September has always felt like a month of fresh starts.

Schools and universities begin a new academic year. Holidays become memories, diaries begin to fill again, and many of us settle back into familiar routines. For me, this September marks the beginning of my final year at theological college before, God willing, ordination next summer.

Perhaps that's why it was good to discover that this year the Church of England has introduced a new observance for the first Sunday in September: **The Festival of Creation in Christ.**

At first glance, it might sound like another opportunity to think about the environment, and it certainly encourages us to care well for God's creation. But the title says something deeper. It reminds us that Christians don't simply celebrate the world as it is; we celebrate the world as God is redeeming it through Christ.



Paul writes that: *"if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation."* Those words are not only about individuals but about God's great purpose for the whole of creation. The Bible begins in a garden and ends in a renewed heaven and earth. Between those two scenes runs the story of God's determination never to abandon what he has made, but to restore it.

That gives September a rather different feel.

New beginnings are not only for schools, students or clergy in training. They are woven into the life of faith itself. God is always at work making things new - sometimes dramatically, but more often quietly and patiently.

Theological college has taught me that discipleship is less about collecting answers than about learning to notice where God is already at work. Sometimes that happens in lectures or in reading. More often it happens through worship, conversation, shared meals, friendships and the ordinary rhythm of prayer. In many ways, it isn't so different from tending a garden. Growth is rarely spectacular, but over time it becomes unmistakable.

Perhaps that's how God works in all our lives.

This September, as the seasons begin to turn once more, may we have eyes to notice the quiet work of God. For the Creator who once said, "Let there be light," is still bringing new life out of old places, and still making all things new in Christ. We may not always see the finished picture, but we can trust the One who is patiently shaping it.

And perhaps that's the invitation of this new Festival of Creation in Christ: to look at the world, at one another, and even at ourselves, not simply as we are today, but as God, in his grace, is patiently renewing us to become.

Being made in the image of God.

I asked a question. Did we have holy oil at St John's? I wanted to be anointed. This led to a wider discussion and between myself, my Margaret, David Robinson and Ian and June Banks we decided that there may be others who would value being anointed. We have chosen a Sunday on which to do this – Sunday 6th September. Margaret will preach and preside, an article will be written explaining the anointing and Ian and June will help recruit those wanting to be anointed and David will add oils to his tasks. All are invited to be anointed.



Anointing is a very ancient practice. Anointing by the elders of the church is mentioned in the letter of James in the New Testament. Many churches have recovered this act, and I valued greatly being anointed when I had cancer. To be anointed means participating in the healing love of God.

On September 6th I intend to be anointed. This shall be an echo of what the psalmist said in the Old Testament – I am fearfully and wonderfully made. I am disabled. I have chronic pain in my hips and lower back. Sometimes I get pain in my arms, shoulders and neck; I can walk for twenty paces before the pain gets too much and I have to rest. I use a wheelchair. I have difficulties going to the toilet; Margaret and the carers help me. I have problems with my mouth and, unrelated to the pain, I have Parkinsons.

I am fearfully made. All too often people assume that I have sinned and need to be forgiven. Or I lack something that needs to be made good. Or I need to be cured. Or when I go to heaven, I shall be released from my impairments.

I am fearfully made because the good God has fashioned me. I am what I am and that has been blessed by God. If I get to heaven I shall bear the wounds of my disabilities and I shall be transformed through the loving God revealed in Jesus Christ.

My God is revealed in the anointing. God through Jesus Christ is made vulnerable. Jesus is disabled as he is nailed to the Cross. When he is raised to new life in the glory of the resurrection Jesus reveals himself to the disciples and Thomas. Thomas places his hands in the wounds of Christ and says 'My Lord and my God'. Jesus Christ bears the wounds of his crucifixion and those wounds are made glorious by the disabled God; he is transformed.

There is a book cover showing the disabled Christ. Christ is marked out by having a halo; in the halo are the Greek letters for 'I am the beginning and the end'. The Christ figure wears dark glasses and carries a cane. Jesus is blind. A woman disciple grips the Christ. The blind leads the seeing. The blind reveals the loving God; the disabled transforms the non-disabled's life.

By this anointing we, the disabled and non-disabled, will share in the disabled God who calls us to rejoice in our creation for we are fearfully made.

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It has been an incredibly busy couple of months for Mothers' Union, in this year of celebration.

A group of members, including four from Christ Church, tackled the Infinity Bridge near Keswick. The photos on page 23 give no idea of how windy it was even for the spectators! Thank you to all who contributed to almost £2,100 (at present – it isn't too late!)

Members and friends enjoyed a summer lunch at the Duckworth Arms, which provided a break from making miniature scarecrows for the festival. There were quite a variety – made from wool, clothes pegs, buttons, paper, lolly sticks. Whilst we didn't manage 150, we did have quite a collection on display, just a few of which are shown on page 2.

Some of us enjoyed Afternoon Tea with about 90 members from across Bolton Archdeaconry. A pleasant afternoon raising in excess of £150 towards the 150th Appeal. This will be used to fund MU projects around these islands and around the world.

We invited members from St Stephen's Elton MU to join us for a talk by Mel, of Chutney and Cheer. A very entertaining evening of tales whilst she engaged us in deciding what should be included in the chutney she was making as she spoke. There was a wide variety of flavours for us to buy afterwards – I don't think many left without at least one jar.

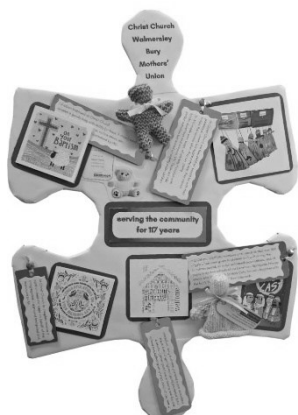
MARY SUMNER DAY almost deserves a page of its own! 150 years ago Mary Sumner called a meeting in her own parish which in an incredibly short time became known across Britain and Ireland and across the world. Now members are found in more than 80 countries and number over 4 million.

Mary Sumner is remembered in our lectionary on 9th August, which at Christ Church meant Family Service. Rosemary and Catherine led us in a service with a focus on the work of Mothers' Union, all of which is underpinned by prayer. This came across very clearly in the role play which Barbara and Nigel presented.

MU in the Northern Province had decided to hold a wave of prayer across the day, each diocese being given an hour during which members lit a candle and prayed, including a prayer for the 150th year.

Then during the afternoon a special evensong in Manchester Cathedral. Christine Sharp, Provincial President, was there, in her 'home' cathedral. Kenson Li, curate at the cathedral, gave the sermon, demonstrating once again his grasp of this movement. Bishop Mark commissioned two new trustees, candles were lit for the 12 dioceses in York Province and for our Indoor Members, who were unable to be with us. Music was provided by the visiting choir of St Giles in the Fields.

One highlight for many was the display of jigsaw pieces, which we had been invited to make to show what MU means to us now or has meant over the years. A wide variety of approaches but amazingly there were 45 pieces (around A2 in size).



The one from Christ Church MU aimed to demonstrate in miniature how we serve the community, showing:

- ✓ baptism card and teddy (or book for older children)
- ✓ pew bags to keep young children occupied
- ✓ a card for all who are married in church
- ✓ new home cards (for distribution by everyone to their new neighbours)
- ✓ our recent angel project in December 2024 and 2025

This jigsaw project was organised by Rosemary Taylor and, before a time of thanksgiving led by Bishop Mark, she spoke inspiringly (I know I am biased but many others commented!!) about the importance of every piece of a jigsaw and how that relates to each one of us. Whilst we may never know the importance of our own piece in the jigsaw of some else's life, God knows.

Both the Infinity Walk and the Jigsaw pieces have figured prominently in Mothers' Union's publicity in August, so Manchester is on the map.

For our meeting on August 19 please see the Open Group report. Mothers' Union enjoyed a repetition of "Dramatic Interludes", with the advantage that Nigel had discovered which way round the wig fitted.

In September we meet in the Hall at 7.30pm on 2nd for Evening Worship, to which everyone is welcome.

On 16th we will mark 117 years of the branch here at Christ Church with a Bring and Share Supper. We meet at 6pm for 6.30pm and we shall welcome our Archdeaconry President, Pauline Greenhalgh. Pauline will also be presenting long service certificates to some of our members.
