I hear you knocking, but.....

Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with him, and he with me.
(Revelation 3 v 20)

How are you with cold callers?



The knock on the door, or the bell rings – who’s that now?

...“Good afternoon, we’re just working down the road and your driveway/roof/garden looks like it might need some attention. We can help...” or “ Hello there, how are you, I’m here on behalf of ???? charity and I wonder if you would like to give some financial support to our work.”

What is your reaction? I have to admit that often my natural response is often along the lines of “No thank you....I’ll call you if I want you...don’t come pestering me with unsolicited approaches. Unsolicited meaning the approach is unwanted or unwelcome.

When Jesus rode into Jerusalem on that first Palm Sunday some 2000 years ago he was making a public statement, as were his followers. It was his time to come into Jerusalem in a blaze of publicity. I don’t know if he actually shook a lot of hands, as would happen now-a-days, but I think he was certainly out to attract attention. He probably smiled and perhaps waved back to the people as they waved and shouted ‘Hosanna’.

Beneath the smile though he knew things would change – that the welcome would change to a rebuff, a spurn, and worse.

Yes, many welcomed Jesus but there were also many who saw him as a disruptive, unwelcome, cold caller who had become a problem that had to be dealt with.

I can't help but think that these days Jesus is still something of a cold caller. I don't see him making a specific appointment with us. He just turns up. He will knock on the door of our lives and await a response; waiting to see if we will open the door and welcome him in - or either not open the door at all, or open the door a little bit only to give him the cold shoulder.

Personally, I know that in September 1983 I opened that door and welcomed Jesus into my life. But when I look back before then I can recognise that Jesus had been knocking before and I had given him the standard cold call response....not now! Go away!

That cold caller attitude can continue long after the initial "Yes Jesus, welcome, do come into my life." Like those times when Jesus calls us to do something and we turn him down – maybe we are too busy; maybe we feel there is no way we could do what he is asking – don't ask me to do that!!....not now....go away!!!

This verse from Revelation tells us that Jesus doesn't just barge in. When he calls, he may politely knock and wait. But the knocking may get louder and more persistent. We may choose to ignore it but eventually we will have to take action and respond. We open the door and we then realise that we should have responded to the knocking earlier - we really do want to welcome him in.

Then he will come in, enter our lives; and things will change as he transforms our minds and hearts through his personal, persistent, patient love.

Jesus will no longer be the cold caller but will be the warm, understanding, best friend we have always wanted.

Sorry I must end there – someone is at the door.....!

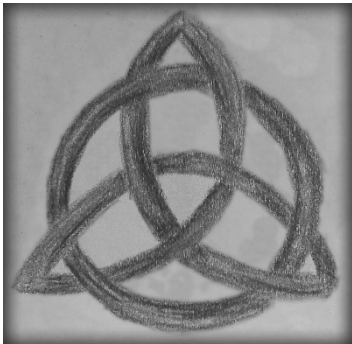

APCM – At St. John with St. Mark on 12 April

- At the election of Church Wardens, Rosemarie Ashworth and June Banks were once again elected as Wardens for the year.
- We approved the Safeguarding policy for the year and Joan Wild has offered to be safeguarding officer again.
- Ian presented his treasurer's report for 2025 and budget for 2026. There were some informative graphs and data regarding Church attendance, Church planned giving and local demographics. This was focussed on the last 10 years and the changes which have occurred.
- There was an opportunity to approve the Independent Examiner's report and Andy Clark has offered to once again be the Independent Examiner for 2026.
- The fabric and buildings report was reviewed and it was noted that the Quinquennial inspection report has not yet been received. There is likely to be work to be done following the report and a working party will be put together as and when there is a need. Ian commented the hall boiler will shortly need to be replaced.
- We have approximately 50 people on the electoral roll and a notice will be issued if anyone is not yet on and wishes to be so.
- At the election of PCC members and Deanery Synod reps, John Brennan was voted to stand for PCC. We now only have two Deanery Synod reps and they will be Ian and David.
- Mary Howarth, Alf Goldfinch and Brian Jones have been elected as Sidespeople.
- There was an opportunity to look through the reports from various Church organisations and groups.
- A vote of thanks was offered to Eileen Smith who has now retired as a Sunday School leader after approximately 40 years. Many young people have been taught by Eileen down the years.
- Helen Mallinson offered a vote of thanks to various people for looking after the Church this year.
- There was a brief PCC meeting after the APCM to elect officers and the first full PCC meeting is on Thursday 30th April at 8.00pm.

* Wardens and Sidespersons are expected to attend one of the Archdeacon's Visitations. The two in our Deanery are: Monday, 1st June at St Mary Rawtenstall, and Wednesday, 8th July at Christ Church Walshaw, both at 7.30pm, so please put your preferred choice in your diary. Although PCC members are not admitted at these services, they are most welcome to attend, make a commitment, and are thanked.

* Bury C of E High School is looking to appoint a chaplain. Access to the school for our churches is paused until the chaplain is appointed. So please pray for a suitable person to be appointed.

* Street pastors are in need of more trustees, who are not actively involved in the work, to oversee it, to network, and to be involved in fundraising, marketing, social media etc. There is also always a need for new street pastors to go out on Friday and Saturday nights to help those in difficulty. Full training is given. Street Pastors also need a new base in the town centre. Please pray for these needs and encourage anyone who is interested.

* If you are a regular attender at our Churches and are not on the Electoral Roll, please consider if you would like to join. This can be done by filling in a simple form. Please get in touch with our Electoral Roll officers or Wardens if you wish to join and are not currently on the roll, or want to check whether you are on.

* There is a very real need for the work of Porch Boxes at this time. Please do all you can to contribute. A box is available at the back of both churches and there are lists of the items most needed.

Bury & Rossendale Deanery Gathering

This event took place at St. Peter's Church, Bury, on 15th April and was an opportunity for people across the Deanery to hear about the Manchester Diocese's strategy for the next 7 years. We were joined by Bishop Matthew of Bolton for opening worship and prayer. Very sadly, the evening began with the announcement that our Deanery Lay Chair Kath Pollard had passed away unexpectedly on Sunday 12th April. We took a moment to remember Kath and offer prayers for her family. Our Easter Bible reading was based on John 21.1-14, Jesus and the Miraculous Catch of Fish, which was presented in an interactive way for us all to join in. This set the theme for our evening, 'Cast Your Nets' and our priorities and aims for the next few years. There were some Diocesan representatives and a video introduced by Bishop David which focussed on the four priorities to deliver the vision:

Parish Renewal – Parishes lie at the heart of our vision for the growth and transformation of our Diocese, which is working closely with Parishes to understand their opportunities and challenges. Support will be provided to help them create bold mission plans and grow their congregations, help with financial management and equipping Clergy and Lay Leaders for renewal through the Leading Your Church into Growth (LYCIG) scheme.

Growing Younger – The Diocesan aim is to double the number of young active disciples and ensure there is a flourishing children and young people's ministry within reach. We intend to develop an approach to engaging with young people by offering support to them in all stages of their discipleship journey. Younger people aged up to 35 will also be nurtured in vocations and call to leadership.

Church Planting & Revitalisation – Having set up a number of Resource Churches in recent years, we are accelerating the rate of Church planting across the Diocese. We heard about the revitalisation of William Temple Church in Wythenshawe and were pleased to hear about a forthcoming similar plan for St. Thomas' in Bury with a newly Ordained leader there. The Antioch Network will continue to be a part of the approach for growth in estates and within diverse communities.

Developing Missional Leaders – The focus is on bringing forward and developing talented Ordained and Lay people who are representative of the diversity of the Diocese. There will be work equipping 18-25's in mission and ministry through various programs. The development of vocations for Ordained ministry to equip new curates will continue, alongside the provision of accessible and inspiring Lay ministry pathways. There are more about these on the website.

By focusing on these four priorities, we are working to achieve an increase in our congregations and leaders by 2033 and there was an opportunity to speak with the people sat near us about something which has



inspired us and we can take back to our Parishes. The Transforming Prayer Community has helped develop discipleship resources as we grow as Christians and walk with Jesus. Prayer seemed an ideal way to end the evening as we were invited to pray together for our Parishes, leaders and strategy for the Diocese.

When an asylum seeker is granted refugee status, they have 28 days to leave the home office accommodation, where they have been housed and to make their own arrangements, which is a very short time to find a place to rent and a job. Many therefore end up on the street, homeless. This new scheme is asking those with a spare furnished bedroom to consider renting this for 3-12 months to someone who has been granted asylum, while they find their feet.

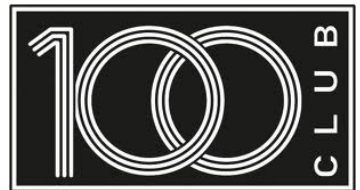

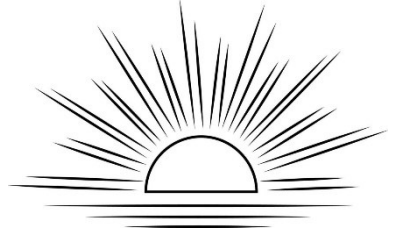
Quiet Moments for May

May we receive the Holy Spirit in this place. Amen.

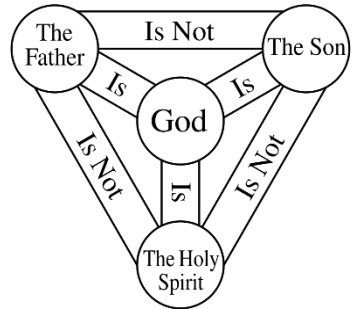

Thy Kingdom Come

The period from Ascension Day to Pentecost (14-24 May 2026) is when Churches mark the season of Thy Kingdom Come. This is a global ecumenical prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray for more people to come to know Jesus.



This year's Thy Kingdom Come is all about the presence of God through His spirit. There are various resources on Thy Kingdom Come website and we are ordering 25 Novena booklets written by Dame Sarah Mullaly, Archbishop of Canterbury, available in both Churches. These will help to form a prayer journal as you pray for 5 people who do not yet follow Christ that they may come to know him as we do. There is a reflection for each day from Ascension Day to Pentecost.

The God who is with us in the everyday – in the joys and sorrows of life (and everything in between) and the One who, through His spirit, longs to reveal Himself to those who do not yet know Him.

From the story of Ruth to the story of Gideon, from the story of Elijah to the story of the early church who waited for the promised Holy Spirit to come- over the 11 days we will explore a different Bible story each day, which demonstrates God's transformative presence, power and love at work in the lives of people and places.

Our hope is that as we pray for our five people, they will also experience the life-changing love of God and choose to follow Him.

Last year we had a Prayer in the Park event in Clarence Park organised by Bury Churches Together and there are plans for this to happen again on the Eve of Pentecost, Saturday 23rd May.

Rosemary Taylor writes: York Province Mothers' Union have chosen to mark the 150th Year by having a prayer capsule that visits each diocese in the province. In each diocese, a new prayer will be added and the capsule will then be presented to the archives at Mary Sumner House.

The capsule started its week in Manchester on 4th April, with a short handover service in the Cathedral Lady Chapel, where Di Waller, DP for Chester, handed it over to Bolton Archdeaconry President, Pauline Greenhalgh.

The capsule then made its way to Bolton, and spent an evening with members of Salford and Bolton Deaneries. Fr Robert Eloff of St Matthew's, Little Lever led an informal Blessing of the Capsule service, followed by refreshments and socialising.

On Wednesday MU members joined with St John's House staff in the Chapel for their midday communion. This was a great opportunity to raise awareness of the Mothers' Union with Diocesan staff, and we were made to feel very welcome.

Later in the week, A joyful and reflective gathering took place at Rochdale Town Hall, as members from across the Rochdale Archdeaconry came together to receive the Prayer Capsule. The afternoon was honoured by the presence of Rev Anne Gilbert, Area Dean, and the Mayor of Rochdale, Councillor Janet Emsley, whose support added to the sense of occasion and community spirit. Prayers created a calm and uplifting atmosphere for all who attended. A short reflection was shared by Archdeaconry President, Canon Catherine Hilton, supporting the faith, fellowship and service of Mothers' Union in the Diocese of Manchester and giving an outline of the campaigning work encouraged by Mary Sumner. It was a meaningful time of unity, prayer, and encouragement, warmly appreciated by all present.

The final journey was to take the Prayer Capsule to Liverpool Diocese. We joined St Chad, Kirkby's Sunday morning service, and prayed and blessed the capsule as it continues its journey. The news spread not only in the North, but also across all of the Mothers' Union as we were featured in their communications.

Thursday Light Lunches

Thursday lunches all began over ten years ago. It was Lent and we were looking for a way to bring people together socially, yet for a purpose – that purpose being doing something different for Lent which would, hopefully, raise a little money to send to Tearfund – a Christian charity that seeks to help those in greatest need in the world. 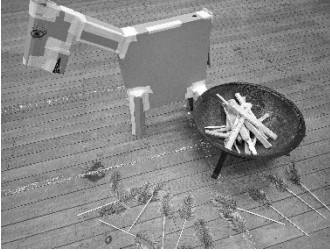
