the BIG picnic

As some of you know, I have the privilege of co-leading the Diocesan Authorised Lay Ministry (ALM) course on Worship and Liturgy. We've had around 20 participants the last couple of years. Some are on their way to becoming Readers, others to being ALM's, others just want to think more about worship and liturgy.

In one session recently, one of the prospective Readers, I'll call him Michael, shared that the day before he'd walked past a person living on the streets in Manchester and had avoided looking at them. But then he thought better of it, turned back and talked with them for a while. He couldn't remember if he'd given any money or not but, as he went to leave, the person said to him: "Thank you. Thank you for noticing me."

You could tell that Michael was profoundly moved by that. That somehow the encounter had changed him. And it changed the room too as we listened.

It made me think again of the Jigsaw Poem, that I've shared with you before. So, I sent it to Michael. He replied: 'One of the things which made me think very hard about being a Reader was an emotional thought that, as well as being a privilege, it carries a great responsibility. Not to be undertaken lightly, indiscreetly or wantonly (as I think it says in the marriage service). The thought occurred that in preaching, my words may have an effect on someone's life, for good or ill. This poem seems to touch on this quite well, I think.'

I'm sure that many of those ordained at the end of June feel the same. But I think that's true for all of us. Not just the preachers and ministers amongst us, but all of us. Any word shared in conversation, any action taken, any help given. God can use us to be His messengers. More often than not, we're completely unsuspecting and unaware. But sometimes, by some word or deed - or just by our presence - the other might be changed in some way. Or we might be changed by them. Just like Michael and the man on the street.

Sometimes, just sometimes, you get to find out the reason why you meet someone. Those times can be rare, but they're a blessing. So, hold onto those moments, humbled and grateful. Your jigsaw and theirs, a little bit more complete.



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**Summary of St. John with St. Mark meeting of 21st May 2024**

- Safeguarding: Joan Wild was reappointed Safeguarding Officer for the year. It was noted that all PCC members now need to undergo the online safeguarding courses and these will be organised soon.
- Mission Community Activities: The preparation for Big Church Picnic was discussed and an appeal for stewards has been put out to help coordinate on the day; the Prayer in the Park event had been very successful and enjoyable; it was noted that a Quiet Day had also recently taken place.
- Pantomime: Harvie would meet with the Pantomime group at the Vicarage on Tuesday 28th May.
- School Governor: Harvie will now take on this role after Rosemarie had covered the position temporarily.
- Finance: The Parish Share amount has been agreed for the next few years; recent expenditure has included repairs to two Church heaters, the CCLI licence renewal, a fire extinguisher and the waste disposal contract.
- The Cenotaph at the Salvation Army Citadel: We have a responsibility to maintain this. It is need of sprucing up as some of the names have worn. We will seek quotes for any work.
- Vicar's report: Thank you from Harvie for the welcome he and Sally have received; they have now moved into the Vicarage and thanks to those who helped with cleaning; Harvie has asked that his phone number and e-mail address is communicated; a review of service cover may need to be looked at going forward; plans for the future may include study courses and home groups. We also need to have a closer look at work with schools.
- Health & Safety: We are seeking quotes for new Hall chairs as the existing ones are old and worn; recent heavy rain has caused flooding in the cellar, but this has now been pumped out; the defibrillator is in working order.
- The next PCC meeting is on Tuesday 9th July and proposed dates for the next year have been set.

## ***Notes from Diocesan Synod***

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The recent meeting of Diocesan Synod opened with some inspiring, very lively and inter-cultural opening worship, with several members praying in their native language.

Bishop David addressed Synod asking us all to pray for all our politicians that they may be honest. The bishop asked us to promote:

- Peace and reconciliation.
- Respect everyone whatever their views; oppose all race/religious issues.
- Irradicate poverty
- Care for the planet.
- Accept all nationalities.

Canon Philip Blinkhorn (chair of the Board of Finance), in his final report to synod before retiring, explained that the finances are in a reasonable state but there is no room for complacency.

The cost of work done on vicarages has increased and some redundant vicarages are being sold.

The planned number of clergy posts remains at 175. Some roles are not included in this as they are paid for by the National Church.

Three churches closed in 2023. Average attendance was up by 5% in 2023. There was a slight rise in children attending. There are 24 ALMs in training this year.

All parishes are asked to consider a plan for becoming eco churches. 3 churches received silver awards for their changes and 7 received bronze awards. *(Here in Walmersley Road we are only just beginning this journey and continue to look for those willing to take a lead.)*

Simon Cook spoke about Bolton Deanery, exploring how we can transform the way we look at things, comparing how elephants (in a herd) behave towards each other. We too should be more relational, not solitary, members of the congregation. We are stronger together, caring for one another, encouraging each other.

There are elections taking place to appoint the next Diocesan Synod.

Bishop Mark gave the blessing.

We have had so many wonderful times over the years, but all good things must come to an end as they say. For many of us who have been volunteering for more years than we care to admit, it will be a wrench – but we must also stress that our decision was in no way a reflection on the youngsters. Just as we thank the church for their support, we have thanked all the youngsters and their parents (past and present) for the fabulous memories they have given us. Hopefully what the youngsters have learnt along the way will stand them in great stead and live on with them into adulthood. That is after all what it has always been about – giving them skills for life.



The concept of 'The Gathering' emerged at the end of the COVID lockdown. A number of people from various churches in Bury and Heywood had been meeting for 'Zoom Church' online. Through this worship and fellowship, relationships had been built and we were reluctant to give up these connections whilst feeling the need to return to worship in our individual parishes.

Following discussion, we decided to meet on Zoom once a week to discuss things spiritual and pray together. Of course, we would need to have a focus to promote discussion and it was felt that, maybe, since we were listening each week to the set readings and a sermon on Sunday, we could base our fellowship around this. So that is what we have been doing since the beginning of December 2021 (or at least that is when my records begin).

It was very well received and so we have decided to include it every 2nd Thursday of the month.

I was interested to see how they would divide this talk between them but found that largely Janet gave us lots of facts about the sites they visited, both gave us insights into the homes and everyday lives of the people, and Rosemary showed some of the varied foods she had eaten. Every meal involved rice (although apparently, she declined it at breakfast) but we saw photos of such delicacies as rat – tastes of chicken, but a tip is not to go for a small one as there isn't a lot of meat – and frog (not just the legs).

Mothers' Union's Summer of Hope appeal this year aims to build on years of wonderful work that's transforming the lives of women and girls in sub-Saharan Africa. Literacy and numeracy are vital life skills for all of us.

In the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), the cycle of poverty, crushing women's and girls' chances of a better life, has been exacerbated by decades of conflict. The conflict has deepened a significant gender gap in literacy, with 66.5% of women being literate compared to 88.5% of men. Not being able to read and write means women are prevented from participating economically and socially. It severely limits their understanding of their rights and health issues.

The Literacy Circles enable women to learn life-changing literacy, as well as numeracy, agriculture and business skills. Helping women learn these vital life skills helps them support their families and gain status in their communities. So the hope is that the work which has been done in four dioceses in DRC can be extended to a further four.

As I write we have not determined exactly how we plan to raise funds for this appeal but we hope very much that we can rely on your support. Please look out for more information on weekly sheets, posters, etc as we expect this to be the focus of our meeting on 21<sup>st</sup> August.

Bury Division Rangers has been dormant for a number of years but will be reopening this September.


They will be based at Christ Church Walmersley hall and meet on a Monday evening.


