Peter 3:17 and in Paul's letter to the Hebrews 6:19.

Peter is reminding us of the way we should conduct our lives, that we will be scoffed at, and to guard ourselves that we won't be carried away by the errors of evil people and fall from our **secure** position.

Paul tackles head on what that **secure** position is. It's the certainty of God's Promise. And the promise is that he will make the world over anew – completing the work begun in Jesus. Paul likens it to a strong anchor (Jesus) that we are secured to by a great metal cable or chain, and as long as we don't let go of that cable we are anchored to the presence of God. All the winds, tides and storms that might come can't shift us. We are promised that we will be kept safe. We must hang on and be patient through thick and thin. This promise Paul assures us can be regarded as firm and **secure**, holding onto hope and persevering in faith. It's not a security blanket, all soft, woolly, optimistic and with a vague sense that everything will turn out alright. Our Christian faith is trusting God and going on trusting

through thick and thin, hard as it may be at times when atrocities occur. God makes an unbreakable promise to make all things anew, a promise that He will keep.

So as the hymn says "Will your anchor hold in the storms of life..."

It will, if we securely hold on to the cable that links us to the anchor that is Jesus.

Christ Church, meeting held on 14 June

- 1. Opening prayers were led by Revd. Dave Thompson.
- 2. The meeting was opened by the vicar introducing the Archdeacon David Bailey who had come to address the PCC on the work of the Task group. The following points were raised by the Archdeacon.
 - a. The task group had met three times with one additional meeting. The members of the task group were named and comprised of members of the PCC and the Diocesan staff.
 - b. The focus points of the task group for discussion were the mission and financial strength of Christ church, the Buildings and the church field.
 - c. It was stressed by the Archdeacon that if we are clear about the first point the others will follow on.
 - d. In order to move forward on the first point it was deemed necessary to have focus groups led by people from the diocese and the PCC. The focus groups were to be the Friends of Walmersley representatives, the church Hall users, the wider community and the congregation.
 - e. The church has had its 2017 Quinquennial inspection recently.
 - f. The point was made that the existing church buildings are not sustainable for the future and we need to talk to the wider community about facilities to serve the community better.
 - g. The Archdeacon stated that it was important for the PCC to try and come to a conclusion on all the above points by the autumn.
 - h. There was then a discussion on various points regarding the focus groups. The vicar distributed around the PCC a sheet that he had prepared to invite people to a meeting with representatives from Manchester Diocese and Christ Church on the 10th of July 2017.
- 3. The minutes of the 10th May PCC meeting were passed as a true record.
- 4. It was proposed by Ian Riddick we employ the previous contractor to cut the grass in the church yard, seconded by Barbara Taylor; all in favour.

- 5. Brian Crow gave an account of the current finances of the church indicating a figure of £8255 in the account.
- 6. There were items of correspondence on church field grass cutting, lightning conductor inspection and Synod and board of finance reports.
- 7. Items for action on the Archdeacons visitation report were on-going.
- 8. Various aspects of Children's ministry were discussed.
- 9. It was noted that refreshments will be available after the 10.30am confirmation service on the 9th of July.
- 10. The next café church is on the 17th of September.
- 11. It was determined to invite the Revd. Nick Smeeton from the diocese to speak on Vocations at some point in the future.
- 12. The PCC committees remained as they were in 2016.
- 13. The vicar noted that we were running a stewardship campaign in October this year finishing at the joint service with St Johns and St Marks in October.
- 14. The vicar also reported that a new nativity set was to be purchased from a donation received by the church.

St John with St Mark, meeting held on 15 June

Upcoming social dates for summer were confirmed including the Scouts' cream tea on Saturday 22nd July, coffee morning and book fair on Saturday 29th July and summer buffet on Sunday 27th August.

The summer fair took just over £1000, which was down on previous years. A discussion took place over the future date of this event to see if we can avoid clashes with school half terms and other local events. It was also suggested that coffee mornings and book fairs could take place bi-monthly to boost income.

Bury Library Services will stage a consultation meeting on Wednesday 28th June to decide on the future of the library. Any decisions that need to be taken by the PCC over future use of the room will be discussed after this meeting has taken place pending the outcome. The Vicar also suggested that any discussions should form part of our future Mission Action Plan.

Ian again appealed for contributions from groups for the website as some pages have now not been updated for several months and that he was still looking at a potential new provider for the site. Dave advised that he will try to see Adam Cooper with regards to developing the social media pages.

We have purchased some additional hymn books with money left from the legacy of Mona Haworth. These are large print copies and music copies. It was also suggested that we should find ways to make visitors and new people to the Church more aware that we have large print hymn books if required.

A midweek parade service will take place on Wednesday 12th July at 6.30pm in the Hall.

Christian Aid Week: standing with refugees like Nejebar


Nejebar and her family have fled horrors in Afghanistan, where her husband was threatened with torture and death for being a government worker.

But now they've arrived in Greece, all they have is a tent. They have no other protection against wind and rain. There's no school for their five children. And they have no certainty or clear idea of what will happen to them now. They thought they would stay here for 10 days, but it's already been six months and there's no end in sight.

Nejebar's husband Noor describes their initial reaction to arriving in the camp in Greece: 'It was like suicide for us. But we took the decision that it is better to die here than to die there from war.'

You've helped us be there for refugees since 1945

Thanks to you, Christian Aid has been there for refugees like Nejebar since 1945, providing essential food, shelter and legal assistance for people far from home. And we still believe in life before death.

Walking Group



Michael Ryan volunteered to lead our walk on 10th June, and I asked if we could do a rerun of a previous outing he had lead in March 2016 (because I had missed it first time). The walk took in Stubbins, Holcombe and beyond,

and included guided notes with a brief history of some of the buildings and features we passed.

It was an extremely wet start to the day when we huddled in the car on Parkinson Street at 9.30am. However as it was the intention to drive to Nuttall Park, it had actually improved when we began our walk, so although not perfect, we did actually fare quite well for the remainder of the day.

After leaving Nuttall Park we walked a short distance to the Irwell Valley Way to Chatterton and Stubbins and journeyed through a tunnel under the East Lancashire Railway, which was also the site of the former Stubbins Railway station. We passed the former mill buildings in the village including the Stubbins Vale Mill. As Gill and I had not previously seen this, we climbed up the banking to the mill's Tenter Tower. It was worth the effort to see this former cloth store (c1866).

We continued through the National Trust's Buckden Wood, crossing the river Irwell at times and had our elevenses stop. After our rest we journeyed along the edge of the Holcombe Moor track towards the foot of Holcombe Hill and Holcombe Old Road. We then dropped down to Bolton Road and along here we discussed a cottage with a plaque making reference to the Female Union Society (c1824) associated with votes and political rights for women. Leaving Holcombe Brook by the Pot Green conservation area we headed towards Summerseat and discussed the nearby proposed Garden City development.

We headed into Summerseat towards the Waterside Bridge and picked up the track back towards Nuttall Park for the journey home.

It was an interesting and informative day lead by Michael, and again I saw areas that I have not previously seen. Not bad really, to say we thought we would never get started at 9.30am!

The Open Group met on Wednesday 14th June for a talk led by Ian Banks with the title 'Ian's Curiosity Shop' and a large wooden chest greeted us as we entered the library room.

Since our last meeting in May many events have occurred both locally and nationally and we took some time to reflect on those during our opening service. We also remembered Open Group regular Wilf Coote, who had sadly passed away that same day.

Ian opened the meeting by playing some music from the popular 1950's pianist Winifred Atwell. For somebody like myself, who rather ashamedly had not previously heard of this artist, it was apparent that she had a great influence on the music and artists of that era. He then played other vinyls from his collection including a record banned by the BBC in 1957.

Next we had some photographs from Ian's family tree, going back to his great-great-grandparents. Like we heard from Margery last time, Ian has done some research into his family tree, and confirmed Margery's findings that researching your descendants is certainly not straightforward and requires a lot of hard work. The findings took us back to a mariner in Australia.

Out of the chest came various artefacts, including a small frog ornament and perhaps rather appropriately, given that we had just celebrated Trinity Sunday, we were informed how this came to represent the Trinity with its three stages of life.

Two rugs which adorn the home of Ian & June were also brought along and we took some time to study the symbolism of the motifs, including the Tree of Life.

We were also given the history of how an early 17th century map of the UK was originally drawn by an Elizabethan spy and came to be horizontal rather than vertical.

'Ian's Curiosity Shop' was advertised as including 'A Very Old Book' and that turned out to be an early King James Bible, which had been passed down through the generations and was handled extremely delicately with a glove and rested on a cushion. 

Christian Meditation Group

It was a blessing for my wife and I, Christine and David McKenna, oblates of the ecumenical World Community for Christian Meditation (WCCM), to share the six weeks introduction to Christian Meditation Series, within the peaceful setting of The Lady Chapel in St John with St Mark's Church, Bury.

As we presented the series we also shared in the group's "awakenings", as they discovered not only the WCCM's ecumenical communities "calling" to share the simple contemplative, meditative Christian Tradition known as "The Prayer of The Heart", as rediscovered by the Benedictine monk Fr. John Main and continued by Benedictine monk Fr. Laurence Freeman, but as they discovered that this contemplative practice has its roots in the Christian Desert Fathers and Mothers, further, as a realisation began to emerge within them, of a need in their lives for a time, space and practice that opens them to "Resting in The Lord".

It was a joy to hear that those gathered wished for the **Christian Meditation meetings to continue weekly on Tuesdays, 7:30pm, in The Lady Chapel of St John with St Mark's**, and to proceed with offering it to all who may feel the need of a way to open to a sense of inner peace. In this Christian contemplative practice of "The Prayer of The Heart" no previous meditative experience is necessary, for at every gathering, an opportunity is made for the newcomer to be introduced to its practical simplicity.



In this quiet time and place we put aside and gather together, once a week, we create

a "sacred space" born out of stillness and silence, where we firstly begin to become more aware of who we really are and begin to learn just how much we are accepted, loved, just as we are, just as we are created. We, secondly, in this "sacred space", begin to become more accepting of others, just as they are, to let others BE, as they are created and realise that is OK to just BE TOGETHER, quietly in a fellowship born out of this shared outer and inner stillness and silence. Thirdly, we begin to open more to and become more aware of the silent presence of Jesus, The Christ, within us and to just BE WITH HIM and, as Fr. John Main OSB wrote, "allow him to become more and more a reality in everything we do and everything we are", as we open to Him in our hearts, the centre of our Being. It continues to be a joy, also, to receive news of how this simple Christian meditation practice is being taken on by schools and how much it is helping our children to live a calmer life. We sometimes do not realise how much of our contemporary, stressful life, with its expectations of them, affects them too. Contemporary life imposes expectations upon us all, it is not age discriminative.
