<u>I was on holiday once</u>, over 25 years ago. I remember it particularly well because I was about 5 months pregnant with my first child (so everything was new to me). We had taken a ferry over to the Irish Republic, hired a car and driven to what felt like the end of the world. It was beautiful.

We stayed in a wing of a working farmhouse. The farmer's wife had had 10 or 12 children so everything was old hat to her but it certainly didn't feel like it to me. She was warm, welcoming, accommodating and very understanding. I suffered my one and only bout of pregnancy indigestion whilst I was there and she couldn't have been

kinder. She even offered to bring me breakfast in bed – this was a working farm not a 4\* hotel!

One evening on returning from the theatre (The Playboy of the Western World), the farmer and "Hospitality is making others feel at home. Some folks make you feel at home. Others make you wish you were." A.H. Glasgow

his wife had friends over for dinner and were on pudding. There was no way we were going to be left sitting in the guest lounge – we spent the rest of the evening like family, sitting and sharing around the family's table.

 $\underline{I}$  was on holiday once, not so long ago and  $\underline{I}$  went to church on the Sunday.  $\underline{I}$  was spoken to by only 1 person other than the official greeter – and that was to ask me to move because  $\underline{I}$  was sitting in their friend's seat!

Which of these is the best demonstration of hospitality? Which of these is the best representation of heaven? Which of these is the best representation of our church?

Some people who cross our paths may not be like us. They may dress differently, talk differently, vote differently, hold different things in high (or low) esteem. There are people who are not like us. There are people who we don't like. There are people who don't like us. But there is no-one to whom we shouldn't show hospitality.

At the root of the word 'hospitality' is the Latin 'hostis' which means stranger or enemy – where we eventually get hostility from. There's not much of a leap from one word to the other, is there – hostility to hospitality?

My Irish holiday was a fantastic experience of being on the receiving end of true hospitality – and that born out of a business idea. My church experience was unfortunately rooted in the other meaning of 'hostis'. But really, how much more hospitable ought we to be as Christians – born out of sacrificial love?

Peter and Paul both taught the early church to show hospitality:



'Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers'. Romans 12 v13

'Be hospitable to one another without grumbling'. 1Peter 4 v9

'Do not forget to entertain strangers, for by so doing some have unwittingly entertained angels'. Hebrews 13 v2

Remember Jesus was eventually shown hospitality after the 'no room in the inn' episode - I bet my Irish landlady wouldn't have turned Mary and Joseph away. Which version of 'hostis' do you practise - not only to visitors to church but on a day to day basis? Do these strangers want to come back and know more about the source of your hospitality, Jesus the Son of God?

# From the Vicarage

\* Thank you to everyone for your contributions to last month's Harvest Festivals. The food has been delivered to the Victoria House Night Shelter in Openshaw, the Porch Box Project and the Booth Centre. A special thanks to all those who took part in the services and also to those who delivered the plants and food. As usual Springside School held their Harvest Service in Christ Church, whilst for the first time in a number of years, St.John with St.Mark School also held their service in church. It is good that this practice has been revived and hopefully similar other school events will be held in church.

Porch Box are always in need of food items to meet the current demand. They are very grateful for our support. A box is available to collect food gifts at the back of both churches. Please support this worthy cause.

- \* A new singing/social group has been set up meeting every Thursday afternoon at the Salvation Army Church in Brookshaw Street. This is open to all those over 55 between 2-4pm. Entry charge of £2 is put towards the cost of a hot drink and lots of biscuits.
- \* Our neighbouring parish of St.Mary the Virgin will welcome their new Rector this month. The Revd. Julian Heaton currently serving in the Diocese of Chester will be inducted at the Parish Church on the afternoon of Sunday 19 November. Please pray for Julian and his family as they prepare for ministry in our town.
- \* As our new Patron arrives so our Archdeacon leaves! The farewell service for David Bailey will be held in Manchester Cathedral on Sunday 26 November, beginning at 5.30pm. This is almost 9 years to the day since his licensing as Archdeacon of Bolton. Not only will we miss David as Archdeacon but also David & Kathryn as parishioners. Please pray for them as they prepare to move to their retirement home in Ripon.
- \* The next meeting of the MOB Men of the Benefice takes place on Monday 27 November. We will be having a meal at a local restaurant. Further details in church nearer the time.

- \* The Ministry Team consisting of all the Clergy, Licensed Readers and our Authorised Lay Minister meet every month usually on the second Monday evening. If you have an issue that you would like us to discuss, please have a word with me.
- \* Any enquiries about baptisms or weddings / marriage banns etc should be made at the Parish Office at St.John with St.Mark's Hall any Wednesday evening between 6.30-7.00.
- \* Bury Churches Together are looking to set up a Care Home Friends scheme to visit those in residential homes who have no visitors. If you can chat, read, do crosswords simply spend some time with someone overlooked by society please speak to Gill for more details and to register your interest. Training and support will be offered for volunteers, with the initial training to be held on 11 November.
- \* Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the wardens.
- \* Meetings of the Churches Together in Bury take place bi-monthly on the third Monday of the month at various venues around the town, beginning at 7.30pm. The next meeting is on 20 November. More details are in the Bulletins / News Sheets. Everyone is welcome to attend.
- \* Both of our Church Halls are available for a whole range of activities for use by church and community groups. Please however check with the bookings officers (June Banks for St.John with St.Mark and Jennifer Wood for Christ Church) if the building is otherwise occupied before anything is arranged.

#### Meeting of Christ Church PCC held on 12th Sept 2017

- 1. New gates for Ackworth Street were approved, at a cost of £1,800 plus VAT.
- A letter had been received from Smiths of Derby offering a discounted three year service plan for the clock in the tower. The offer was approved by the PCC.
- 3. Bury Council had contacted us regarding their local development plan. The secretary stated that he would respond requesting that the church field be included in the new development plan.
- 4. The PCC approved a further payment of £2,000 for the month of September in addition to our standing order of £2,000 per month.
- 5. The vicar told the meeting that our parish share for 2018 will be £30,125, the lowest for the last 5 years.
- 6. The vicar noted that the congregation focus group would take place in the church hall on Sunday the 17th of September. The final focus group involving the wider community will take place on the 30th September. After this the diocese group will forward recommendations to the task force group. In addition it was decided that the PCC would make further church visits, to Kersal and Elton.
- 7. There was a meeting on Sunday the 10th Sept. with the children who were recently confirmed, it was agreed that the group would meet once a month and topics were to be decided.
- 8. Nick Smeaton is to be asked to come and talk to the congregation regarding vocations on the 29th April 2018 (date to be confirmed).
- 9. It was noted that the loose carpets in the side aisles in church pose a health and safety concern; it was agreed they should be removed.
- 10. New booking regulations for the church hall will be circulated to all PCC members for information and comments.
- 11. The vicar noted that the Stewardship campaign will begin at the beginning of October and run through October until the 29th. A question was raised regarding trustee appointment, the secretary was asked to look into this. The new nativity figures that are to be purchased for the church were discussed.

#### CAPTAIN AUSTIN PATRICK HUDSON

In this month of Remembrance, it seems appropriate to share with you a moment from the Thursday evening Holy Communion Service at St. John with St. Mark a few weeks back.

For those of you who read our Website, you may have observed the new section dedicated to the men from our two Parishes that lost their lives during the First World War, and who are commemorated on the plaque in the Memorial Chapel, taken from the old St. John's Church on The Rock.



Thanks to this section I discovered something about one of these men, Captain Austin Patrick Hudson, who was also the son of the Reverend Richard Hudson, the then Vicar of St. John's Church at that time.

Captain Hudson was killed by a shell at Ypres on the night of 31st August 1917 and 100 years later, on Thursday 31st August 2017, a small number of us present at the Holy Communion Service took an opportunity to remember him and the sacrifice he made for our country, and Paul conducted a brief eulogy and reflection. Although there were only a handful of people present at this service, it was a very moving experience to be there.

There is a separate plaque to Captain Hudson in the Chapel from his parents 'In Proud and Loving Memory', which we took time to look at after the service. It is inscribed with his date of death of 31st August 1917, aged just 24.

Thanks to Ian for highlighting this on the Website and also to Mark Hone of Bury Grammar School Boys for providing us with additional details.

#### SATURDAY WALKING GROUP



As Paul was away this month, Michael volunteered to put the latest walk together for us on 7th October. I had remarked in a previous conversation with Michael that I quite liked Rooley Moor Road when we had last

walked along it. Therefore it was decided that we would cover the whole stretch of this route. That is except for the first two miles of the road through the Northern outskirts of Rochdale as it is quite urbanised. We were extremely grateful to Margaret Brennan for offering to drive us to our starting point as this made the transport arrangements much easier. After leaving the car, we walked the short distance to Catley Lane Head.

Rooley Moor Road is an old 13th Century pack horse and carter route, which was originally used for the wool trade. It was widely known as the 'Cotton Famine Road', owing to the Rochdale millworkers support for the struggle against slavery during the American Civil War (1861-1865). Lancashire workers joined President Abraham Lincoln's fight against slavery, and despite a blockade of ports causing a shortage of cotton supplies coming to Rochdale causing the 'cotton famine', the men continued their support. Slavery was eventually abolished in America in 1865.

Shortly after leaving Catley Lane Head you reach a plaque, which was unveiled as part of the BBC's 'Black History' series last year to commemorate these millworkers of the time. We paused for a photograph here.

We continued along the five miles of Rooley Moor Road, and although it was quite cloudy we did occasionally get some good views across the region of towns such as Rochdale, Oldham, Ashton and landmarks including the Etihad Stadium and ski slope in Manchester.

Our route picked up a section of the Pennine Bridleway and took us past Knowl Hill Greenbooth Reservoir, working farms and the sites of disused quarries.

It was occasionally quite blustery so we found a sheltered spot alongside Cowpe Reservoir for lunch around 11.45am. After lunch we continued the rest of the route to Stacksteads and walked the final mile to Waterfoot along the old railway track bed of the former Rawtenstall to Bacup railway line (closed 1966) including under the quarter mile Newchurch Tunnel.

We arrived in Waterfoot just in time to board the 1.03pm return bus service back to Walmersley. We had covered around 7 miles and the four of us who went enjoyed the day.

No arrangements have been confirmed for 4th November at the time of writing this report however it is hoped that Geoff Hamilton will lead us on 2nd December for an exploration of former mill works, covering areas including Owd Betts, Ashworth Valley, Deeply Vale and Bircle. We will depart from Christ Church for this one.

Everyone, male or female, is welcome to come along to our meetings you will be most welcome.


