That sounds good we thought, let's go for it. Off we went to Thomas Cook and booked a cruise holiday. And by the time you are reading this Barbara and I will have sailed the Mediterranean and be back home!

We all enjoy going off on holiday. Travelling to new places; experiencing for ourselves the sights and sounds of foreign lands. Yes, there is the hassle of check-in; the concern in our minds as to whether all the arrangements will go smoothly. But as someone recently said, get over the potholes and focus on the destination! Our Creator God has given us an amazing world so, if we can, as opportunity allows, let's get out there and explore it!

Cruising in the Mediterranean has made me think of those in the Bible who went cruising. Paul sailed often as he travelled around taking the Gospel to new people on his missionary journeys. Jonah famously ran off to sea to try and avoid God's call. Even Jesus spent time on

They both found that what they encountered on their travels left their mark on them. Holidays, time away from the day to day treadmill, do give to a chance to put life on pause – to take a breather – perhaps time to reflect on where you are on life's journey. And all the sights, sounds and encounters will feed into that reflection.

Jesus took to the sea and to the hills when he needed time to rest, to reflect on his life's journey. We all need to do that and if we are able to spend a little time in different surroundings it really does help our perspective on where we are at. It doesn't have to be a fortnight sailing around the Mediterranean – a day or two on retreat at Formby can be just as rewarding.

Perhaps, for Barbara and myself the cruise will live up to the advertising hype – and we will "Explore the world in you" and "Discover a new you over each horizon". Just as long as we don't end up shipwrecked (like Paul) or inside a whale (like Jonah) we will be back to tell you about it!



Wherever you are spending this holiday period I pray that you will have a chance to be still and know God that bit more and travel that bit closer to Jesus.

Christ Church May 21st

- 1. The meeting started with prayers by the vicar.
- 2. Apologies were received and noted.
- 3. The vicar welcomed Jason and Hazel to the PCC.
- 4. The acting treasurer reported on his discussions with the auditor and reported that they now both agreed on how the accounts should be reported in the future.
- 5. The PCC committees were formed and are required to report to each PCC meeting in the future. The vicar requested that he was advised of the dates committees were intending to meet.
- 6. The secretary will circulate the committee memberships and terms of reference for the committees.
- 7. The secretary will circulate a road map showing the process and decision points for the sale of the field.
- 8. The fund raising and social committee to meet with St Johns on October/November to finalise a future events date calendar for the two churches in 2019.
- 9. A pastoral meeting is required as soon as possible.
- 10. The visit of the Director of Ordinations from the diocese speaking in church regarding vocations was discussed by the vicar and the PCC.
- 11. Items from the Archdeacon's report not concluded should be put on the agenda for future meetings.
- 12. The synod report was distributed.
- 13. The two falls in church have been recorded in the accident book.
- 14. The church is working to ensure it meets the requirements of the New General Data Protection Regulations which comes into force on the 25th of May 2018.
- 15. A privacy note will be put up in church and also on the website. All PCC members have filled in a Data Protection form.
- 16. The GDPR will be a subject for future PCC meetings.
- 17. Cath Hilton will replace Barbara Taylor on the Deanery M & P committee.

The next PCC meeting is on the 2nd of July 2018.

Christian care for families

Revd Jackie Calow visited us to speak about Dementia Awareness. This was an open meeting and we had two non members joining us. The talk was really informative about a difficult subject. It included hands on involvement from the group and two members were human bookcases - from Ikea and Harrods!

The main points highlighted were:

- 1. Dementia is caused by diseases of the brain.
- 2. Dementia is not a natural part of ageing.
- 3. Dementia is not just about losing your memory.
- 4. It is possible to live well with dementia.
- 5. There's more to the person than the dementia.

On July 4th we are visiting Pendle Heritage Centre at Barrowford including afternoon tea. Again this is open to anyone, the cost being $\pounds 12$ concessions; $\pounds 14$ non concessions. Car transport will be available. Please let me have your name if you are interested.

Pendle Heritage Centre is a museum and visitor centre in Barrowford, dedicated to the history and heritage of Pendle. The heritage centre occupies Park Hill, a two-storey former farmhouse which has a 1661 date stone but was developed over an extended period between the 16th century and the beginning of the 18th century. The centre has an 18th-century walled garden and woodland walk, and houses the Pendle Arts Gallery.

So there is plenty to see for any who wish to spend more of the day there.

Our other meeting in July will be a service of Evensong on 18th. Everyone is invited to share in this traditional act of worship.

In August we will experience MULOA (Mothers' Union Listens, Observes, Acts) on $1^{\rm st}$ and Jan Bennett will talk to us on $15^{\rm th}$ about Operation Christmas Child.

On Thursday, 9th August we shall join other members in Bolton Archdeaconry for our annual festival, marking Mary Sumner Day. This year's service will be hosted at 7.30 pm by members at St George with St James Farnworth. Please let me know if you would like transport.

During the summer months we are getting involved in Mothers' Union's Summer of Hope Appeal by selling copies of a quiz to all who are interested. Copies are available through members of Mothers' Union for $\pounds 1$. The closing date is September 5th.

Times, which he found thought provoking and shared some of the pieces with us.

The copy of the Church Times which David receives is actually in a way of a circular in that it is given to him via Ralph & Helen Mallinson and then Ian Banks, so a good number of people get a read out of it from this Church. So we do our bit for the environment at the same time.

The stories that David read out included personal extracts from people discussing situations such as illness and faith stories. There was an article on Christian meditation written by Geoffrey Waterhouse, who is a meditation teacher at Wandsworth prison. Ten Explorers from Bury and Ramsbottom Explorer Group, including our very own Walmersleyites, James Weston, Freddie Nicol and Archie Nicol have been doing working to raise £8000 so that they can travel to Switzerland for a 10 day, 100 mile expedition which is known as the Explorer Belt. Very few Scouts attempt this challenge as it requires a huge amount of work and dedication and so to have 3 of our young leaders from Walmersley "giving it a go" is a source of great pride.

The night initially started off just as a Whisky Taster but as that was quite restrictive - having to have a penchant for Whisky - it soon grew including Prosecco and Wine along with a cheese platter and cakes. And to top it off - a Body Shop promotion.

The hall was decorated with bunting and looked fabulous - especially as it was also the day of the Royal Wedding and was so well attended that we only just fitted everyone in. The Whisky tasting was hosted by a fellow Scout Leader from Oldham who was extremely knowledgeable about the Scottish Whiskies and also very generous with his portions which did help a lot! The ladies enjoyed a more relaxed evening talking amongst themselves and drinking prosecco or wine and also had the opportunity to talk to a Body Shop rep who did a talk and samples show after.

Food was on hand during the evening and all in all it was a huge success. The boys managed to raise a staggering £1,124.79 which has taken the final overall figure to £9,500.00. I think it is safe to say that the first and hardest challenge has been well and truly met. My father, David Brian Cook, passed away peacefully on the 11th of June in Exeter. His mother, Sarah Elizabeth Cook (formally Almond) was a member of your congregation her whole life and belonged to the Mothers' Union there. She worked at Know Mill.

He was born at The Infirmary on 28 December 1930 and was a choir boy with you from the age of 5 till 12. He studied at Christ Church Primary School, received a scholarship to Bury Grammar School and then went on to Manchester Tech to study Municipal Engineering. He was an onward looking man who never looked back. My father lived on Fairlands Road. His sister was called Enid, and his father, George Cook.

He spent his whole working life trying to improve the lives of the urban poor, all over the world. He received the George Stephenson Medal in 2004 for a report on Urban Poverty. He was a Fellow of both the Institution of Civil and Municipal Engineers and a Chartered Engineer. He worked for the World Bank in Washington DC and for the United Nations, and on the 1st Uhuru Estate Project in Nairobi, Kenya - where I was born. He worked in over 40 countries and visited more than 50.

I am his only child and have three children. I think it is important that my father and what he achieved, be remembered in Walmersley, for the sake of the youngsters of today and tomorrow. I do hope his memory will not be forgotten in your part of the woods. If anybody from the Parish can remember my father - Brian Cook or Spike, in those days, I would love to hear from them. Humbly,
