This is not a particularly Anglican hymn, but do you know this one from its chorus?

We have an anchor that keeps the soul Steadfast and sure while the billows roll. Fastened to the rock which cannot move, Grounded firm and deep in the Saviour's love.

I've no idea when or where I heard and learned this, but I've just typed it out from memory!

Anchors are strange things. They promise security but don't stop you from being buffeted about on the surface. On holiday, last month in Torbay, my son and I dared each other to swim out to the 5k buoy (speed marker, not distance!) and when we got there, we grabbed hold of the



bright yellow buoy anchored securely to the sea bed but could we climb on it? Try as we might we were thrown about and tossed back into the water even though this was Torbay and the calmest of seas imaginable. The buoy was secure; it was anchored; we knew exactly where we were but we were still not having an 'easy' time of it.

I often think our Christian life is like this – we know where we're going. Our salvation is assured but the journey through it is sometimes tough and wild, sometimes placid or even boring... Our journey may be either easy or challenging at different times. We may rebel against what God wants us to do – like Jonah – and actually go off in the opposite direction. At times we may stubbornly refuse to do what is necessary to glorify God and build up his church, sitting brooding under our very own broom tree instead of recognising God's hand in wanting to bless us.

Jesus is the anchor for our souls – the hymn actually talks about the billows and waves rocking us about but it's our souls that are kept steadfast and sure.

Our journey this side of eternity may well be rocky, with inclines and steep descents, twists and turns that can't be predicted. I thought I was set for life as a Maths teacher (a job I thoroughly enjoyed) but God had other plans for me. I didn't quite do a Jonah but I did have a bit of a laugh going through the process.

We are all called to be **active members of the body of Christ** – our anchor – but in that calling we will be gifted and prepared to do things that sometimes make us uncomfortable and which we find challenging. Both inside and outside the church we will cross paths with people who may not be like us. They may dress differently, talk differently, vote differently, hold different things in high (or low) esteem. There are people who are not like us. There are people who we don't like. There are people who don't like us. But **there is no-one to whom we shouldn't show the love of Christ.** We really are fearfully and wonderfully made and 'God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus.'



I am now embarking on a new chapter in my ministry — I am not sure exactly what I will find. It will be a new journey with only the scantest of maps.

The two churches here are also facing new challenges. The journey may be smooth or it may be choppy. I pray that we will all always keep our

eyes on the anchor of our faith and rise to the challenge of abundant and exciting life as Christ's body both here in Walmersley and to the ends of the earth (well, Rochdale, at least).

* As Gill moves onto pastures new and Paul continues to minister at St.Stephen's, the subsequent reduction in clergy availability means that changes have to be made to our service pattern. It will not be possible for every 10.30am service to be a Holy Communion service at St.John with St.Mark from this month.

Following a vote of the 10.30am congregation, it has been decided that the service on the THIRD Sunday of each month will not be a Communion service. It will be A Service Of The Word or Morning Prayer led by one of our authorised Lay Ministers. There is a 10.30am Communion service at Christ Church on the third Sunday as well, of course, as the 8.30am service which is unaffected. I am very grateful to both Ralph and Keith who continue to minister here and help ensure that our other services will continue as normal.

I would like to officially welcome Pam Cowie to our Ministry Team. Pam is a Reader Emeritus who has much experience as a Licensed Reader in the Diocese. She has served in parishes including Bamford, Stoneclough, Clifton and Holyrood, Swinton and we welcome her to the benefice. Pam will be leading the 10.30am service on Sunday 21 October.

A reminder that the 8.30am service at St.John with St.Mark's now takes place in the Barritt Room and entry is via the church hall.

St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 6th September 2018

Safeguarding – There may be some new panto helpers that will need to be identified.

Social dates – Afternoon tea on Saturday 29th Sept, Harvest lunch on Sunday 14th Oct, coffee morning & book fair on Saturday 27th Oct & firework party on Friday 2nd Nov.

We received a demonstration of various stairlift designs for disabled access between Church and hall. Costs ranged from £10,000 to £15,000, not including electrics and building work. Two of these designs will be explored in more detail.

Following the awarding of funding for the Pantomime group, Debbie has written to the PCC proposing that the stage curtains are replaced, stage walls painted black and the outer framework repainted.

Kelly Watson has written to the PCC asking that we review the Church Parade. Kelly proposed that we have five parades a year (Harvest, Remembrance, Christingle, Mothering Sunday and one other). A meeting with the uniformed groups will be held on 26th Sept to discuss this plus the suggestion that this year's Christingle be held on Wednesday 12th Dec.

The 8.30am Sunday service will continue in the Barritt Room for now but this will be kept under review.

It is the 250th anniversary of our Parish in June 2020. The Vicar will see if the Bishop of Manchester is available to join us.

Recent expenditures include servicing of the lighting conductor and renewal of the hall premises licence.

The coffee morning on 1st Sept raised £386.

A donation has been received towards improving the sound system in Church.

The 100 club 'year' starts again this month, anyone wishing to join or renew please contact Ian.

We will keep the chapel heating on low continuously through the Winter again from October.

The Vicar said we have a designated area for memorials in the Garden of Remembrance.

Health & Safety — The defibrillator kit will arrive within 28 days. Volunteers will be needed to learn how to use this. Red Cross First Aid training to be arranged in the next few months.

Arrangements following Gill's departure were discussed. The Vicar advised that a review of the 10.30am service is needed as he feels there will be insufficient clergy to have a Eucharist every Sunday. Therefore, Dave proposed that on the third Sunday of the month we only have a service of the word at 10.30am. The PCC felt that the congregation should have a say on this. Therefore, on Sunday's 9th & 16th Sept there would be ballot papers in Church for people to say whether they would prefer a service of the word at 10.30am at St. John's or to not have a service at St John's and attend Eucharist at Christ Church. There may be other options to be considered including re-scheduling services to allow a Eucharist to happen.

Thanks were recorded for Gill's Curacy and for her service to the PCC. Gill's final service in the Benefice is on Sunday 30th Sept at Christ Church Walmersley and induction at Christ Church Healey will be Sunday 21st Oct at 7.00pm.

The next PCC meeting will be on Thursday 25th October at 8.00pm.



Unfortunately, our speaker for our second meeting in August had to cancel because of illness. She has kindly offered to come in October. A Songs of Praise was hastily arranged and our thanks go to Geoff Stokes for offering to play the keyboard.

In September, the branch celebrated its 109th birthday with a buffet provided by members. A bring and buy sale realised £33. IN MEMORIAM: George Fryer

George died in Bury Hospice on 10 August 2018 at the age of 86. The Vicar writes....

George was Churchwarden of Christ Church when I arrived in the parish in July 2013. He immediately

impressed me with his practical knowledge and no-nonsense approach. He would think nothing of unblocking a drain or going up the tower to fix a problem. Such things were second nature to him.

It is impossible to think of George without also thinking of Sybil. They were a partnership — living and working together. They met in Horwich where after their marriage — as the name would suggest - they owned a fish and chip shop in the town.

A move to Walmersley and the greengrocers shop followed a few years later. The shop was on the end of the row of shops on Walmersley Old Road, near the traffic lights. George also provided a delivery service to the rural communities of the area.

After retirement from the shop George continued his life of service to the community by becoming a governor of Springside School and latterly churchwarden of Christ Church.

At his funeral in the building he loved and cared for over several years, George's son and daughter – George junior and Lesley - spoke of their father's dedication and their image of him as a role model. George regularly travelled to Australia to visit his son and family.

George's ashes will be interred in our Garden of Remembrance after our Harvest Festival on Sunday 14 October. The family are planning to place a bench in the area near this Garden as a memorial to him.

We give thanks to God for the life of George Fryer May He Rest In Peace and Rise in Glory.

The Open Group were delighted to welcome Nigel Silvester on 12th September, and we were grateful to him for agreeing to lead this evening, as a last minute swap with Paul was required.

Nigel's talk was entitled 'Tales of a Scilly Man', spelt with a 'c', and focussed on Nigel's life and growing up on the archipelago. We were advised that Nigel is a 'Scillonian', the term used for people related to Scilly.

We heard how Nigel's parents came to be on Scilly, with some interesting and humorous stories from his growing up there. We understand he made an early TV appearance on a regional documentary covering the hospital when he was born, and there were anecdotes from school life including hunting for false teeth, and how it was necessary for each pupil to stand in front of the rest of the school to sing a verse of a hymn solo. Imagine being asked to do that! Immortal Invisible is now significant to Nigel for this reason. Learning to swim on Scilly is also an obvious requirement.

Nigel advised that he was educated on the mainland in Truro, and famous students at his school at that time included Roger Taylor, the Queen drummer and Sir John Curtice, a professor of politics.

We heard about Nigel's career as a Customs & Excise Officer chiefly dealing with VAT, something that would apparently never catch on, he was advised when it was first introduced! We also could not imagine Nigel as a VAT debt collector sending round the bailiffs, but somebody had to do it.

The talk was complete with a photograph album of significant events, along with various props and was very informative. We do think though that there may other chapters to come so perhaps we may need Nigel to return to the Open Group next year. Thanks for an enjoyable evening.

FIRST AID TRAINING

British Red Cross will be hosting a First Aid course in St. John with St. Mark Church Hall (Barritt Room) on Saturday 10th November, two hours, from 9.15am. The course will be on helping 'Adults at greater risks of falls'.

An everyday First Aid session is approximately two hours long and helps people become more confident to help someone by teaching First Aid skills that are easy to do, easy to learn and easy to remember. The British Red Cross work alongside other organisations, such as our Churches, and tailor their First Aid training to meet our specific needs in an inclusive and flexible way. Each participant receives a certificate of First Aid learning.

Please contact Ian Banks if you would like to register an interest in attending this free course. The ideal class size is about a dozen but they would be happy to host more sessions if there is sufficient uptake.

INTERFAITH MEDITATION FOR PEACE - MANCHESTER CATHEDRAL, MAY 2018

Fr. Laurence Freeman opened with a talk that warmed the hearts of many to the all-inclusive heart of our World Community for Christian Meditation. He presented a contemplative dimensions approach to reconciliation, peace and healing, in the aftermath of the experience of terrorism, as experienced in the City of Manchester, on 22nd May, 2017.

Making reference to the strength of the spirit of unity of the people of Manchester Fr. Laurence's delivery celebrated their strength of spirit as he poised the suggestion of it exemplifying the contemplative way toward interfaith relations. A way in which we do not merely conduct our relationships with tolerance, in respect to how we respond to the diversity of our expressions, our manifestations of how we worship, conceive or approach God but that the contemplative dimension of all the world traditions calls for us to learn from one another out of this rich, expansive diversity about the actual richness and expansiveness of each of our traditions and of God.

He continued, that it is a call to the continual re-affirmation of the positiveness of human nature and the world, rather than to hold onto the negative, destructiveness that we can be more tempted to be led toward in the aftermath of tragedy and crisis.

Fr. Laurence continued by unfolding the way of contemplative practice, corresponding to the worlds differing traditions, specifically the need for a sacred space, entry into stillness and silence, as a way of being, moving the Cathedrals collective, of 160, into meditation.

An ecumenical contribution period involved everyone in a tricyclic Hindu body prayer sequence whilst other representatives, associated with the Faith Network for Manchester and the WCCM, contributed with their unique readings from their particular faith, or persuasions of Judaism, Buddhism, Islam and Humanist.

The World Peace Prayer Society introduced the "International Flag Ceremony for Peace", in which each person in the Cathedrals gathering took their turn in collecting and waving an international flag as a prayer for peace to prevail in that particular nation was uttered by all.

The bearing of flags culminated with Fr. Laurence, symbolically, brandishing the larger, Earth Flag, as all verbalised "May peace prevail on Earth". "What a Wonderful World", echoed, initiating Fr. Laurence leading a meditative walk around the cathedral, still brandishing the Earth Flag as each person, also, carried an international flag.

From out of a second period of meditation, Fr. Laurence flowed into his closing talk. Making reference to the song "What A Wonderful World", he spoke of our need to reaffirm, hold onto the positivity of life, of the world. Despite the crisis and tragedy around us in the world, there is much of beauty and wonder in life, in the world to focus on, to enjoy, to reaffirm "What A Wonderful World." He spoke of us all learning, from each other, how we play our role in making this so, individually and collectively, inter-faithfully. By David McKenna, Benedictine Oblate of the WCCM.


