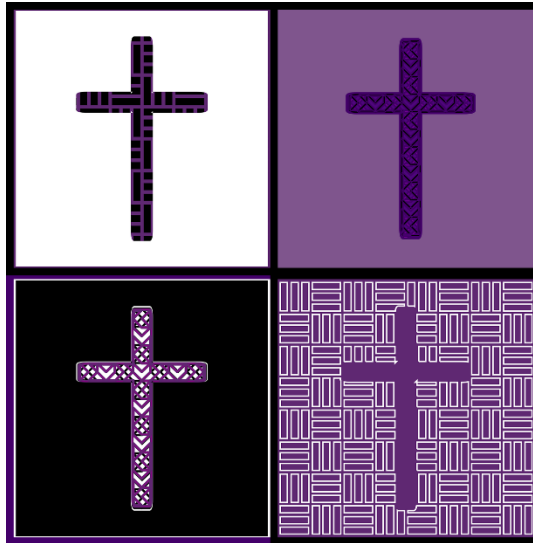

Greetings friends, and welcome to this March issue of our Magazine.

I should start by saying what a privilege it is to write the letter for the first time. When the Interregnum began, it was felt that we could use this as an opportunity to have a different person to occasionally fill this space, so I hope that my inaugural letter will be appreciated and provide some benefit.



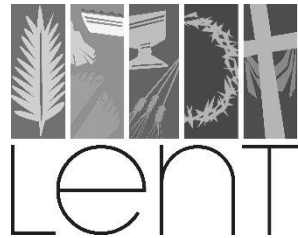
The timing of Easter this year means that the entire month of March runs through the season of Lent; a season of solemnity and abstinence. I should confess that the opportunity to avoid the indulgences and pleasures we enjoy during the rest of the year is very difficult for me, and there is usually little in the way of solemnity in my household, owing to the number of celebrations that occur. It starts with my Mum and Dad's wedding anniversary on 24th February; my own Birthday is on 6th March; my Mum's and sister's Birthdays are both on Annunciation Day (25th); Mothering Sunday will always fall around this time; and with the feast of Easter, it is traditional for it to be a month of celebration, indulgence and continuous differing greetings cards around the house. I am sure we have occasionally had the odd St. Patrick's Day decoration or card as well! It is also worth acknowledging that March brings other joys, with signs of spring, improving weather and increased daylight, enjoyed more so after the starkness of January and February.

I have recently read the autobiography of Selwyn Hughes, a preacher, minister and a global giant of faith. Early on, he was advised that his ministry journey would occasionally take him away from home, and that there would be a sense of expectation to occasionally cut things out of your life which you love. Most of you will have noticed that I

have not been at home very much myself recently; my home Church that is.

As part of my discernment process for Ordination, it has been necessary for me to cut out of my life the regular Sunday service I have attended for so many years here. I have been at St. Peter's, Bury, and have greatly valued the time I have spent there, enjoying different styles of worship and sharing fellowship and prayer time with faithful and enthusiastic people.

That time has now come to an end though, and I am back with you to journey through this season of Lent. Have you thought what you are going to 'cut out' of your life this season? I expect the traditional list springs to mind; your favourite tippie, your favourite chocolate bar, or your weekly night out. Let



us not forget though that Lent is not just about cutting out. For those of you who find it difficult to give something up, then please remember that Lent is also an opportunity to do a bit more. You may wish to spend more time in prayer or bible reading; attend an extra worship service during the week; you may find a Lent course nearby or online, consider giving a little more to charity by saving your loose change, or like me, you may find it helpful to attend a different Church once or twice. You may also wish to benefit from the extra opportunities which March has to bring, by making the most of the better weather and increased daylight and, as you are able, perhaps a walk around the local Lido or countryside.

However you choose to spend this Lent season, I pray that you will all find refreshment and benefit, as we prepare to celebrate the Easter feast and our Lord's resurrection.

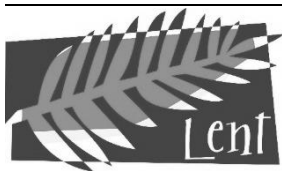

Interregnum Notes

- * The move took place, at the end of February, of the diocesan offices, from 90 Deansgate, Manchester to St John's House, 155-163 The Rock, Bury, BL9 0ND
- * In early March the Diocese will welcome the Archbishop of York who will be treated to a flying visit to numerous churches and institutions. On Thursday 2 March he will officially open the new diocesan offices in St John's House. Later that day he will lead an evening of inspiration and reflection "Teach us to pray" at St Anne Edgeside, at 7.45pm. Ask if you would like a lift.
- * The Ministry Team (Clergy, Licensed Readers and our Authorised Lay Minister) meets every month – normally on the second Tuesday evening. If you have an issue that you would like them to discuss, please contact one of the team.
- * Many thanks to our own ministry team and to visiting ministers who are currently ensuring that all our usual services are continuing.
- * Please support our Wardens and Ministry team during the time of interregnum. We are grateful to Archdeacon Jean, Area Dean Rachel and our Mission Community Leader, Julian Heaton, who are all available for guidance if for any reason the 'home' team can't help you.
- * If you have any thoughts on the qualities desired in clergy working with us in future, it is not too late to share ideas with members of the PCCs.
- * Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the treasurers.
- * Porch Boxes are always in need of food and toiletries especially in this current situation. A box is available at the back of both churches. Thanks to those who support others in need.
- * There is so much happening both in the benefice and in our new Mission Community. If you use social media that is a great way to keep up to date with everything.

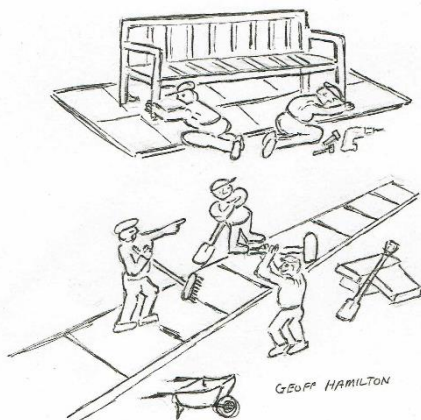
Summary of Christ Church meeting on 6 February 2023

1. Opening prayers were led by the Lay Chair.
2. The bench commemorating George Fryer has been placed in the Garden of Remembrance.
3. Work continues with the laid down procedure for applying for a new vicar for the benefice.
4. The Parish Share requested for 2023 is £27,900, or monthly payments of £2,325.
5. A written report and accounts were presented by the treasurer.
6. It was suggested that the external church notice board should be updated with current contact information. The Property committee were asked to look at the possibility of removing the redundant notice board by School Lane.
7. Printing costs were reviewed and a new password for the printer from Arena is required.
8. It was noted by the church hall committee that the church hall floor is becoming dangerous in parts due to woodworm.
9. The Pastoral committee reported that there would be Mothering Sunday cards and Easter cards which would show service times.
10. The Thursday work team is using concrete flags to repair the path at the south west corner of the churchyard towards the car park behind the Church Hall.
11. Plans are in motion for a new mid-week service beginning on 1st March 2023. Members were asked to publicise this.
12. The Lay Chair asked that the Mission Community be a regular item on the agenda as so far we have had very little feedback from meetings.
13. Closing prayers remembered the people suffering and bereaved following the earthquake in Turkey and Syria.

A meeting of the Bury Mission Community took place at St. John with St. Mark on Monday 30th January. We opened with worship and items were then discussed and news shared:

Lent Evensong ~ There will be Evensong at Bury Parish Church on the Sundays during Lent at 4.30pm. Worship centres will provide a preacher for each of the services, to which all are welcome.

Beating the Bounds ~ Reverend Paul Sanderson will lead two walks around the boundaries of the Mission Community, to take in each Church. The first walk will go from St. Peter's and finish at Christ Church Walmersley (via St. Thomas, St. Paul & St. John Bircle) whilst the second walk will go from St. John with St. Mark and finish at Bury Parish Church (via St. James, All Saints' Elton & St. Stephen). Each will be approx. 5.5 miles and there will be prayers at each Church. These will probably be on two Saturdays between May and July.

Communication ~ It has been proposed that we produce a newsletter 3 times per year with material from each worship centre. This will include personal items with pictures, starting with the Area Dean, other clergy and then Focal Leaders. Also, a MailChimp E-Bulletin with similar info to the newsletter and notable items from the Diocesan website will be sent out to e-mail addresses as requested.

#MoreThanSunday ~ This is continuing within the Mission Community. More details are on page 14.

Joint Events ~ There will be an Easter Eve vigil service on Saturday 8th April at Bury Parish Church, to which all are welcome. Other proposed events include a September creation celebration involving parishes and schools and also an Epiphany event in January 2024.

Service cover ~ The provision of service and Eucharistic cover was discussed, particularly supporting Benefices which are currently in Interregnum.

Growing Faith Deanery worker ~ This search is ongoing. Presently the plan is that the appointee be based in Bury Mission Community initially, to help the Parishes develop work in schools and to evolve work in Bury Church High School. Forms have been sent to each Parish to capture information about our work with children.

Next meeting ~ Suggested to be Monday 17th April at a venue to be confirmed.

Loving God, Jesus called his disciples to seek your kingdom and follow him. You summon us to share in the work of the Bury Mission Community. Open our hearts to hear his invitation to be his disciples in this generation. Grant us courage. Strengthen us by your Holy Spirit. Give us compassion, wisdom and resilience. #MoreThanSunday

Our most recent session in February focussed on “Worship, Preaching and Teaching” and how the 10% of our time we spend in gathered worship on a Sunday can inform and impact us, and also the

community in our lives throughout the week. Jesus’ material he used for preaching came from the everyday occurrences in life. This is still relevant to our own way of preaching 2000 years later. We discussed how our gathered worship and all that has been shared, taught, experienced and prayed for is intended to be taken out beyond our gathering. There was also a chance to look at how our worship could be enhanced to increase these opportunities.

We watched a couple of video clips from Churches in the Diocese which have come up with different initiatives, including after school groups aimed at young families and heard how St. John in Atherton are involved in a project with the local foodbank.

During the session we were invited to share together in a ‘360-degree peace circle’ when each member of the group stood with arms or hands outstretched and, beginning by facing East slowly turned in a circle in silence, praying about the community outside of our buildings.

At the end of the meeting, we were made aware of different resources connected to the theme and an LICC Confidence journey course that encourages us to grow deeper confidence in faith from Sunday and throughout the week.

It was felt that we needed to make congregations more aware of who is involved in the More Than Sunday course from each worship community. David Robinson has been the representative in this Benefice, so if you want to know more about the suggestions or resources, please see David. There is a course booklet which we could arrange to provide you with as well.

The sixth and penultimate shift is on Saturday 18th March in the Barritt Room at St. John with St. Mark at 10.00am (refreshments from 9.30am) and the theme is “Commissioning and Collaboration”, looking at discipleship and vocations. We meet in a hybrid environment with other Mission Communities joining us on Zoom.

This is a great opportunity for everyone to feel more confident about their faith. You do not have to have attended the previous sessions if you have not been to any before.

By choosing one of these gifts, you could make the difference between a young person missing out on school or creating their new life at university. You could give a mother much-needed relief from hardship and poverty, and help her on a new path to grow and flourish with confidence.

"I have four grandchildren. God answered my prayers as my firstborn son finished school and is now in the police, another son finished university and is a doctor now. All my children have finished university. My daughter got pregnant and ran away, but after a time she came home. I took care of her child while she finished school, and now we live peacefully together."

In the UK and around the world, Mothers' Union volunteers support families when a parent goes to prison. Skills-building include sessions on cookery and crafts, as well as parenting skills, while for children, support before and during a visit, running a prison creche and making a simple card or present can all make a difference.

"It used to be that every time my husband and I had to pay school fees we would fear, and that fear would turn into arguments. Now, we have peace, we know that we will manage because we both can contribute something. We are free now."

Just some of the stories of change you can help to make flourish. Or you could just buy a box of chocolates or a bunch of flowers?!

Our afternoon meetings have continued with most people able to attend and some finding it easier. In 'The Big Picture' Catherine Hilton gave members a wider view of the scope of Mothers' Union than is often seen in branches.

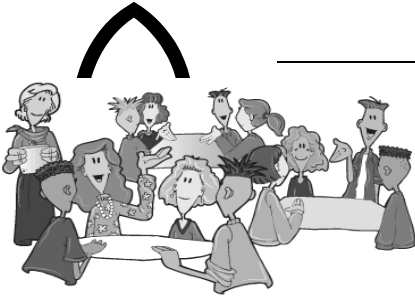

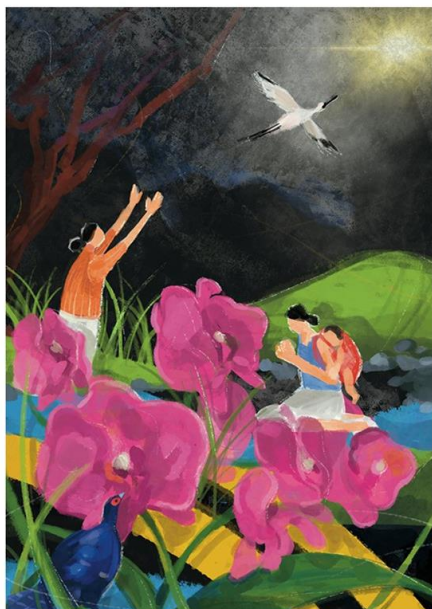

World Day of Prayer

**I have heard about
your faith**

This year's service has been planned by the people of Taiwan, with the theme "I have heard about your faith".

In this image the artist, Hui-Wen HSAIO, has used several motifs that highlight Taiwan's best-known features to express how the Christian faith brings peace and a new vision to Taiwan.

The women in the painting are sitting by a stream, praying silently and looking up into the dark. Despite the uncertainty of the path ahead, they know that the salvation of Christ has come.

Two endangered species are featured: the Mikado pheasant and the Black-faced Spoonbill, which are both of unique significance to the Taiwanese people. The Mikado pheasant is endemic to mountainous regions of Taiwan and is usually regarded as one of Taiwan's national birds. The Black-faced Spoonbill migrates thousands of miles every year to spend the winter in Taiwan. Their distinctiveness symbolizes a characteristic of the Taiwanese people—confidence and perseverance in times of difficulty.

The green grass and Phalaenopsis (Butterfly) orchids stand out against the dark background. They are the pride of Taiwan, which has a worldwide reputation as the "Kingdom of Orchids." In recent decades, Taiwanese orchid's exports have increased, and Butterfly orchids have frequently been featured in international competitions. This beautiful island is known by its rich natural resources. Green grass represents the Taiwanese as simple, confident, strong and under God's care.
