Dear Friends,

Welcome to this November issue of our magazine. It is now something of a tradition that the theme for this month is Remembrance, and that will form many a different manner here in Church. Whether it be the ancient or modern Saints' we do not know, but who have played such a vital part in the history of our Church, or those close to us on All Souls' Day. Of course, the act of remembering our war dead continues to be a prominent part of our national commemoration. So many opportunities to remember this month.

At the end of July this year, I was out walking down a country path in Merseyside when I was stopped by the sight of a few poppies in the lush grassland. They were very still in the calm day I was enjoying and I took a few moments to look at these real, live flowers



and took a photograph. Although this bold red flower with black centre is something we would normally associate with a November day, here it was on a lovely sunny day in late July. It got me thinking briefly that these signs of remembering are here for us all year round and not just when we do it out of tradition with others.

So, what are these signs? Well, everyone of us will have encountered loss at some point in our lives and we are constantly reminded of that loss throughout the year with anniversaries, birthdays or items around the house. However, with that loss comes a sense of sharing. A time to share with others who have experienced the same loss or can empathise. Many of us rely on our faith at these moments and the Bible can provide a huge source of comfort for some. One of the most notable Bible verses for times such as these is from the Beatitudes, 'Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted' (Matthew 5.4).

The Church and its mission can provide that comfort for those who need it and I have seen, and will continue to see, many examples of that here in our two Churches.

People are reminded of our loved ones in various ways. That may be a regular gathering with a key person missing, a phone call which no longer happens, or a life event without someone at the dinner table. For many people, they will find a way to adapt, but still knowing that things will not be the same again. However, God is with us through every step of our journey of grief and mourns alongside us, as well as sharing in our many joys and memories.

Later this month, we celebrate the feast of Christ the King. A day when we mark the completion of Jesus' time on Earth before we begin another cycle again the following week on Advent Sunday. More about that at the time, however we could also use this day as an opportunity to remember and look back on the year just gone in the work of our own Churches. The things we have achieved, the decisions we have made and of course the people in our congregations and communities we have lost. All these people are now resting alongside Jesus but never forgotten. As for the things we have achieved, well perhaps we should reflect on those and see where that leads us.

Finally, once you have finished reading this letter, perhaps you could spend a short moment in quiet prayer remembering someone close to you and thank God for all they did for you. However way you choose to mark this month, may God be with you.

Christmas outreach




During December, 2900 Christmas cards will be distributed from our churches to homes in the benefice, with details of Christmas services and our greeting. We know that these make an impact on the recipients.

We very much enjoyed experiencing, second-hand, something of the trials and the highs of the walk to Compostela, from pilgrim Frances Branton. Entering God's Presence



Favourite Psalms – Psalm 24

This month's psalm is Psalm 24. There are three parts to this psalm. The first is a hymn of praise to God for His power as Creator (verses 1 and 2), then there is an instruction to those who wish to enter the sanctuary of the temple or as is more likely, the city of Jerusalem (verses 3 to 6) and the final stanza (verses 7 to 10) heralds the arrival of the ark

of the covenant which travelled with the people of Israel wherever they went until Solomon's Temple was built. This signified the presence of God among His people. The ark was a box which contained the Ten Commandments.

Let us now look at each section in detail. In the first stanza, God (the Lord) owns the earth, He founded it and He created everything in it. As we read in Genesis, the Creation of the World by God started as a watery chaos, which God transformed. The sea in verse 2 represents this watery chaos.

We are never out of God's presence, but we need to be pure when we are in it, so this means we need to be pure all the time (*clean hands and a pure heart*). This means we must try to do the right things all the time, avoiding the bad things mentioned in verse 4 (stanza 2).

Whenever I read Psalm 24 verses 7 to 10 it reminds me of the chorus in Handel's *Messiah*. This section was probably recited by David or a priest, leading a victorious army into the city, or allowing those who feel included, according to the stipulations of the second stanza, to follow on into the city and then later, when the temple was built, to go into worship God, the King of kings. GAF Knight in *The Psalms Volume 1* (St Andrew's Press (1982) suggests that two choirs may say the various parts of the stanza antiphonally which means one choir asks the question and the other one replies. This section accompanies the entry of the Ark of the Covenant.

The relevancy of the psalm for us today in 2025 is that we can only come into the real presence of God if our hands and heart are clean when we pray at home or worship in church. That is why, near the beginning of our worship we seek God's forgiveness. Today we can relate the psalm to Jesus, the King of Glory. Wherever His Spirit and Church are, there the King of Glory will enter.

The text for the psalm is taken from Common Worship 2000.

- 1 The earth is the Lord's and all that fills it, the compass of the world and all who dwell therein.
- 2 For he has founded it upon the seas and set it firm upon the rivers of the deep.
- 3 Who shall ascend the hill of the Lord, or who can rise up in his holy place?
- 4 Those who have clean hands and a pure heart, who have not lifted up their soul to an idol, nor sworn an oath to a lie;
- 5 They shall receive a blessing from the Lord, a just reward from the God of their salvation.
- 6 Such is the company of those who seek him, of those who seek your face, O God of Jacob.
- 7 Lift up your heads, O gates; be lifted up, you everlasting doors; and the King of glory shall come in.
- 8 Who is the King of glory?

 The Lord strong and mighty, the Lord who is mighty in battle.
- 9 Lift up your heads, O gates; be lifted up, you everlasting doors; and the king of glory shall come in.
- 10 Who is the King of glory?
 The Lord of hosts, he is the King of glory.


