As in the analogy above about gardening I don't wait for my fruit to arrive to tend my trees and plants. The work starts a long time before or there would be no fruit to harvest. The same is what we should be doing in church. No matter how many people attend we must invigorate and prepare the ground if we are hoping to grow more people on the church vine.

If my little lemon tree can grow in Miles Platting I'm sure we can grow our church.

#### Joint PCC meeting of 12th July 2018

The two PCCs met, after the service of Thursday evening Holy Communion at St. John with St. Mark, for their bi-annual meeting to discuss and update the latest from the joint Mission Action Plan.

It was felt we were doing well with social events with regular meetings of Men of the Benefice, Girls out Alone and also the walking group. Any other ideas are welcome.

We need to do more to encourage vocations to lay and ordained ministries across the Benefice, with the thought that we need to look at which areas we require a particular development in and which roles need filling.

Social media has developed with the introduction of Facebook pages and Barbara Taylor has now also set up a Benefice Twitter account under the name of CofE on Walmersley Road.

The magazine was discussed following reports that this was running at a loss. It has been confirmed that this is not the case, even though it was noted that we do have additional copies left over at the end of each month. It was agreed that we may need to push the magazine sales with ideas including putting a note on the weekly sheet on the last Sunday of each month, when it comes out, and announcing during the Sunday notices that the new magazines are available.

The next joint PCC meeting is expected to be just before Christmas.

# St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 21st June 2018

The only upcoming social date is the summer buffet on Sunday 26th August after the 10.30am service.

The old Website is now obsolete as of the end of June 2018.

Disabled access is still being looked at, particularly the route from Church to Hall near the table store.

It was noted we were unable to open Church during the 'Thy Kingdom Come' week in May due to a shortage of volunteers.

We will be continuing with the theme of 'Setting God's People Free' at our Café Church services on 2nd September and also in December. People said they had enjoyed the last Café Church service in June more and the attendances were slightly higher.

Jews for Jesus have acknowledged the money that was donated to them following the Seder Meal in March.

Ian has made us aware of some First Aid training that was being organised by the British Red Cross if anybody is interested.

Recent expenditure included servicing of fire extinguishers at £301 and heating at £792. Despite the lower numbers at the Summer Fair it was noted that we had made an amount of £1200 so thanks to all for their help and those who attended and spent. We have received a legacy of £1000 from the estate of Jean Chesters.

Following the new GDPR legislation that came into effect in May, we have had responses from 60 people. The list of responders will be reviewed in case we need to drop a gentle reminder to anyone prominent who may have forgotten the form. We now need to be careful how we contact people.

Health & Safety - PAT testing needs finishing; the cost of a defibrillator will work out at £750. If we go ahead with one, we will need to ensure there are adequate volunteers who are trained up to use it.

Following an increase in the number of people now attending the 8.30am service, it has become difficult to administer communion. The Choir stalls were not deemed suitable therefore it was noted that this service will now take place in the Barritt Room from 1st July.

The next PCC meeting will be on Thursday 6th September at 8.00pm.



Members spent a most enjoyable afternoon at Pendle Heritage Centre at Barrowford. There was time to explore the house and gardens in gloriously sunny weather before partaking of a delicious afternoon tea. If you haven't been to the Centre it is well worth a visit (just off Junction 13 of the M65).

For our second July meeting Barbara Silvester, Reader and Mothers' Union member, led a service of said Evensong, according to the Book of Common Prayer – having first told us some of its history.

Cath Hilton (Diocesan President) and Christine Sharp (Diocesan President elect) presented a evening on MULOA (Mothers' Union Listens, Observes, Acts) to help us consider how we can make a difference in our own community and worldwide. Plenty of thoughts and ideas were generated from members.

Forthcoming meetings include our 109<sup>th</sup> Birthday Party and a talk by Jean Slater on Holman Hunt. Please let me know if you would like a lift to our Deanery Festival at St Peter's.

More details will soon be available of our Celebration Evening.

For our meeting on Wednesday 11th July, we were pleased to welcome Elizabeth Bailey, John & Margaret Brennan's daughter, to talk about her work as a

teaching practitioner at Turton High School near Bromley Cross. The school was awarded an overall rating of Good in its last Ofsted Inspection.

Elizabeth is a Religious Education teacher, however the subject is known as Faith & Ethics at Turton High. It was an eagerly anticipated talk as this is also a non-faith school, so we were looking forward to hearing how Elizabeth's role fitted in at the school. She came armed with various text books and literature, which were handed round. "It's just like being back at school this", I heard one of our members say in a light-hearted way.

Elizabeth spoke briefly about how she had always had a passion for teaching and how she came to where she is now. We were then shown a YouTube video clip which interviewed pupils of high school age and asked what they thought of Religion & Ethics and whether it was relevant today. It is quite clear the subject is still very important, as we could hear from their views in the video.

The subject gives the opportunity for pupils to become involved in diverse debates and discussions, but how they also show respect and compassion for each others views. The pupils still learn about the major world religions, including Christianity, Islam & Hinduism, amongst others, which reflect the community we all now belong to. There are also opportunities to discuss local and international issues such as prejudice, war and discrimination.

It became quite clear that Elizabeth values her work enormously and is extremely passionate about her profession. As a teaching practitioner you can spend more time with pupils to develop their knowledge and confidence, a role Elizabeth clearly enjoys.

After time for questions, we had tea & coffee, when there was also an opportunity for another look at the different books that had been brought along.

It was a very lively and informative talk from Elizabeth, and we were grateful for her time to come to the Open Group.


