December is a very busy month. There are three seasons in one go. There is the remnant of the season of Remembrance, followed by Advent with the culmination of Christmas. And there are three different colours, beginning with red for the remembrance of the saints, moving to purple for Advent, then we have the culmination of white for Christmas. And the hymns change. In Remembrance-tide we sing *For all the saints*. In Advent we sing *Lo, he comes with clouds descending*. And at Christmastide we sing *Once in royal David's city*. The hymns change according to the seasons.



Let us begin our examination by looking at the season of the Kingdom, dominated as it is by Remembrance Sunday. The Kingdom season is a time of remembering. We remember the dead and give thanks for their lives. We remember the saints, giving thanks for their witness to God. We remember those involved in war and we pray for peace.

The remnant of the Kingdom season lasts for only a few days before we move into Advent. In Advent, we are waiting and searching and getting ready. In Advent, we are waiting for the coming of God and his Kingdom. We are searching for God's Kingdom. We are praying that we may be made ready for the coming of the Kingdom of God and so we pray that we may be fit for the coming of that Kingdom. Advent is a time of repentance, a time for us to be ready for the repentance and forgiveness of sins.



Then comes Christmas, whose meaning has been obscured by the festival of greed and consumption. We have lost sight of the meaning of Christmas, as children badger parents for the latest expensive toy or gadget. Christmas is the time in which the Word is made flesh and dwells among us, full of grace and truth. The Word of God is spoken in the coming of Jesus of Nazareth and the Word of God is seen in the life of an ordinary human being. Jesus comes to us as a baby, vulnerable and hidden from the sight of ordinary human beings, as Jesus shares a life hidden in Nazareth. As Jesus grows up, grows into the fullness of his calling, to be a preacher and teacher. Eventually he falls foul of the political authorities and is put to death on the cross. On the third day he is raised from the dead and enters into the glory of the Resurrection. At Christmastide, we remember birth, death and resurrection all in one go.

In the coming of Christmas this year I am looking forward to a festival of peace and hope. The world seems to have entered into a spasm of hatred and violence, which seems to have no end. The war in Ukraine continues without respite. The war in Gaza seems to have no end with countless bodies lined up to be buried. As the Israeli forces surround al-Shifa hospital and aim to destroy what they think are Hamas fortifications, many civilians are caught up in the blood-letting and fury of the Israelis.

Let us pray that we may be peaceseekers waiting upon the peace of God and we pray that we may seek the Kingdom of God in all its ways and means. May we find in Jesus, the Word made Flesh, that loving peace.

The PCCs

Summary of Christ Church PCC meeting – 8 November

- 1. Opening prayers were led by the Lay Chair.
- 2. Minutes for the 9th of October were approved.
- The change to the long stop date in the Contract which had been approved by the PCC was actioned by signatures from the Lay Chair, the secretary and the warden. The documents had been returned to the diocesan registrar.
- 4. The treasurer had circulated the finance report and summary. The treasurer brought to the attention of the PCC that we were running at a monthly deficit at the moment. There were no unusual items of expenditure in the previous month.
- 5. Mission Community: the zoom link for Compline is hosted by different churches each Thursday evening at 9pm. Please ask if you wish to join.
- 6. The faculty for the extension to the garden of remembrance is continuing to be worked on.
- 7. The safeguarding officer reported that safety resources are online on the diocesan website. Rise Up is a Mothers' Union campaign against domestic abuse for us to support. The Church of England safeguarding development plan is online.
- 8. The churchwarden Jennifer Wood had obtained a document from Barclays bank in connection with the Baldingstone Trust fund, this was being completed and will then be sent back to Barclays.
- 9. In the property group report the trimming of the hedge and footpath on Springside Road had been completed by Tower Forestry and the council had been informed. The tree had been removed from the tower and the church architect had been approached to review the possible damage to the stonework on the tower.
- 10. Fund raising and social: there was an update regarding the Christmas Tree Festival.
- 11. The pastoral committee report was presented to the PCC. It was proposed that Christmas cards be distributed again this year which was agreed.
- 12. It was noted that the Guides 80th birthday party was well attended and enjoyed by everyone.

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It wasn't far to go for the recent meeting of this group, hosted on this occasion at Christ Church. Sadly, I was still the only representative from our two churches.

We heard from Mike from **Red Door**, a great initiative within our own boundaries, currently with 312 individuals registered with them. People sleeping rough but also those sofa surfing and sleeping in cars get lots of help – breakfast, shower, laundry, lunch, as well as advice and links to those who can help them to move forward. It is well worth looking at the website CaritasSalford.org.uk

- funds
- volunteering especially Wednesdays and Fridays

An update on the local work of **Christians Against Poverty** highlighted a lack of befrienders – do you know someone who could be a listening ear? Do you have any skills useful for the new Money course they hope to start? Or could you drive someone to Bolton where there are some great life skills courses available? Demand is so great at present that a new referral is unlikely to be visited before February – a long time for someone who is desperate.

The feedback from the Millgate Centre following last year's **Carol Singing** was overwhelmingly positive – could you spare a couple of hours on 16 December?

Please note the date for **Prayer in the Park** on 18 May 2024 – said venue being Clarence Park, so once again something on our doorstep.

Tristan Sherwin and Dan Harris are chaplains from Churches Together in the Millgate Shopping Centre. Mainly they are developing relationships with staff working in the centre and beginning to make contact with those in shops. However, on All Hallows Eve, with the blessing of the Millgate management they made an opportunity for shoppers, as Tristan writes:

They may appear to be mere ribbons. But each one represents a person or, in most cases, a number of persons who are loved and no longer with us.

It's been a humbling day, as Dan and I have offered people the opportunity to remember through the simple act of tying a ribbon. An act that has given people some breathing space, and provided an opportunity for them to recall and retell something about those they have lost. We've heard many heartbreaking stories today, as people of various ages have spoken about the death of loved ones of various ages: cancer, miscarriage, murder, fatal accidents... tragedies that have indiscriminately deluged lives, leaving a flotsam of emotions and circumstances in their wake.

Again, it's been a humbling day. Grief is a wound many carry. Yet, as someone described it today, 'something I've squashed down and rarely talked about.' Needless to say, ancient wells have opened, as tears have flowed during the past six hours. Surprisingly, what started as a conversation about loss occasionally flowed into further sentences about the other bruises people carry; bruises, again, that have been rarely spoken about.

'Thank you', has been a repeated refrain of today's conversations. 'Thank you for doing this'; 'Thank you for listening'; 'Thank you for giving me time to talk.'

If you were someone who stopped and talked with us today, thank you. It's been a privilege to be an ear. Our hope is that we've managed, in some way, to model God's ear towards you.

May God grant us all ears to hear, and hearts willing to listen."

Are you ready?



Are you ready? How many times have we said that to children and got the answer 'In a minute.' And the minute has become two or three or even five and we've been almost out of the door before they've started putting their

shoes on. But it's not just children who put off getting ready. We might not take so long to get ready to go out but there are other things we're never ready for, however long we have to prepare, and God's coming is one of them.

All through Advent we hear the question 'Are you ready?' - ready to meet God, to sit at his table, to see him face to face and know his love in all its glory and wonder. And if we're honest we have to answer 'No'. We aren't ready to look all that love in the face. We talk about God's love and sing about it with gusto but when it comes to getting up close and personal to that love it's a different matter. We realise our love has been a very pale shadow of God's love and we're ashamed at how poor our loving has been. So when we hear about God coming again we just push away the thought of meeting God who sees through us and all our excuses and deceptions, who sees us as we really are – eager to talk about love but reluctant to let it shape our lives.

But the really good news is that God knows exactly what we're like and still loves us. He knows we want the Second Coming to be postponed indefinitely but it makes no difference to how much he loves us. And loving us as he does he wants to help us know his love, to feel it in our bones, to want it filling our lives – he wants us to be partners in his dance of love. He's not bothered that we can't dance at the level of Strictly – his dance is different, there aren't any complicated steps, we just have to hold his hand and step out in time to the music.

There's no point in saying 'We're not ready.' We'll never be ready, never feel good enough, loving enough, to meet God on our terms. But he's happy with us as we are, he wants us, needs us to be his partners in his dance of love. We may fumble our way through the dance to begin with, but by holding his hand we'll get better, and in time we'll want to reach out to other people who don't feel ready to meet God and taking their hands to draw them into the dance of love.

Reflection by Revd Ian Butterworth for an Advent service 2022

We were visited by organisers from Bury Homeless Project and heard about the challenges they have to deal with, and how many people they help on a daily basis. We asked lots of questions and were shocked at how many children our age are affected and don't have the things we take for granted. The leaders gave us all £1 and set us a challenge to grow our pound to raise money for the charity. After activities including baking cakes and washing cars, we raised a total of £115.50, which has been passed on to BHP.



This term we have been focusing on the Be Well theme in our programme. We have learnt how to administer emergency first aid, including the recovery position, bandages and slings; taken part in fitness activities and made face packs, foot soaks and hand exfoliators as part of a pamper night. Emma from Empathy Holistic Buddies CIC spent an evening with us.

During the session we took a journey along the river and into the mountains to explore our emotions, concentrating on breathing and doing some self and peer massage.

We celebrated our 80th birthday by holding a joint event with the Brownies. It was lovely to invite past Brownies, Guides and Leaders back to spend time with us and reminisce. We all wrote memories and added them to the tree and sang a variety of campfire songs. It was fantastic to welcome Joyce Grindrod who joined Brownies when the unit first opened. Joyce cut the cake, along with Lily Moss who is the current youngest Brownie. Thank you to everyone who donated to our raffle, tombola and cake stall. We raised £425 which has gone to Waddow Hall Trust, to purchase 4 bricks, in their fundraising attempt to save the centre where we have camped many times.

A Guide scarecrow joined a Leader and Brownie for the church scarecrow festival. They sat around the campfire toasting a marshmallow as that is our favourite place to be.

We made felt poppies, which we wore on our uniform at Church Parade on Remembrance Sunday.

December will bring the church Christmas Tree festival which will showcase our tree, with homemade decorations; we will be attending and participating in the Christingle service and finishing the term with a visit to Rock Up climbing wall.

We wish you all a Merry Christmas and look forward to more activities in 2024.

I believe in the one whose spirit glorified a little town; and whose spirit still brings music to persons all over the world, in towns both large and small.


I believe in the one for whom the crowded inn could find no room, and I confess that my heart still sometimes wants to exclude Christ from my life today.

The Open Group



The Open Group met on Wednesday 8th November for an interactive evening based on the Mothers' Union 'Big Idea' theme. This was an initiative previously tried at Mothers' Union and Barbara suggested that the same could work for the Open Group. After considering the

idea and how it works, I thought it may be worth having a go, although I was unsure how people would react and participate. I was completely wrong to be doubtful.

For those of you who have not joined in the game before, then the idea is to think of as many mission-based activities for our Churches you can think of with the aid of (possible) unrealistic resources. For those who have not played before, then I will not spoil it too much by telling you what was on offer. However, by the end of the evening we had created some quite novel ideas, which had some element of mileage to them. Providing food for the homeless in a community setting; a dance group to aid our worship; activity days out; Christian gift stalls; an Easter festival with entertainment; aiding our older members to access online worship.

The overall consensus was that the evening was productive as well as fun and the focus was very much on community and how we can bring the wider community to our Church. Maybe if Mission is a theme for 2024 then

one or two ideas from this and the Mothers' Union evening previously could be considered.




