On the May Day bank holiday, I had Jeffrey (the lovely American priest who has taken over from me in Radcliffe) round for tea. He is settling in really well and now knows what "tea" means round here. However, there are still some things about life in the UK which puzzle him. He recently got a car and is learning to drive on the "wrong" side of the road. He asked me about roundabouts! I am not the best person to ask to be honest. Then we moved onto bank holidays, and he had a lot of questions; what was the May Day thing all about, why would you get an extra day/not get an extra day for New Year depending on where you live? I spent the next hour or so trying (without cheating) to remember the ones that we have and why. Why not have a go? For answers see page 17.

Of course, come the end of May there is another bank holiday, officially nameless but often called Spring or Late Spring. It was actually linked to Whitsuntide but was moved in the seventies. Bank holidays, at any time and for any reason, are generally very welcome but I did wonder with the enforced time-off so many have experienced over this last year if they are still as special/full of promise? I know that since I retired, they don't quite have the same meaning to me.

Maybe this coming (insert name of your choice) bank holiday will be different because we are almost back to normal (yes, probably jinxed it now)! The problem with bank holidays is that we expect a lot from them; we want to get the most out of this precious free time. Some will put an awful lot of planning into the day but quite often they will build their plans on the weather (always a mistake) and when the day dawns as a 'typical bank holiday' the plans are in ruins.

Other folk will have an alarmingly full schedule: an early trip to the supermarket; gardening after that other bank holiday staple the garden centre; decorating; cleaning the car; sorting out the attic etc. Whilst others will just decide the day is about doing nothing, have a lie in and just relax. Great, until you realise you have done diddly squat and feel racked with guilt. I have not forgotten all those people who have to work (with or without additional pay) and don't really want to think about bank holidays at all, thank you very much.

Perhaps it is as well that in the UK we do not have as many bank holidays as many other countries do. Cambodia has 28, Sri Lanka has 25 and a

good number of countries have between 21 and 12, in fact everyone seems to have more than us. Even the USA, which Jeffrey felt was badly done to, has 11. We are right at the bottom with 8. But before you get too indignant, if the Labour Party ever gets in power, they promised to give us 4 more bank holidays. The plan is that they will honour the patron saints of Great Britain. To save you thinking/googling: St David's Day (1 March); St Patrick's Day (17 March); St George's Day (23 April) and St Andrew's Day (30 November).

So, what would we do with those 4 extra days? You have probably got quite a lot of time to think about it but perhaps the saints themselves might give us a clue as to what to do.

St. David became a monk and a great teacher. So perhaps we could spend some of our day learning something — even getting to grips with one or two things from the bible that have always puzzled us. And, as in Wales many of the celebrations centre around food, maybe some time cooking could be fun (leeks optional).

St. Patrick had a significant role in introducing Christianity to the Irish (and more recently increasing alcohol sales). So, how about spending a little time thinking about how you might tell someone about your faith – and even doing it? After that, and after would probably be better, spend a bit of time relaxing with family and friends, enjoying a glass or two of your favourite tipple.

St. George – no actual dragons for us to slay but how about tackling that job you have been putting off for ages and then going to your own particular "royal" family to seek your reward by doing something you enjoy together.

St. Andrew – one of the first disciples who carried out Jesus' mission. It took over a 1000 years for Scotland to recognise him so why not use his day to recognise someone who has helped you. Is there something you could do for someone else?

Well, whether we get those extra bank holidays or not I hope you enjoy the ones we have, balancing work with enjoyment and remembering that, whatever the weather, these are precious days: *This is the day the Lord has made; We will rejoice and be glad in it.*Psalm 118:24



INTRODUCING NEW DEANERIES



The Diocesan Deanery structure is being changed this month, as we move from 20 to 7, with a full time Area Dean in post for each area.

The new Deaneries are Bolton; Bury & Rossendale; Manchester North & East; Manchester South & Stretford; Oldham & Ashton; Rochdale and Salford & Leigh.

The Seven full-time Area Deans will be commissioned at a service in Manchester Cathedral on Sunday 6 June. They have been appointed to enable the Diocese to achieve its inspiring vision for 2030 of being: 'a worshipping, growing and transforming Christian presence at the heart of every community'.

The Diocesan website reports that the new Area Deans - "Working closely with the Lay Chairs and other ordained and lay leaders in each deanery, will lead the delivery of the diocese's transformation programme at local level. They will be responsible for carefully targeted interventions on the ground to achieve the diocese's ambitious targets for increased church attendance, particularly in the most deprived areas; greater opportunities for people to explore their faith, especially children and young people and their families; and for the Church to be able to lead the way in every local community, supporting those who are deprived and excluded.

Please pray for our new full time Area Dean, The Revd. Canon Dr. Rachel Mann as she prepares to start her new role in the former deaneries of Bury, Rossendale and Radcliffe & Prestwich.




A new survey has shown that more than 4,000 Church of England parishes are estimated to have stepped up their support to local communities in the face of rising levels of poverty, loneliness and isolation during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Church volunteers have carried out a range of tasks from food deliveries to shopping, dog walking and collection of prescriptions since the first lockdown, according to a report by the Church of England and Church Urban Fund.

Other sources of help include gardening projects, 'phone buddies', jobhunting support, and helping people to get online.

Church buildings were used to help communities come to terms with the effects of the crisis and became in the words of the report "symbols of hope."

The Chair of the Report, The Bishop of Newcastle, Christine Hardman, is quoted as saying, "The past year will stand out in our memory as one of radical change and of needing to learn to live in a new landscape. The Covid-19 pandemic drastically transformed our daily life, and our understanding of what it means to be Church. Stay-at-home orders and travel restrictions meant that Jesus' call to 'love your neighbour' has become grounded in the hyper-local. No longer able to meet in person, churches across England found ways to continue to worship and serve their community together, whilst remaining apart."

ST. JOHN WITH ST. MARK APCM NOTES

This year's meeting took place in a hybrid setting, both in the Church Hall and also online, at 12noon on Sunday 16th May.

The meeting began with the election of wardens and the deputy warden, all of who agreed to stand again.

All necessary approvals of the policies on children, young people and safeguarding of adults took place.

Ian's Treasurer's report highlighted how our finances have been impacted by the last 12 months of Covid closures and restrictions, both in terms of planned giving, but especially hall rentals. There was however thanks for all who have continued to give this year and those who have increased their contributions. There was an encouragement to anybody who has not reviewed their giving to consider this over the coming weeks and months.

The Vicar thanked everybody who has continued to be a presence in Church life over the last year, even whilst the building was closed, and especially now Covid guidance has meant additional work. The increase in online worship over the last year was also noted and how this has been a lifeline for so many. This is likely to form the basis of a future discussion, even when in person services eventually get back to normal. The Vicar also explained the future of the newly restructured Deaneries.

Election of PCC members took place and there was thanks recorded to David Andrew, who is stepping down from PCC, and for his work and service over the years.

There were various reports from different Church groups and organisations to review in the APCM booklet.

An additional PCC meeting took place on Wednesday 19th May, mainly on Zoom, to elect officers to various posts and for the Vicar to provide information following the latest easing of restrictions. There were also updates on which groups are now back using the Hall. It was noted that Ian's licensing as Reader is on Sunday 11th July. Next PCC meeting is on Thursday 1st July at 8.00pm.

England and Wales only have eight public holidays in total: New Year, Good Friday, Easter Monday, May Day, late May bank holiday, August bank holiday, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.
