

They say that time flies when you are enjoying yourself. It must be true for it seems no time at all that I was trying to walk in gale-force winds on the seafront at Southsea in the days before Christmas.

Since then we have experienced the joys of a family Christmas, the uncertainty of rail travel from London to Manchester, a wedding anniversary, New Year and our daughter's birthday. It has been a joyful time and has gone by in a flash.

In church terms, we have experienced Christmas, Epiphany and at the time of writing, we will shortly celebrate Candlemas. By the time you actually read this we will be heading into Lent. (It must be coming soon as Hot Cross Buns are on sale in the supermarket.) Time has flown.

Lent – what does it mean? That period of forty days (if you don't count the Sundays) when we remember the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, when he was tempted by the devil.

Jesus had taken himself off into the desert to listen to his Father, to take time out from the pressing needs of his ministry. He resisted the temptations presented to him even though they could have had enormous benefits but would have been against the wishes of his Father. During that time he was strengthened for the future, certain of the path he had to take. (Matthew 4:1-11, Luke 4:1-13)

But how is it for us? Perhaps the greatest temptation we have is to ignore Lent - to treat it as a rather old-fashioned archaic concept about purple altar frontals and no flowers, solely about resisting temptations, about giving up material things in sacrifice. We sometimes fail to recognise its significance as a period of preparation like Advent, but preparation for the sorrow of Passiontide and the joy of Easter. Don't mistake me - denial of things we enjoy can make us more appreciative of what we have, but there is opportunity to take more positive action during Lent.

Rather than giving something up, could we do something more? More prayer, more Bible reading, more service to our church and our neighbours?

Lent for us should also be, as the time in the wilderness was for Christ, a time to listen to God's plan for us, a time to establish our priorities, a time to get them in order. To determine what is important in our lives as members of society and as Christians. A time to acknowledge that forces exist which take us away from lives governed by Christ's teaching, forces of greed, of power, of self-interest, of impatience, of economic necessity. This is a time to face them and to reject them.

In these forty days may we become closer to God, more certain in our faith, more able to understand the sacrifice Jesus made for us, and more prepared to experience the joys of Easter Sunday.

- * We are delighted that, on Sunday 26th November, it was announced that the new Incumbent of the Benefice of Walmersley Road will be Revd Harvie Nicol. We pray for Harvie and Sally as they prepare to move and begin this next step in their ministry.
- * We congratulate Canon Barbara Taylor who has been invited by Bishop David to join the Order of William Temple, which aims to recognise the significant role of leaders (primarily lay) over a long period of time, here in our diocese. Barbara's installation will be in the Cathedral at 5.30pm on Sunday, 3rd March and everyone is welcome. (Cathedral services are usually live-streamed too.)
- * We pray for the new Area Dean of Bury and Rossendale, Donna Williams who was licensed at St Peter's Bury on 21 January. She succeeds Rachel Mann in the role.
- * We thank everyone who has been involved in or supported the services and events over the past couple of months: the Christmas Fair, Tree Festival, Christingle Services, School services, and our well attended Christmas services.
- * Many thanks to our ministry team and to visiting ministers who are ensuring that the vast majority of our usual services are continuing throughout our vacancy.
- * The Ministry Team (clergy and the Licensed Readers) meets every month normally on the second Tuesday evening. If you have an issue that you would like them to discuss, please contact one of the team.
- *The Bury Mission Community currently hosts a weekly service of Compline (night prayer) on Thursday at 9.00pm on Zoom. If you are interested in joining this, please contact David Robinson, Barbara Taylor or Ian Banks who can forward the Zoom link.
- * Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the treasurers.

Summary of St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting – 5 December

- Mission Community There were updates from the Bury MC leaders meeting, which took place on 23rd October. The Diocesan Transforming Prayer Community was also mentioned and people encouraged to sign up.
- Seedfield Housing: There are currently no further updates, other than to mention that the issue of extra traffic has been re-raised.
- School Governor We are awaiting updates as the latest Governor's meeting was cancelled due to illness.
- New Incumbent There was a summary of the announcement made on Sunday 26th November and to advise that the date of Harvie's appointment will be made known in due course. There is work to be undertaken on the Vicarage first.
- Finance We received the totals from recent events including the afternoon tea, coffee morning and Christmas fair. It was also discussed how we can include more school involvement in fairs and it was felt we need to give the schools more notice of the events.
- Charitable giving It was agreed to once again donate 10% of our planned giving income to 10 separate charities. These will be CMS, Tear Fund, Practical Action, WaterAid, Christian Aid, Church Homeless Trust, Christians Against Poverty, Derian House, The Eagles Wing and Friends of Chesham School. Our Christmas giving and magazine greeting donations this year will be split between Bury Hospice and UK-MED Ukraine. As of Christmas Eve this stood at just over £300.00.
- 100 Club There will be an additional prize fund for the Christmas draws.
- Health and safety There were reminders about the opening and subsequent locking of the fire gate at the side of the Barritt Room when groups are using the building.
- Dates There were dates put in the diary for 2024 including the Summer and Christmas fairs.
- There was a further PCC meeting on Thursday 18th January and the notes will be in the next magazine.

Summary of Christ Church PCC meetings on December 12 and January 10

- Finance: A generous donation had been received from Barbara and Derek Calrow. The donations in memory of Jaqueline Lomax had been made up to £900 and divided equally between 25th Bury (Christ Church) Brownies and Third Thursday lunches. We continue to run at a deficit each month and need to encourage giving.
- 2. We have paid Parish Share in full again and intend to do so in 2024. The Treasurer encouraged everyone to see the updated page of information about the parish share on the diocesan website and it was decided that we should show the short video on the subject at the next café church.
- 3. After discussion it was agreed that on the initial receipt of the monies for the sale of the field we should invest with CCLA through the Diocese. Currently we await a response from Morris Homes on the abnormal costs and this is being followed up by the land agent and the diocesan registrar.
- 4. The new year began with a review of the Mission action plan section concerning "Growing". The "ASK" by 2026 in the Deanery of Bury and Rossendale states that to achieve pre-2019 levels of people attending church requires us to bring in 4-7 new people each year. There are also levels suggested for sustainable growth and for "growing younger". The Treasurer reminded PCC that there is a diocesan grant for any parish with plans for growth which require funding.
- 5. Stepping Stones for Growth: God is at work in our community, so we should be open to opportunities to reach out. It was suggested we could get involved in the Mother's Union Rise Up initiative.
- 6. ECO church: the lay chair commented that it would be wonderful if we could find a person or persons to take a lead on this, maybe across the Benefice.
- 7. It was agreed to put the proposed installation of a defibrillator on hold for the moment.
- 8. The problem of the continuing electrical problems in the church hall that had been occurring since just before Christmas was discussed.

The secretary had arranged for electricians to come and check the church hall electrics on Friday the 12th January.

The property group had plans to make the ramp into church more stable.

- 9. The question of social and outreach events during 2024 was discussed and the lay chair agreed to collate all suggestions sent to her, ready for a further planning meeting.
- 10. It was noted that anyone working in church on their own should have the telephone number of a church key holder in case of emergency, and we should remind people of this.
- 11. The date of the next meeting is Monday, 12th February at 1.30pm.

Extracts from Bishop David's Epiphany letter

As we celebrate Epiphany, with its message that Jesus Christ is the Good News for the whole of God's creation, I want to begin by thanking each and every one of you for all that you have done to make this reality more widely known and lived throughout the Manchester Diocese over the last twelve months.

As our vision makes clear, all our efforts must be surrounded by prayer. The founding and growth of our Prayer Community has been a real joy. The commitment made by members is simple, but the effect of so much purposeful prayer is immeasurable. Over this next twelve months, I hope that many more individuals will feel able to commit to the simple rhythm it offers.

Most of us are only part of the church because somebody made the effort to talk to us about Jesus, or to invite us to a church event where we would hear the gospel set out. Whilst not every Christian is a gifted evangelist, we can all play our part, by being ready to share the difference our faith makes in our lives with those who ask or show interest.

So, my hope and prayer is that 2024 will be a year that combines effort with excitement, where hope becomes reality, and that our labours will prove both fulfilling and fun.

She was an example of a true Christian. Sybil was a very approachable person. She welcomed you with a smile and a warm hello. Sybil was interested in people and would do what she could to help. After spending most of her life, with her beloved George, 'on the front line' as shop-keepers, this made it easy for her. Sybil's life was not always easy, but she was always 'firm but fair' and 'assertive not aggressive'. If she had a point to make, she made it, and you knew about it.

Sybil was always interested in people, community, and social causes and this is evident from the number of committees she was on. If there was a committee, Sybil was on it. If there wasn't a committee Sybil would find a reason to set one up. At the heart of everything Sybil did, it was to ensure that if a job was worth doing, it was worth doing well and was important. She always kept copious notes and none of them were ever thrown away. Sybil had vision to see what was needed, and this led her to setting up The Carers Group and doing recordings for Talking Books.

The dearest thing to Sybil was her family. Sybil had a very strong and loving family, being brought up by her Mum and Grandma. Sybil met George when she was 21, they married in the same year and were always together until George passed away. They had their children, George and Lesley, who they adored and in later life they were blessed with their Grandchildren Jordon, Sophia and Samantha who they were immensely proud of.

Sybil was a strong character, strong in her faith, a true, dedicated and faithful servant of and for Christ Church Walmersley.

May Sybil now Rest In Peace, back with her beloved George.






