

We end our prayers with "Amen," a word that means "let it be so." We know we can be faithful disciples by your grace. Amen!

From May through June and into July, it's been my joy and privilege for the last few years to help lead the Worship and Liturgy Authorised Lay Ministry (ALM) course for Manchester Diocese.

All sorts of people attend this. This year we have three in their twenties through to one man in his eighties. Some are church wardens in interregnum who have suddenly found themselves taking services when they can't find a priest. Others are at the start of their journey to becoming Readers or Ordained. Whilst others are just interested in the subject and want to know more.

Amongst the 25 on the course, there is one man from Uganda and two from Iran, who are already bringing very different perspectives to our discussions. And we have a wide variety of professions, as well as the retired, represented within the group.

In addition to learning how to put a Service of the Word together (which you might well be on the receiving end of, since for the last couple of years I've promised to deliver what they produce) there are sessions on biblical context, use of music, worship with children, worship in Care Homes for young and old, the seasons in the Anglican church, healing & reconciliation services, as well as the use of Taizé, art and poetry.

I was going to say that when so much of the press about the church is negative, it's refreshing to see the eagerness of such a wide range of people at the grass roots, looking to explore their calling and their ministry. And that's where the joy and privilege come in - helping them along part of that road in the brief time that we're together. One lady told me last Saturday that her daughter had been on the course 2 years ago and that it had "changed her life" – she'd quit her job and was now a deputy head in a Church of England Secondary School. That was very humbling – but I trust that it was the right decision!

However, I'm writing this letter in the days immediately following the announcement of the new pope, Leo XIV. And, at least for the moment, there seems to be less negativity and more a real sense of hope and expectancy – and not just amongst Roman Catholics. From the balcony, Leo spoke about a "rededication to peace" and, at his first mass, that the Church should be a "beacon that illuminates the dark nights of this world".

I really do hope that his vision captures people's imagination. Wouldn't it be wonderful if that same sense of enthusiasm and being called into something new, that I see in my small ALM group, was characteristic of all Christians everywhere?



### Summary of St John with St Mark PCC of 29th April 2025

- There was a welcome from Rosemarie to the first PCC of the new term and to any new or returning members.
- Ian advised that the service rota has been filled to the end of July. We have baptisms and weddings booked in for later this year and next year.
- We were asked how the Easter Day joint service went and the general view from those who attended was that this was a good service and Harvie's preaching was inspirational and heartfelt.
- We had a review of recent Mission Community activities including Lent Evensong shared preaching and the Easter Vigil service. Helen did a reading on our behalf at this service but due to practicalities we were unable to take the Paschal candle for blessing. This will be looked into for next year.
- It was confirmed that we had over 50 people required on the electoral roll to ensure we have sufficient spaces on the PCC and Deanery Synod.
- Finance: Recent coffee mornings in March and April have made a good amount of money. We have paid the copyright / music licence for the year.
- A discussion has arisen regarding wheelchairs and accessibility to the chancel via the steps. We are looking into a new portable ramp for these steps to allow wheelchair users or people with mobility issues access to the chancel and high altar to receive communion and potential other purposes. Measurements have been taken and a price has been quoted. The outside ramp we use for the main door is not suitable for the chancel.
- Rosemarie confirmed that an inspection of the fire extinguishers has recently taken place in both church and hall.
- A check of the defibrillator is required but all other health and safety checks are taking place.
- Dates: The summer fair has moved back a week to 31st May; There will be a scarecrow festival at Christ Church in July on the theme of sport and groups were asked to consider any creations; Ian has proposed a date in September for the Eden Singers to perform a concert. The next PCC is Thursday 19th June at 8.00pm.

### A Report of the APCM meeting at Christ Church on 18th May 2025

Opening prayers were led by the Lay Chair, as we remembered those who have died during the past year.

23 people attended.

At what is technically a separate 'Meeting of Parishioners' the two wardens Jennifer Wood and Jason Edwards were duly elected and thanked for all they had achieved during the past year.

Written reports having been circulated prior to the meeting, it was possible to move smoothly through the agenda.

1. The minutes of the 2024 APCM meeting were proposed for acceptance by Denise Booth and seconded by Patricia Stokes.

2. The treasurer's report for the 2024 year was presented; and no questions were asked. The treasurer went on to say that apart from the capital money invested for future work, the day to day running of the church was costing more than the money coming in. It was noted that we have again paid our parish share in full.

3. Rosemary Taylor and Geoff Stokes were re-elected for a three-year period on the PCC. It was noted that there was still one vacancy available to represent the parish on the Deanery Synod and two vacancies (one for only one year) on the PCC.

4. The child and vulnerable adult policy document was ratified at the APCM, proposed by Rosemary Taylor and seconded by Jennifer Wood.

5. AOB. There was a general discussion on the ageing population of the congregation and the lack of younger members. Several points to consider for the future were noted.

6. A number of thanks were expressed, by the chair and by members at the meeting.

6. In particular, the lay chair thanked Ian Riddick for his past work as secretary of the PCC and this was echoed by other members of the APCM.

From near and far (well, mainly near but one can't get much farther than Australia), very young and not quite so young, we gathered to reminisce, in the week of the 80th anniversary of VE Day. If the noise levels were any indication there were lots of memories being shared.

A wide variety of cakes, and later the option of potato pie or corned beef hash, were enjoyed - thank you to all involved, before, during and after.

Thank you to Geoff for the music, the choir members who supported and all who joined in - listening, dancing, singing.

Photos, memorabilia, newspaper articles, a map of Walmersley with points of interest, stories to be shared, snippets gleaned from the School Log, from old parish magazines and from Facebook - a surprising number of sources, besides personal memories from our older friends. Lots of "that's your dad on the end, and that's Mrs X on the front row", "well I never knew that", "really???" "I remember ...."

Thank you to Alan for the inspiration, thank you to all who worked so hard, thank you to all who came, thank you to all who shared. It is so important that we remember and there will be other occasions later in the year to add to these memories.

This was never a fundraiser, but thank you to those who wished to give towards refreshments: an amazing  $\pm 134.55$  which will be used to support work with veterans locally.

+Hugh Nelson, Bishop to the Armed Forces, wrote:

"The 80th anniversary of VE Day is a moment of profound significance for our nation. It is a time to remember with deep gratitude the courage and sacrifice of those who fought for the freedoms we enjoy today.... As we honour the past, so we renew our commitment to building a more peaceful and just world for all." Psalm 23 is probably the most popular psalm. It is said or sung at many weddings and funerals and is the best known of the psalms. There are several hymns based on the psalm including:

The Lord's My Shepherd, I'll not want.

The God of love My Shepherd is.

The King of love My Shepherd is.

Loving Shepherd of thy Sheep.

Shepherd in verse 1 is a metaphor for king. David is believed to be the author of this psalm and acknowledges that the Lord is his Shepherd-King. He is ours too. With the Lord alongside him he will not want for anything. We too can have this experience of God alongside us. We, like David, will be contented and secure like sheep (v2 makes me lie down in green pastures). Unlike our shepherds, the Middle Eastern shepherds lead their sheep. Our shepherds tend to be behind the sheep where they can see them better. The Lord (God) leads David and us like the Middle Eastern shepherd. Still waters in verse 2 are resting places where refreshment and well-being can be found. He shall refresh my soul (verse 3) means he revives me. He guides me in the paths of righteousness is a reminder of the shepherd leading his sheep in paths which are safe and prosperous and conform to his moral will.

Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death (verse 4) refers to the sufferings we endure in life and even the time of death itself. Even in these times, God is with us to comfort us. (Your rod and your staff, they comfort me -v.4).

You spread a table before me in the presence of those who trouble me (verse 5) describes the heavenly Shepherd–King receiving David (and us) at his table in heaven. You anoint my head with oil refers to the way guests were treated at a banquet. My cup shall be full (verse 5) refers to the generosity of the Shepherd-King. With the Lord at our side, then goodness and loving mercy shall follow me all the days of my life (verse 6). I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever. This does not refer to the Temple worship because the Temple was not built until Solomon became king. Instead, it refers to the presence of God in eternity (God's home in heaven).

Whether we are using the psalm at a funeral, having lost a member of the family or a friend, or using it at a wedding, or on other occasions, we can be assured that the Lord is our shepherd and is alongside us in our joys or sorrows as we journey through life, having faith that we may eventually dwell with him in his house (Kingdom) for ever.

I have used the Common Worship version when quoting from the psalm but, below is the 1662 Prayer Book version, with which many people will be familiar. It is set out in three stanzas. Notice the couplets which is a feature of the psalms.

On Wednesday 14th May we met for a talk by Glyn Heath and his work in prosthetics and orthotics for humans and animals down the years. This was a subject previously covered at MOB and Mothers' Union.

One thing that became apparent from the beginning was how early the use of prostheses was made available to those in need, with various examples from 200 years BC and then up to the Victorian times to present day need. It was noted that the gimball, which forms an essential part of a ship's compass, was used for some of these apparatuses. After a basic look at the science and development of these devices, Glyn shared stories on some of his patients, mainly dogs, but also a rat and a honey buzzard. Each of these creatures had their own individual need, either because a limb had been lost, or was present but no longer functioned as it should.

Glyn showed us photos and videos of the animals before and after their surgery and the marked difference that had been made. The creatures looked happy and lively. Glyn's work has taken him around the world and there were some good examples from across the globe of where this work has benefitted.

The talk was evident as to how much the world loves its animals and what people are willing to do for them. One or two people present commented on how human prosthetic limbs had helped their loved ones down the years. Thank you to Glyn for his time and talk.

We will next meet on Wednesday 11th June for a summer social and an opportunity to discuss or make a start with a scarecrow for this year's festival. Anybody is welcome at 7.30pm in the Barritt Room.


