

ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

The St. John with St. Mark APCM was held after the Sunday service on 28th April. Prior to the meeting Rosemarie Ashworth and June Banks were elected as Church Wardens, whilst Keith Duckworth was elected Deputy Warden.

The policy statements on Children, Young People and Safeguarding of Adults were approved, and Joan Wild was appointed the co-ordinator. Ian presented the 2018 Treasurer's report in the usual thorough way, covering both the incomes and expenditures for the year. Thanks were recorded to all who commit through the planned giving scheme, those who help with fundraising activities and the upkeep of the Hall. There was a gentle reminder that if people were able to switch from envelopes to direct to bank, this would reduce the risks both with reliability and security. A vote of thanks was recorded to Ian for his hard work with producing the accounts. Andy Clark was appointed as the Independent Examiner.

It was noted that the disabled access 'Flexistep', linking Church to Hall would begin during week commencing 29 April. This would be paid for using money from the legacy of the estate of Jean Barritt given in 2017. Dave provided us with an update on the Benefice Mission Action Plan as of Spring 2019, advising that there was a need for more vocations to Lay & Ordained ministry. Thanks were recorded to Ralph & Keith for their continued involvement as retired Clergy at our various services. Paul is continuing to take midweek services. It was also noted that there has been a greater reduction in Parish fees due to more non-Church funerals and weddings, albeit also across the wider Church. 2020 will mark the 250th Anniversary of the creation of the Parish of St. John and ideas for celebrating this milestone are being sought.

PCC members and Sidespeople were elected for the new Church year. Stuart Ashworth & Vicky Senior have resigned from PCC and thanks were recorded to them for their involvement in PCC down the years.

The new PCC met briefly after the meeting to appoint Treasurer, Secretary and Electoral Officer. The first meeting takes place on Wednesday 29th May.

The Mission is a children's charity based in the centre of Manchester. More than one in three local children is living in poverty. They help children and families living in poverty in Manchester and Salford by alleviating the day to day impact of poverty and improving life chances.

THE SMARTSTART PROJECT

AUGUST - NEARLY AS EXPENSIVE AS CHRISTMAS?

According to the UK Poverty Report 2018, 30% of children live in poverty and reduced benefits, low pay and rising housing costs are pushing more below the threshold.

Today's poverty affects confidence, education and low-pay for the next generation too. 16 year olds from poorer backgrounds are around a third less likely to achieve good qualifications than better-off students.

The 2019 SmartStart project resumed on 1 May. The project began in 2014 with a free school uniform programme which offers families a practical support package, including school uniform, sportswear, winter coats and other accessories. According to the Wood Street Mission website:

3,199 children from Manchester and Salford were helped last year. Along with uniform sets we supplied over 1,100 winter coats, 578 backpacks and water bottles, 650 sportswear sets, 381 revision guides and accessories like hats, gloves and socks etc.

Our families tell us that affording everything in August is not possible (approximately £220 per child) and that without help they cut down on food, borrow, fall behind with bills or leave children in last year's uniforms. Parents get stressed and children struggle with their peers.

CONSULTATION ON TERM LIMITS FOR DEANERY SYNOD

This final draft proposal was presented to General Synod in February 2019 and is likely to be a topic for discussion at both of our PCC's over the coming months. This consultation *is for us all*, as well as PCC's and deanery synod members.

"This draft Church Representation and Ministers Measure was presented to General Synod in February 2019 for final approval. New Church Representation Rules would include a provision which would limit parochial lay representatives on deanery synods to two consecutive terms of three years, although the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) would be able to disapply that limit.

The Elections Review Group (ERG) met on 1 April 2019 and agreed to consult widely on a number of different options. The ERG has circulated a consultation document to members of General Synod, Diocesan Secretaries, Parochial Church Council Secretaries, Lay Chairs of Diocesan Synods, Lay Chairs of Deanery Synods, Area and Rural Deans, and the National Deaneries Network, which proposes seven options below for consideration by respondents. In each case "terms" refers to terms of office served as an elected parochial representative of the laity on a Deanery Synod:

- 1) The limit on successive terms as provided for in the new Rules
- 2) Reversing the default position so that there would be no limit on successive terms unless the APCM resolved to impose it
- 3) Increasing the number of successive terms which could be served, and what the new number should be
- 4) Giving the APCM power to specify what the limit on successive terms should be in that parish
- 5) Giving deanery synods power to impose a deanery-wide limit on successive terms
- 6) Giving diocesan synods power to impose a diocesan-wide limit on successive terms
- 7) No term limit.

The ERG has prepared a consultation form which has been sent to deanery synod members and is also available on https://www.churchofengland.org/simplification. The consultation will close on Wednesday 10 July 2019. The ERG would welcome comments on this issue from anyone who has a view on the matter."



On 25 April as part of the Diocese of Manchester Wave of Prayer, with the theme "Abundant Life", a short service was held in the side chapel. We prayed for Mothers' Union around the world and especially for our own link Dioceses of Kisangani, Kagera, Awka, Sunyani and Popondota.

The team comprised Hilary Riddick, Christine Standring, Barbara Taylor and Barbara Silvester. Nibbles and soft drinks were served to help activate the little grey cells (not 100 per cent sure it worked though!).

This month, firstly we are having a talk from the Air Ambulance service and then, Cath Hilton will speak to us about her visit to Rwanda undertaken with other members of the Worldwide Council of Mothers' Union.

Both evenings should be really interesting and as always everyone is welcome (male as well as female).

The Deanery AGM due to be held in May was postponed due to unforeseen circumstances and it is hoped to be able to reschedule it this month.

The Summer of Hope appeal has been launched to fund incredible causes all over the world and shine hope on thousands of families and communities worldwide. Look out for details of ways to support this appeal, and use this Summer of Hope prayer from the MU website.

SATURDAY WALKING GROUP



As is now traditional for May, the walking group met on the first Saturday to 'beat the bounds', ie walking the full boundary of both Parishes and reflecting at various points on the route. We were also pleased to be joined by Heidi from East Lancs Crematorium and two friends Lisa & Natasha, who

were in training for a 26-miler in June. This year we took the opportunity to pause for silent prayer and reflection at particular areas and sites of significance.

We met at Christ Church Walmersley at 9.00am before walking down the road to St. John with St. Mark. At each of the two Churches we prayed silently for two Parishes, the people and the activities that take place there. Wandering down to the Burrs we paused at the cafè to think about the different places of leisure in the Benefice and after walking along Woodhill Road we then crossed the bridge at the Irwell to the site of the fire station. This seemed a significant spot to think about emergency workers that serve our town. Our next stop was the Tesco car park and here we stopped at the Brunswick war memorial to think about all those in the Benefice who had lost their lives or been injured in war and conflict. Pausing at the site of the old St. John's Church on The Rock, now the shopping centre, this seemed an ideal opportunity to remember those in the retail industry whose jobs are currently at risk.

Continuing to the top of Chesham Road we then made our way through Bluebell Woods and deviated away from the boundary slightly across the golf course onto the start of Scotland Road. This then led us down to Buckhurst School, where we would normally have stopped for lunch. However as the wind was quite strong here it seemed more ideal to delay this so we continued across the farmland and meadows, thinking about the farming communities and workers that serve the Benefice.

We arrived at the end of the road past the Lord Raglan where we had our lunch stop. However a combination of a delayed lunch, quick pace and an off-track route meant we had reached this point an hour earlier than planned. Ian & June Banks were intending on meeting us here so a couple of quick texts and phone calls and they were able to join us 40 minutes ahead of schedule! We then again diverted from the boundary slightly as we walked through Mount Pleasant and onto the main road to cross over to Bass Lane to take us down to the Waterside Bridge and Summerseat, past the garden centre. This then led us onto the start of our final leg back through The Burrs and the waterfall, before we arrived at the Brown Cow for congratulations and refreshment after the 12 or so miles. Completing this walk always makes you aware of how much goes on in the two Parishes.

As a bonus, I also joined Paul on the Sunday morning as he led the people of St. Stephen's, Elton on their first boundary walk. This was slightly shorter in length (at 5 miles) but the pattern was the same in that we stopped at various significant points to think about the different activities, places and people. It was nice to join them and meet some of them.

The Open Group met on Wednesday 8th May for a talk by local man Jim Metcalf who contacted me earlier in the year offering to talk to us about his love of mountaineering and his work with Community Action Nepal. Being something we have never had a talk on before I snatched Jim's hands off straight away. Jim began his talk with a little bit about his early years, family background and where he has lived in Bury. He has been a Bury boy all his life. We thought Jim was new to us all; that was until we were given a glimpse of an

early photograph of Jim with a certain Reverend Don Altham, who was

also in attendance this evening.

Jim talked passionately about his love of mountaineering across many areas of the globe, including some of the world's highest peaks he has conquered with his son. Mostly snow covered, these ranged from the Alps to the Himalayas, to Kilimanjaro. This talk was complete with some stunning photography taken by Jim, usually on the end of a safety harness or the edge of a glacier. It was a privilege to see these photographs and made us appreciate the beauty of these areas.

The talk was made more enjoyable as it also contained humorous and light-hearted anecdotes. We were intrigued to hear from Jim that they live out of a mess tent during these expeditions, which contains all the essentials required for the time spent in the snow covered peak. Much of the food supplies eaten are dehydrated. For those of us who enjoy Geography, we were also treated to some lessons on the subject, including the three border land share in Mongolia.

Jim's talk included his involvement with Community Action Nepal (CAN), a UK based mountaineer's charity set up by Doug Scott to help the mountain people of Nepal by setting up projects involving health, education and access to vital amenities.

All those who attended said they had really enjoyed this talk and found it extremely interesting and enlightening. We made a donation to Community Action Nepal at the end of the talk and thank you to all those who donated separately. NB – Since the meeting I have received an acknowledgment from CAN (via Jim) thanking us for the donation received on the night.

Thanks very much indeed to Jim for coming along and giving us an entertaining evening and for sharing some great moments of what seems like a life lived to the full. If you would like to know more about Community Action Nepal then please visit their Website https://www.canepal.org.uk/
