As I write this I have been watching the commemorations of the Battle of Britain, a time when the country was under considerable attack and its safety was in the hands of a few brave pilots and their back up staff. Although I was alive at the time, I cannot remember much about it, but it was a time of anxiety for everyone. Much like today. There was the slogan **Keep calm and carry on!** 

It is hard to believe that we have been living under a shadow of anxiety for 6 months and will continue to do so. Way back at the end of March did we really think that it would last so long? Alan was sure that it would all be over by his birthday in July. He got that wrong.

At first there was novelty. Our lives changed but we were given opportunities to do things we had neglected. In the first weeks I washed every window in the house and emptied and tidied cupboards, acquiring a load of plastic bags full of clothing to take to charities. The novelty soon wore off and my more lackadaisical approach to housework returned. Alan, however, did keep up with his gardening and we have enjoyed the fruits of his labours in flowers and vegetables.

Our eldest daughter has an allotment some 200 yards from her home and although she has been working in the hospital throughout the lockdown she has had to find time to keep on top of it. "If I don't, the bindweed will take over and we will have no harvest and next

year will be a disaster."

Farmers will have had to keep going in order to bring in their harvests and prepare for next year.

We will celebrate Harvest in church in a few weeks, giving thanks for all that we receive, and the food



we give to Porch Boxes is even more important to help those affected financially by the Crisis. But I suspect the church service will be very different: no music, no singing, and no refreshments after the service.

Changed circumstances necessitate change but we have to keep going on with the important things to provide for the future.

It is important that we keep the important elements of our church life going to sustain our faith and our service to others.

Like the population in 1940 we must Keep Calm and Carry On!

\* This month marks the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the creation of the United Benefice of Walmersley Road. October 2010 saw the coming together of the parishes of Christ Church, Walmersley and St.John with St.Mark, Bury with Ian Stamp as the first Vicar.

A United Benefice enables parishes to remain as individual units – with their own PCCs and Churchwardens etc – but to share a ministerial team. It has been my privilege to be Vicar of this United Benefice for over seven years now and it is wonderful that we not only share in ministry but socially and pastorally too.

The introduction of joint services on the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of each month – temporarily suspended due to the pandemic at present – and in particular the very popular monthly Sunday@7 service show that we worship together. In addition the joint social events and the support of each church's various social activities show a willingness to share in fellowship also.

To celebrate our first decade, we are hosting a joint benefice celebration service led by the Bishop of Bolton. This will take place at Christ Church on Sunday 25 October, beginning at 10.30am.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have contributed to the ministry of the United Benefice over the past 10 years and pray that God will guide and bless us as we move forward together in the decades to come.

\* Our celebrations for the Benefice coincide with the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of St.John's Church this year. Most of our planned events have had to be cancelled due to the ongoing pandemic.

However, we have arranged a special service with the Bishop of Manchester on Sunday 6 December. This will obviously be held at St.John with St.Mark but again with both congregations in attendance. This also begins at 10.30am. Please put this date in your diary. \* The uncertainty about the ongoing situation with the coronavirus pandemic mean that the current arrangements for our Sunday services will continue for the foreseeable future.

I would like to thank everyone for their support and understanding in this. We are keen that both our church buildings remain Covid secure and that we are always complying with the necessary social distancing guidelines. If you have any concerns whatsoever, please have a word with me or one of the church wardens.

You will be aware that the wearing of face coverings in places of worship is now mandatory, unless you have an exemption.

Despite the changes made by the Government last month affecting the numbers of people who can meet together at any one time, these do not affect places of worship.

As the Archbishop of Canterbury said: "Worship is the work of God - not a social gathering - and gives the strength to love and serve."

There are no restrictions on numbers attending worship providing that social distancing is observed. However for baptisms, weddings and funerals, numbers remain restricted to 30.

Worship via the internet continues to be available and special thanks to those who regularly host the monthly Sunday@7 service and our friends at Seedfield Methodist Church for their weekly Sunday morning online services.

\* I continue to say Morning Prayer at 9.30am and Evening Prayer at 5.00pm on a daily basis. It is good to know that others are saying prayers at the same time as we join together in prayer.

\* Enquiries about baptisms or weddings / marriage banns etc or any other matter, should be made at the Parish Office held at St.John with St.Mark Church Hall any Wednesday evening between 6.30-7.00pm.

\* The Ministry Team consisting of all the Clergy, Licensed Readers and Authorised Lay Ministers meets every month – usually on the second Monday evening. If you have an issue that you would like us to discuss, please contact one of the team. \* Porch Boxes are always in need of food and toiletries especially in this current situation. A box is available at the back of both churches.

\* Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the Treasurers

\* If you would like to donate towards the cost of the flowers in church, perhaps in memory of a loved one or in celebration of a special event, please speak to Hazel Bamford (Christ Church) or Rosemarie Ashworth (St.John with St.Mark).
