SHOULD WE JUDGE A BOOK BY ITS COVER?



When we visit our younger daughter in London, we try to travel by bus as this enables us to see far more of the sights, but sometimes we have to use the Tube, although we try to avoid the rush hour as the sheer volume of people can be overwhelming. It can be frightening waiting on the edge of a platform for that hiss of wind from the tunnel that signals the arrival of the train.

I read a story of an event which happened on a tube station in the heat of this Summer. As the crowd on the station was reaching its peak an elderly person suddenly turned a very funny colour and collapsed on the floor. An official from London Transport appeared and asked for people to move away to give the passenger breathing space and for any doctor to make themselves known. As often happens, many people didn't move away but crowded nearer (with phones in hand) for a better view. The official rather more sharply asked again for people to move back.

This time most people did except for a young six foot six West Indian man dressed sensibly in shorts and a string vest and sporting dreadlocks. This tall man knelt down by the passenger and in doing so really annoyed the official. "Will you please move back and find a Doctor?"

The young man looked at the official and with grace and patience said "I am a doctor." To which the official replied "But you don't look like a doctor." The young man answered "This is what a doctor looks like." and turned the passenger into the recovery position.

The station official had let his preconceptions of what a doctor looks like get the better of him - a reminder to us all that sometimes our preconceptions about people are misconceptions and that they can make us miss something vital or wonderful.

The Magi recognised the infant Jesus as the King they had been seeking. How easy it would have been to think that a king would never be found in such a humble home.

When Mary and Joseph took the infant Jesus into the temple forty days after this birth, he would be wrapped in swaddling clothes looking no more like peoples' preconception of the Messiah than he had in that stable in Bethlehem.

But Simeon saw beyond the fact that he was a tiny baby and said "This is what God is like, now I can die happy." He didn't use those exact words but those of the Nunc Dimittis.

"Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace;
according to Thy word.
For mine eyes have seen Thy salvation;
which Thou hast prepared before the face of all people;
to be a light to lighten the Gentiles
and to be the glory of thy people Israel."

Do we have preconceptions about what God is like? Do we think he only exists in church? Do we recognise him in the stranger in the street? Do we find him in the kindness of others? Or does the stranger or the helper not look like God?

Do we have preconceptions about others? I wonder how many times Gill, our former curate was told, "You don't look like a Vicar."

Do we have preconceptions about ourselves? In our advent course we were asked if we saw ourselves as disciples. When we look in a mirror do we say "No, a disciple doesn't look like that."

Let us pray that our preconceptions do not stop us encountering God or from realising what we have to offer to His kingdom.

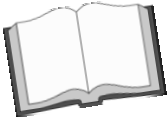

DIPPING WAFERS IN WINE NOT RECOMMENDED

The Bishop of Manchester has advised churches not to dip wafers into the Holy Communion wine to prevent worshippers catching flu.

The Right Rev David Walker also raised concerns that people with gluten allergies can be affected by the tradition:

"We are becoming increasingly aware of the severe reaction some people have to gluten. As a result, churches are now used to providing gluten-free bread in services of Holy Communion. However, what is often overlooked is that dipping wafers in the wine can introduce gluten, which others then drink.

It is already advised nationally that, for reasons of hygiene, the intinction of wafers should be avoided.

When a wafer is given into the hands of a communicant it may become contaminated by germs lying on the skin. Intincting the wafer then introduces those germs directly into the wine.

"There is also the possibility of finger tips inadvertently dipping into the liquid."

As a result of this advice churches in the diocese have been advised not to allow intinction to take place.

In his letter to the diocese, Bishop David wrote:

"Should anyone not wish to drink from the chalice, perhaps through having a heavy cold, then he or she may be assured that to receive the sacrament in one kind alone – bread or wine – is to receive the sacrament in its entirety."

Christ Church Walmersley PCC report 9th January 2019

1. It was suggested that George Fryer's memorial bench should be installed near the memorial garden in early Spring.
2. All the fire extinguishers in the church and church hall have been checked and certified for the next 12 months.
3. The treasurer reported that we had paid £24,000 of our parish share of £30,125 and we would not be able to pay any more due to the number of large bills we had incurred during the year for the electrical inspection of the church and the church hall, the repairs and servicing of the church hall heating systems and the work still to be done on the electrical system in the church.
4. The vicar noted that we need to consider a GDPR statement on the electoral roll form if there is not one on the standard format to be received from the diocese.
5. The sale of the church field was discussed and the discussion on the heads of terms contract continues with the solicitors.
6. The question of parade services was discussed and the vicar is liaising with the uniformed organisation leaders on this.
7. Health and safety, the quotation for the remedial electrical work in church has been requested from the electrical contractor.
8. The pastoral report was circulated prior to the meeting.
9. The vicar asked PCC to give consideration to which of the three church building proposals should be considered as the best one. Two leaflets had been produced, one describing the church history and one describing the church itself, aimed at children. These were discussed and the vicar asked that the PCC review them and come back with comments at the next PCC. Our Mission action plan has been submitted to the diocese.

10. Under any other business, a brass band concert in December 2019 and the new electoral roll which has to be re-written this year were discussed.
11. It was noted that our treasurer Brian Crow will be retiring from the position in April 2019, the vicar thanked Brian for all his work as treasurer for the PCC.

St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 2nd December 2018

The meeting of 2nd December was held to discuss the charities we would be supporting with 10% of the annual planned giving. The following charities are to receive £308.00:

CMS, Embrace the Middle East, Water Aid, Practical Aid, St. Joseph's Prayer Centre, Caritas, CRISIS, Solidarity, Bury Cancer Support & Save the Children. North West Air Ambulance will receive the proceeds from the Christmas giving.

Ian & The Vicar had attended a meeting with Diocesan reps to discuss the Parish share, which was considered too high. A review has taken place and the result is a reduction in the share over the next 3 years.

St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 10th January 2019

It was noted this was the first PCC since Paul's appointment at St. Stephen Elton.

A meeting is to take place after the service on Sunday 13th January to set the social dates for 2019. Events that have already been organised are a coffee morning on Saturday 16th February and Buffet dance on Friday 8th March. It was noted there will not be a Chinese New Year celebration this year.

More stats from the Website for November & December 2018 were shared.

The disabled access from Church to Hall was discussed. Due to increasing costs and building work it is now being considered to construct a covered walkway across the garden as opposed to a corridor lift. Quotes will be sought.

Café Church was discussed. It was felt the overall content of the recent services has been very good and enjoyed by many but the drop in numbers attending on these days still needed to be addressed. It has been proposed to produce a questionnaire for the congregation to let people have their say about what they like or dislike about Café Church and then take it from there. It was also noted that some changes had been made to the Morning Prayer service on the third Sunday.

The next two parade services are proposed for 10th March & 23rd June.

The draft accounts for 2018 were produced and discussed. These were approved unanimously and the accounts have now been passed for independent examination. Thanks were recorded to Ian for having the accounts produced by the first week of the year.

The Vicar advised he had contacted two Churches in USA, also St. John with St. Mark, with a view to sharing news, ideas and possible link pages from the Website. One is in New York (Lutheran) and the other Pennsylvania (Episcopal).

The next PCC meeting will be held on Thursday 28th February at 8.00pm, a joint PCC meeting with Christ Church will take place on Shrove Tuesday 5th March at St. John with St. Mark (with possible pancakes before!!) and the APCM will be Sunday 28th April at 12noon.

ELECTORAL ROLL REVISION

2019 sees the preparation of new church electoral rolls, which means that everyone must re-apply. This takes place only once in every six years.

New electoral roll forms will be available very soon.

If you have been a regular worshipper at for at least 6 months, please consider filling in a form to join the electoral roll.

Please note: Only those on the Church's Electoral Roll may vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

Our meeting in January was a Holy Communion service presided over by the Vicar, followed by a chat.

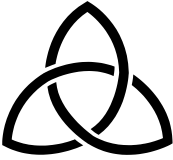

SATURDAY WALKING GROUP

During December and January the group were involved in two walks, both of which we have done before, but were ideal for the shorter days and winter months. On 8th December we took the Metrolink to Manchester Victoria station and begun our walk back along sections of the Irwell Sculpture Trail.

This route took us through Peel Park alongside the River Irwell, Drinkwater Park in Prestwich and Outwood Trail in Radcliffe. There was a slight variation this time in that we were able to venture across Kersal Dale nature trail behind The Cliff training ground. Our previous outing had prevented us from doing this due to redevelopment works so we were pleased to be able to explore this section.

Despite a reasonable start to the day, we unfortunately had to continue the final third in the pouring rain, resulting in our lunch stop being relocated to underneath the bridge near the old Outwood railway station.

We fared much better with the weather though for our next outing on 5th January, which was led at the last minute by Ralph due to Paul's unfortunate absence.

This time we explored the three reservoirs of Bolton; Jumbles, Wayoh and Turton & Entwistle, but again with slight variations. Our day began with car shares to Jumbles Country Park (thanks to Michael & John for the driving duties) and we then set off on a figure of eight route around each of the reservoirs. This is a mainly flat route with the odd ascent up to sections of the Witton Weavers Way and through woodland.





Familiar places on this walk include the village of Entwistle and Strawbury Duck pub (note the spelling). All three reservoirs were extremely popular today with cyclists, runners and dog walkers who were no doubt making the most of a fine and dry Saturday (albeit slightly chilly). Our elevenses stop was at the edge of the Wayoh reservoir and we enjoyed lunch by the Turton & Entwistle. It was noted how many of the trees alongside were adorned with Christmas decorations, either in memory of loved ones, or just for the sheer fun of decorating a tree with tinsel and baubles.

We made our way back through the village of Chapelton to collect the cars at Jumbles for the journey home. We all had a super day and thanks to Ralph for leading.

NB – If you have transport, it is worth an outing to these reservoirs, if not for the walking, then at least to sit and relax for a while next to the usually still waters.

It was also great that Gill has continued to join us on these walks following her appointment in the Deanery of Rochdale. There is talk of us doing Healey for one of our future walks so watch this space.....

I am very proud to belong to an amazing movement of over 4 million members in 84 countries. A movement that works tirelessly to:

So why “Apologia”? Are you aware, for example, that Mothers’ Union at Christ Church provided and maintains the pew bags (with books, colouring materials and quiet toys) for toddlers, or the boxes for slightly older children? that they designed, paid for and write the ‘welcome to a new home’ cards for everyone to take and distribute in the parish? that couples marrying receive a card? a child at baptism receives a card, a teddy and some literature for its parents?

Many of our members are involved in diocesan projects such as knitting to meet varied requests from our hospitals, cross stitch crosses, collecting toys for inner city children, providing gifts for those without a permanent home, passing on warm clothes for those in need, giving support for families of prisoners – the list of practical contributions is almost endless.

Welcoming Strangers, a fund to help those working with asylum seekers and refugees, welcomes all contributions as does Away From It All, giving breaks to families who otherwise could not enjoy time together away from the stresses of everyday life.

Centrally Mothers' Union is a key player in many policies which support families, such as the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-based Violence or the current consultation on Relationships and Sex Education in the UK, and it contributes to the Commission on the Status of Women at the UN.

Not forgetting work in developing countries – empowering them to live out our vision themselves.

Underpinning all that practical expression of love is prayer. Opportunities to share in worship, in quiet days, a worldwide expression of support for each other in the midday Wave of Prayer, alongside lots of resources on the web. (mothersunion.org)

Dave has said he would like Mothers' Union to be involved in the next joint service – March 31 is Mothering Sunday. Liturgy has been compiled by students from St Mellitus, with the guidance of Jane Williams (wife of Archbishop Rowan). This service would be a fantastic opportunity for you to be enrolled as a member or as a friend.

I have tried to give a glimpse of what is Mothers' Union, so what is it not?

- it is not primarily a fellowship group (Although that fellowship is important for many and all are welcome at our meetings it is not a condition of membership);
- it is not limited to mothers! are you male or female, married, widowed, single, divorced, with children or without?

So what would you be committing to if you were to step forward? To being a part of the largest Christian mission agency; with a vision to show God's love through loving, respectful and flourishing relationships. This is a goal we actively pursue by praying, campaigning and enabling.

Could you support . . . through prayer? . . . by giving financially? . . . by sharing information with others? . . . through various practical ways?

Membership is open to all who have been baptised in the name of the Trinity. If you have belonged to another church or are starting a faith journey then join as a Friend – the only difference is that you can't hold office. Which brings me back to why I am writing this in the first place! This is the first time in over 30 years that I shall simply be "a grassroots member", part of the amazing backbone of this movement. I'm looking forward to it.

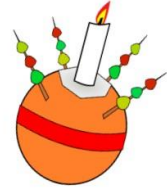
