#### Dear friends,

Welcome to our Summer issue of the magazine. I suppose this could be regarded as one of the most difficult to write an editorial for, as we have little in the way of 'season' in our Church life and much 'ordinary time'. It is sometimes also harder to find material for our magazine as some of our Church activities and groups will likely close over these weeks as people take a holiday and organisations close.

There was a time, and possibly this still happens, when our Church services could be slightly shorter in August in that we may omit a reading or leave out the Nicene Creed as examples. Although there may be a practical reason for this, I always felt it strange because whilst the Church may be on a holiday during August, God is not, and is with us like he is the other 11 months of the year. One way in which he is with us is through the act of prayer. Prayer has been a focus for us over the last few weeks in a variety of ways. We have reflected during the period of Thy Kingdom Come, joined Churches Together friends for Prayer in the Park and the Transforming Prayer Community continues to provide helpful resources. This year also sees the 1700th anniversary of the

original Nicene Creed *(more details in the magazine)* and this may also give us an opportunity to reflect in a prayerful way.

During the recent season of Thy Kingdom Come, the focus was on the Lord's Prayer, familiar words which unite us all *(again, more in the magazine)*.



I was drawn to the first word of the prayer – 'Our'. Not 'Your' or 'My' but 'Our'. This is the relationship we all share as a larger family of Christian brothers and sisters. We say 'Our' because it puts us alongside each other wherever we are in the world and at whatever time of the year.

As you read this article, there will be many people across the globe reciting the words of the Lord's Prayer, and as you maybe say this prayer yourself, you will be joining with many unknowns at the same time.

Whilst we may take a break from our activities over the next few weeks, go our separate ways or worship elsewhere, then the one thing we can all do together is pray. There are various ways to do this and there are many resources available to help you. Or you may just be able to find time to yourself in quiet contemplation without the need for words or structure. The point is, that even if we are not together in person over the coming weeks, we are all still united by 'Our Father' and the shared love he has for us all.

Whether you are having a holiday this summer, a break from a group, or continuing your regular activities, please spend some time in prayer, remembering that by doing so you are not alone.

To quote Acts 1.14 "They were constantly devoting themselves to prayer".

I wish everybody across the Benefice a peaceful and restful summer.

### Summary of a meeting of Christ Church Walmersley PCC on 10<sup>th</sup> June 2025

- 1. The meeting opened with prayers.
- 2. The Lay Chair outlined her thoughts on furthering the mission of the Church in the Parish, saying that there was a need to be even more pro-active however small the steps taken may be.
  - Committees, now being reformed following the APCM, were encouraged as always to co-opt, in order to draw in untapped talent.
- 3. The minutes of the meetings of the 14<sup>th</sup> April and 18<sup>th</sup> May (following the APCM) were approved by the PCC.
- 4. The list of sidespersons for the coming year was ratified by the PCC.
  - Sidespersons for the year are: Paul Chan, Geoff Hamilton, Pamela Hoyle, Amy Paterson, Ian Riddick and Kathleen Whipp
- 5. The Treasurer reported on the current state of finances and agreement was passed for changes to the signatories on the bank mandate.
- 6. A discussion followed the 'Growing Younger' report, focusing on how ideas might be implemented in our Parish.
- 7. The PCC approved repairs to be carried out on the Church Hall roof.
- 8. The next meeting will be on Tuesday, 29 July.
- 9. The meeting closed at 9.18pm with the Lord's Prayer.

#### Summary of St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 19 June 2025

- Ian provided an update on the clergy rota, which has been filled to the end of October. There are Baptisms and weddings also booked in and clergy cover has also been organised. Harvest will take place on Sunday 12th October.
- There was an update on Mission Community activities. A quiz night in our hall is provisionally booked in for Friday 19th September, however it is felt we need to know if other Churches are willing to be involved in the organising.
- There is still no update from the Quinquennial inspection report.

   Summer Fair raised £1110.00; Christies stalls at recent coffee mornings have raised £296 for the charity. It was commented that coffee mornings are now raising a good amount of money compared to previous years.
- Rosemarie and Margaret have continued to do some jobs in the garden areas. There has also been some weeding and moss killing done in key areas.
- All health safety issues are currently up to date.
- A coffee morning has been booked for Saturday 2nd August.
   This was previously scheduled for July.
- Next PCC meeting is Tuesday 16th September at 7.30pm.

#### **Churches Together Toy Appeal**



The need for help to organise this appeal was mentioned in June's magazine. We now have more detail of the requirements and would like to have some willing volunteers by our meeting on 21 July.

If YOU could be involved in this please speak to David Robinson or

Barbara Taylor as soon as possible. This is such a worthwhile initiative making a huge difference to so many people in Bury. Last year over 400 children in more than 250 families benefitted.

Requests from and distribution to the families will be the responsibility of schools, family workers, social workers, support workers, GP's and others who work directly with vulnerable families in our town.

Here in Churches Together we are looking for:

<u>2-3 people</u> who liase between with the churches, send a standard letter to those in the database and receive the requests, which they will divide across the churches involved, so that none has too great a work load. If necessary they arrange for a redistribution of presents between churches.

<u>3-4 churches</u> who will have storage space, which should be available 1<sup>st</sup> November until the second week of December.

<u>1-2 persons within these 3-4 churches</u> capable of organising the collection, storage and then sorting of the presents. These people will be the contact persons for those people mentioned above. They will organise the dates and times when the presents will be sorted in bags per family and worker. They will also organise that the churches are open for workers to collect the bags at the set day/time.

<u>Multiple volunteers</u> within these 3-4 churches as well as others, who will help, under the leadership of the contact persons in each church (and at set days/times) to organise the bags.

Where could you fit in, please? Let us know.

#### CAP Debt Centre



The Christians Against Poverty (CAP) Debt Centre serving Bury has been open for 6 years, with almost 150 people requesting help. The Centre is supported by many churches of various denominations, with Bury

Churches Together giving great support. The work is overseen by the local charity, The Bury Project, and I as the Debt Centre Manager am accountable to their trustees and the Churches Together network.

We continue to see a steady stream of people becoming debt free. Only last week a client became debt-free, having around £35,000 of debt cleared through a form of insolvency. Due to his circumstances constantly changing, and the need to protect his identity by obtaining a court order, the work took over 17 months. This illustrates that helping people who are in debt is not a straightforward and simple task. Resilience and commitment is required to accompany our clients, on what is often a roller-coaster emotional ride. Often there is a great outcome, although sometimes for one reason or another, our clients don't complete the journey.

Currently we are working on 23 cases.

The Bury Project is wanting to recruit another Debt Coach, and invites expressions of interest from people who would like to explore whether debt coaching is for them. It is essential that the person who is recruited is a Christian, and a member of a supportive church, ideally within the borough of Bury. Someone said that a CAP Debt Coach needs to have a 'soft heart, a clear head, and a thick skin', underpinned by a strong motivation to engage in sharing Jesus with people who don't know him. If you know anyone like this who you think might be suitable, please ask them to contact me for more information. The closing date for applications is 18 August.

Report to the recent meeting of Churches Together in Bury

#### All Creatures Great and Small



This summer the Church of England is celebrating all creatures great and small. We are invited to share photos, either at cofe.io/GreatAndSmall or by sharing within our

churches (<u>wrub@live.co.uk</u>) or on our own social media platforms. We shall then make sure that from 21 July they are shared with the wider world.

So, whether it is a snapshot of some local wildlife, pets who have paid the church a visit, or depictions in stained glass, paintings or carvings, please share.

#### You'll find this easy!

A Church of England survey conducted with 2,035 adults asked them to match seven famous lines with their source. Why not have a go (the answers are given) – then turn the page to find the survey results.

The famous lines from film, literature and history were:

"To be, or not to be"

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times."

"Never in the field of human conflict, was so much owed by so many to so few."

"You'll Never Walk Alone"

"Happy and glorious, Long to reign over us."

"May the Force be with you"

"Give us this day our daily bread".

The answers at random are:

Gerry and the Pacemakers, 'Hamlet' by Shakespeare, the Lord's Prayer, Star Wars, the National Anthem, a 1940 Commons speech by Winston Churchill, 'A Tale of Two Cities' by Charles Dickens. In the survey, the Lord's Prayer came out on top as the most recognisable line, with 80.3% correctly identifying the line.

Just below this was the phrase, "May the Force be with you", from the Star Wars films, recognised by 79.9%.

Shakespeare came out well from the research as well, with 73% correctly identifying the line, "To be, or not to be" with the play Hamlet.

63% are familiar with the national anthem.

61% correctly identified Winston Churchill's line about "the few" and the Battle of Britain.

Another 58 per cent recognised "You'll Never Walk Alone", a song that is especially popular with Liverpool fans.

Charles Dickens did less well, with only 39% knowing the opening lines of A Tale of Two Cities.

The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, said, "In a world of shifting cultures and changing circumstances, the Lord's Prayer remains a steady guide - perhaps never more so than now.

"Lines like 'Give us this day our daily bread' speak powerfully to today's challenges, reminding us to seek sufficiency, not excess, and to consider what 'enough' truly means."

#### The Lord's Prayer was originally written in Greek

The Nicene Creed is a summary of core Christian beliefs regularly used in worship. It originally dates from the year 325 when it was agreed by the First

Council of Nicaea. Part of the purpose of developing the creed was to give expression to the understanding of God as Trinity. This means that Christians believe in one God in three persons – Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Since 325, the creed has been modified, expanding particularly on the description of the Holy Spirit. Some of these modifications were not accepted by all churches and remain a point of disagreement between western and eastern churches.

The Nicene Creed is nevertheless the most widely accepted creed in the Christian faith, used by many denominations including the Anglican Communion. It is a reminder of the common faith we share – both with Christians around the world today and throughout history with all those who have affirmed these words over the last seventeen centuries.

Thus 2025 marks the 1700th anniversary of the original development of the Nicene Creed. Resources have been produced by the Church of England. An app, based on the 24 lines of the creed over a period of 24 days, you could well have missed (because details were very late being published, so it was difficult to highlight them!). However, there are resources we could use – probably in a small group(s) over 4 or 5 sessions.

Is this something which would be of interest to you? Perhaps we could get together in September? Let a Warden know if you are interested.

The earliest Christians realised that Jesus was divine and that the Holy Spirit was Christ's promised gift from the Father. How do *we* regard the 'affirmation of faith' which is part of almost all our services?



In May, at the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VE Day, we reminisced about life in Bury around 1945. It was a day to share memories and to enjoy fellowship. At the same time, we were very conscious that while many had celebrated victory in Europe, the war was continuing. 15 August this year will mark the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VJ Day and on 2 September one of the deadliest conflicts finally ended.

Each November we read in our churches the names of those from these parishes who did not return, and we pray for those left behind and for those who did return but for whom life was never as before.

During World War II, British service men and women were given a bible or gospel to take into conflict. Many of these included a message from King George VI, encouraging them to turn to these words for inspiration and comfort.



This year Hope Together (a charity that hopes everyone, everywhere, will know Jesus) has produced, in partnership with Biblica and the Naval & Military Bible Society, a commemorative edition of the Gospel of John. This edition also features four stories of Christians whose faith guided them through the challenging years and events of WWII, a prayer for peace, and an invitation to follow Christ.

We pray that by reading of the life of Jesus Christ as told by one of his closest friends, others may discover the power of the Bible.




