Lent is more than just a seasonal countdown to Easter; it is a 40-day invitation to step back from the frantic pace of modern life and re-examine what truly matters. It mirrors the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness, a period marked by solitude, prayer, and the rejection of temptation.

While many see Lent as a time to "give up" luxuries like chocolate or coffee, the season is built on three essential pillars that offer a more profound spiritual reset:

Prayer: It is about making "space for God" by quieting the inner jangle of our hearts. Whether it is five minutes of morning silence or a Daily Devotional, the goal is to listen rather than just speak.

Fasting: Historically a strict discipline of one meal a day, modern fasting is a way to "shout down the rumbling stomach" and reorient our appetites toward spiritual hunger. It reminds us that we do not "live by bread alone".

Almsgiving: This is the practical side of Lent—turning the money or time saved from fasting into a gift for others, turning personal sacrifice into global solidarity.

Ultimately, Lent serves as a "spring detox" for the soul. It isn't just about endurance; it's about preparation. By stripping away the clutter, believers prepare to experience the joy of Easter not as a sudden event, but as a hard-won victory over the "darker side" of the human experience.

If you are stuck about what to do, then it's not too late.

The Mothers' Union has a Lent Action Calendar (*Resources - Mothers' Union*)

The Church of England's theme for Lent 2026 is "**Draw Near: Life-giving habits for Lent,**" focusing on developing spiritual rhythms. Running from Ash Wednesday, February 18, to early April 2026, the campaign provides daily reflections via the Everyday Faith app (*download for free from Google Play or Apple Store*) and specialised 40 acts resources for families. You can still catch up.

Christian Aid, Tearfund and CAFOD have many global causes to support.

I hope you all have a 'profitable' Lent and be even more ready to celebrate the Joys of Easter.



WICKED LENT STUDY



For this year's Lent study group, we are using Archdeacon Rachel's book 'Gravity Defied', based on the BAFTA winning film 'Wicked'. If you have not been to the first week then don't worry, you are welcome to attend as many of the remaining sessions as you wish.

They will take place on Tuesdays 3rd, 10th, 17th and 24th March at 7.30pm at St. John with St. Mark. Please note the 3rd March session will now be in the chapel but the remainder of the sessions are in the Barritt Room. The course explores a number of themes relevant to each of us in the contemporary world. All is discussed within the context of Jesus's ministry recorded in the Gospels, the temptations and threats that he faced, and persecution of those who followed him.

The Objective of the Stations of the Cross

is to help the Christian faithful to make a spiritual Pilgrimage through Contemplation of the Passion of Christ.

The Stations of the Cross are a Communal Prayer where we make a spiritual pilgrimage to the sights of the last few hours in the life of Jesus.

It follows Jesus from his sentence to death by Pontius Pilate through to his burial in the tomb.

The Stations of the Cross allow us to visit and to participate in the scenes of our Lord's Passion and death, through meditation, contemplation and prayers.

The early Christians suffered persecution from the Roman Empire for more than two Centuries after Christ.

Finally, in the year 313, the Emperor Constantine ended persecution by legalizing Christianity.

This opened the way for Christians to visit the Holy Land and the places of Jesus' last few hours.

However, not everyone could visit the Holy Land; it was expensive and, possibly dangerous.

So, in the Fifth Century, an interest developed to "reproduce" the holy places of Jesus' passion in other areas, so that many could make a spiritual pilgrimage.

This spiritual pilgrimage is called the Stations (or Way) of the Cross.

During this Spiritual Pilgrimage there are various stops (or "stations") along the way depicting various scenes of Jesus' passion and death, (such as Jesus is condemned to death, Jesus carries his cross, and the final one, Jesus is laid in the tomb).

Each station usually has pictures or images portraying each event.

In 1731, Pope Clement XII permitted stations to be created in all churches and fixed the number at 14.

Some devotional booklets include a 15th station – Jesus' resurrection.

The Stations of the Cross meditation usually last about 30 minutes.

We adore you, O Christ and we bless you -

Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the world.



A day of contrasts



Each year the World Day of Prayer is held: a global ecumenical movement of informed prayer and prayerful action, uniting Christians in worship written by a different peoples each time. This year the service has been written by the people of Nigeria on the theme,

"I will give you rest, come"

Locally there will not be a distinct service on Friday, 6 March but all are invited to Bury United Reformed Church, Parsons Lane for a service at 11am on Sunday, 8 March which will use this liturgy as its focus.

Favourite Psalms – Psalm 51

The psalmist pleads for forgiveness from God for some terrible sin that he has committed. In Old Testament times it was usual for people who had sinned to offer a sacrifice to atone for their sins, but it seems that the offence was so great, not even a sacrifice would atone for the sin. In verse 18 is the famous verse from scripture which was often used with the 1662 Prayer Book services – “The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit: a broken and contrite heart, O God, thou wilt not despise.” Like so many of the lament psalms, we do not know the exact situation that led to this lament. A later editor suggested it was one of David’s psalms. If that is the case, then it may refer to when David was confronted by Nathan, the prophet, over David’s adulterous behaviour towards Bathsheba who was married to Uriah. David saw her bathing and asked her to come to him. She became pregnant with David’s baby. So, David arranged for Uriah to be in the front line when fighting in the war. He was killed. This sparked Nathan’s anger towards David. You can read about it in 2 Samuel chapters 11 and 12. It amazes me that David was regarded as one of only a few kings of Israel/Judah who did what was right in God’s eyes, but this was not good behaviour.

This Psalm is highly appropriate for Christians today to recite if they feel in particular need of forgiveness and to seek God’s grace. Let us make verse 11 into our own prayer: “Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me.”

The last two verses are believed to have been added at a later date after Israel’s exile in Babylon.

Imagine someone offered you a crisp, brand new £10 note, you’d probably accept it if it was a generous offer, but then the person screwed it up, stamped on it and offered it to you, you’d probably still accept it because its value stays the same. When we sin, it spoils God’s image in us, but the image is still there. We are just as valuable to God; he still loves us. So, when David talks about God requiring us to have a broken spirit, a broken and contrite heart, he does not mean that God wants to humiliate us. What is necessary is that we learn to depend on him. The attitude that says, I can manage on my own without God’s help stops anybody, including God, from helping us. He does not force help on anyone.

Psalm 51 (words from Common Worship first published in 2000. I have not included the last two verses because most scholars believe these to be a much later addition.

1. Have mercy on me, O God, in your great goodness.
According to the abundance of your compassion, blot out my offences.
2. Wash me thoroughly from my wickedness and cleanse me from my sin.
3. For I acknowledge my faults and my sin is ever before me.
4. Against you only have I sinned and done evil in your sight.
5. So that you are justified in your sentence and righteous in your judgement.
6. I have been wicked even from my birth, a sinner when my mother conceived me.
7. Behold, you desire truth deep within me and shall make me understand wisdom in the depths of my heart.
8. Purge me with hyssop and I shall be clean; wash me and I shall be whiter than snow.
9. Make me hear of joy and gladness, that the bones you have broken may rejoice.
10. Turn your face from my sins and blot out all my misdeeds.
11. Make me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me.
12. Cast me not away from your presence and take not your holy spirit from me.
13. Give me again the joy of your salvation and sustain me with your gracious spirit.
14. Then shall I teach your ways to the wicked and sinners shall return to you.
15. Deliver me from my guilt, O God, the God of my salvation and my tongue shall sing of your righteousness.
16. O Lord, open my lips and my mouth shall proclaim your praise.
17. For you desire no sacrifice, else I would give it; you take no delight in burnt offerings.
18. The sacrifice of God is a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise.

When we cannot see a way forward, be our guide.


Help us to be a light to others, sharing hope and extending a helping hand where we can. We trust in your promise that you will never leave us or forsake us. Amen

An Appeal from Street Pastors

We have received the following request from Street Pastors asking for volunteers for roles. If you are interested, or know of anyone who may be, please see the details below.

Voluntary Treasurer required

Bury Street Pastors is a registered charity (reg number 1170471) and therefore requires good systems of governance. The group currently has an URGENT need for someone to step forward to take on the responsibility to be their Treasurer. This does not need to be someone who has had any previous experience of Street Pastoring, but does need to be someone who is committed to learning about and supporting the aims and operating ethos of Street Pastors, and someone who is also a member of a local church. The role includes preparing reports for submission to the Charity Commission. This involves updating the previous year's report, and including the financial details for the year just ended. Training in these aspects is available. A knowledge and understanding of bookkeeping, managing funds, expenses and cash transactions will be helpful. Xero software is used, but training can be given in its use. Ideally the person would become a member of the board of trustees (which meets approximately 4 times per year), and support the Co-ordinator and other trustees in the leadership of the group. This is an URGENT need, so if anyone is at all interested, please get in touch.



New Street Pastors

There are currently too few voluntary Street Pastors to be able to put out teams on both Friday and Saturday nights. In order to continue this vital work, new recruits are urgently required from our churches in Bury. Full training is given to new team members, and anyone at all interested can go out with a team as an observer, without any further commitment. This is an excellent way to test a calling from the Lord. 
